TEXAS PROSPECTS BRIGHT.

After quoting from market reports concerning the bad condition of the cotton in all Southern states except Texas, the Fort Worth Star-Telegram this week said:

WORLD'S NEWS IN BRIEF.

Kills Pair.—C. C. Chapman, 31, and his wife, 27, were shot and killed at Winsboro, Texas, by W. K. Bradford, 60, father of Mrs. Chapman, Wednesday morning. Bradford then fired four times into his own body and died in a few minutes. It is thought financial reverses had deranged his mind.

Text Books.—Arguments on the American Book Company's mandamus application to compel State Superintendent Marrs to recognize contracts let by the text book commission last December, were submitted to the supreme court in Austin Wednesday.

Mystery.—Mystery surrounds the brutal murder of Gussie Coombs, 17 year old girl of Tyler, Tuesday night. Physicians who examined the body found lying on the floor near the girl's bed the next morning declare that poison in some form had taken her life. Bruises were found about her back and elbows.

Out for Votes.—President Harding left Washington Wednesday on a 15,000-mile tour and will cross the continent by rail and then almost completely encircle it by water during his 10 weeks trip. He will deliver scores of speeches, inspect two of America's most important possessions and visit at least two foreign countries, Canada and Panama.

Rum Fleet.—The first appearance of a rum fleet in the Gulf, off Galveston, was reported Wednesday. A large steamer has been lying anchored about eight miles out in the gulf for the past ten days. Fleets of small boats were reported going to and from the steamer. Cases of whiskey were seen piled high on the deck.

To Jail.—Four Goose Creek men were fined by the judge in Houston Wednesday for refusing to answer questions regarding floggings at Goose Creek, and sentenced to jail for contempt of court until they are willing to answer the questions.

24 Released.—President Harding Wednesday commuted the sentences of 24 of the 48 "political prisoners" still imprisoned for conspiracy to obstruct the conduct of the war. Clemency was denied 20 men convicted in California on account of the vicious character of their offenses.

2 Drown.—Two children, a boy 10 and a girl 13, were drowned and another girl, 16, sister of the two, narrowly escaped death in Hubbard Creek, 11 miles west of Breckenridge, Monday evening.

Todd Gets Life.—Gov. Pat. M. Neff Tuesday afternoon commuted the death sentence, two days before the date of hanging, of Willis Wayne Todd, the youth who was convicted of killing James McNeal, Fort Worth service car driver. Todd was taken to the penitentiary Wednesday.

OATS ON A. F. SHELDON FARM MAKE 88 BUSHELS


A. F. Sheldon, who lives two and one-half miles north of Mullin on the Mullin-Zephyr road, visited the Eagle Thursday afternoon for the purpose of renewing his subscription. The thresher had finished for Mr. Sheldon at noon Thursday and he reported that he got 3,000 bushels of the very highest grade oats out of the 45 acres sown to the grain. Twenty-five acres of this made him 2200 bushels, or exactly eighty-eight bushels to the acre.

Mr. Sheldon said he had sold about two cases of eggs per week this year, which paid all his grocery bill, and cleared up over seven hundred dollars cash on his oat crop, after paying all expenses and keeping about 1800 bushels for feed for his livestock.

FORMER GOLDTHWAITE CITIZEN ANNOUNCES CANDIDACY FOR GOVERNOR



Hon. Joe Burkett of Eastland announces that he will be a candidate for Governor, subject to the action of the Democratic primaries in 1924. Mr. Burkett says that because of conditions that have arisen in a political way in the past two or three weeks, he deems it advisable to let his intentions be known at this time. Some of the issues he announces he will advocate in his campaign are:

A state reserve banking system primarily for the state farming and livestock interests of the state; a state controlled system of fire-proof terminal warehouses to the end that staple products may be successfully marketed; a constitutional amendment providing for a reasonable bonus for ex-service men, if the Federal government fails to provide such bonus; a constitutional amendment abolishing useless offices; abolishing of ad valorem taxes for state purposes, leaving the ad valorem taxes for counties and cities, and letting the state government be maintained by other existing taxes; repeal of the free text book law with provision for supplying books to those not able to purchase; an adequate and humane solution of the penitentiary problem; strict economy in all departments of state government; constitutional amendment exempting a reasonable value of the improvements on a homestead from taxation to the end that home ownership may be encouraged; institution of civil service examinations for all state employees, giving preference to ex-service men wherever possible; the faithful and efficient enforcement of all laws, especially those against mobs.

Joe Burkett was born October 19, 1885, near Lone Grove, Llano county, Texas, and removed to Mills county in 1889, stopping in Goldthwaite. From here he removed to Robert Lee in 1890 and moved from there to Eastland county in 1892.

In June, 1921, he was elected Senator of the 28th District, and has held that place every since.

HOUSEWIVES CANNOT AFFORD TO BAKE.

Bakers who help, by advertising message and personal word, to spread the truth that American women cannot afford to bake the family bread, are doing a service to society and propagating a much-needed gospel of simple economies.

Some day, it is to be devoutly hoped, the elementary schools will teach the principles of elementary economies in such a way that no adult of even the most meager education will think the mistaken thoughts that now are encountered on every hand.

Today we find leaders of organized labor, whose disciples as well as themselves should know better, preaching the doctrine that higher wages can be obtained with less production—the silliest and most mischievous of ideas, and yet one that finds ready acceptance among those who are always hoping to get something for nothing.

We find countless thousands, some of them men of prominence, public leaders, who think and teach that all business profits are exorbitant and any business profit is a sin and a shameful thing.

We find men operating bakeries who think they are beating the game of making a living because they are able to persuade the members of their own families to work for them at no wages at all, where other bakers have to pay strangers a living wage.

And we find vast numbers of housewives—perhaps a majority of all there are—who not only count the value of their own time as nothing, but have no conception of the value of many other items that must necessarily be included in a proper analysis of the cost of home-made bread.

How many housewives are there who realize that a correct summing up of the costs of baking bread at home would prove that in many cases a single loaf costs nearly a dollar? Are there any who, in comparing home-made bread with baker's bread, think to include in the cost of the former their own time at the kneading board and the oven, the value of the fuel used, the time spent in cleaning up the pan, the board and the other utensils used, as well as the actual ingredients of the loaf?

Surely a knowledge of economies is needed by the people, and by none more than housewives and small bakers. If the elements of the subject are taught in grade schools no baker would contribute his own time and his family's time to his business without adequate remuneration, and think he was beating the game. No house-

wife would devote an uncomfortable hour and a disproportionate amount of fuel to the task of baking a loaf whose ingredients alone cost her as much as a "store loaf" and fondly imagine she was saving the whole price of the baker's bread—as many do imagine.

The idea that any housewife's bread is superior to baker's bread in quality, cleanliness or flavor is pure sentimentalism—nothing else. Not ten per cent of the home-kitchen baking processes are as clean and sanitary as the conditions of a modern bakery. Not ten per cent of the home-baked loaves are as accurately mixed or as scientifically baked as the average baker's loaf. Not any of the home-baked bread is produced at as low a price as is paid for the average loaf of baker's bread.

In the modern bakery, supplies are purchased in large quantities, and hence at prices much lower than any housewife is able to obtain. The mechanical work is done by machinery, so that an hour of the baker's time accomplishes a hundred times as much as an hour of the housewife's time. The baker's profit on a loaf is a mere trifle, for he must depend upon the sale of thousands of loaves to pay for his own daily bread. No home baker can compete with these conditions, if she has the right understanding of costs and the value of her own labor.

Within the past few years there has been some talk among women's organizations on the proposal that all housewives should properly receive at least a nominal remuneration for the time they actually devote to household duties.

We are not concerned with the

merits of that idea; but what we do know is that there would be no home baking of bread under these circumstances. The husband who demanded an itemized bill for his wife's services, and found therein an item of sixty cents to a dollar for baking time, would immediately become a confirmed advocate of baker's bread, and would see that he got it and nothing else from that time on.





HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 16.

Proposing an amendment to Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, which relates to taxation and revenues, by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 9a, directing the Legislature to provide for construction, operation and maintenance, under State control, of a State system of public highways; providing for an election for the ratification or rejection of amendment herein proposed, and making an appropriation to defray the expenses of said election.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. That there be submitted to the people of Texas, for ratification or rejection at a special election provided for herein an amendment to Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending said Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 9a, which shall read as follows:

SECTION 9a. The Legislature is authorized and directed to provide for the creation, establishment, construction, maintenance and repair of a system of improved highways throughout the State; and in order that the state may provide the means, revenues and instrumentalities the establishment and maintenance of such system of highways, the Legislature is empowered to levy and cause to be collected specific excise and ad valorem taxes, in addition of those permitted for other purposes in the Constitution, but such an ad valorem tax shall be imposed only for the purpose of retiring the bonds authorized by vote of the people of this State as provided for hereinafter in this Section.

When said system shall have been designated and taken over for the State as provided in Section 4 hereof, the Legislature is authorized to make provision for the equitable compensation to such counties for the value of such improvements as have been theretofore constructed by the Counties in the State.

Provided, also that save for the State highway system, in all other respects, Counties shall have the right to build, construct and maintain roads, turnpikes and bridges within their respective boundaries and the Constitutional provisions relating thereto are not qualified or repealed by reason hereof.

The Legislature, at any Regular or Special Session, is authorized and directed to pass and enact all appropriate legislation necessary to carry out and effectuate the purpose and intent of these Articles.

SEC. 2. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to cause to be issued his necessary proclamation for an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in July, 1923, at which election this amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of this state for adoption or rejection and shall make the publication required by the Constitution and Laws of the State. Said election shall be held under and in accordance with the General Election Laws of the State, and the ballots for said election shall have printed or written thereon in plain letters the following words:

"OFFICIAL BALLOT." "For the amendment to Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for a State system of highways." "Against the amendment to Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for a State system of highways."

ment shall erase by marking a line through the words "Against the Amendment to Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for a State system of highways." Those who oppose such amendment shall erase by marking a line through them, the words, "For the amendment to Article 8 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for a State system of highways." And the result of the election shall be published and declared according to the majority of the votes cast in such election.

SEC. 3. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury not otherwise appropriated for the purpose of paying the necessary expenses of the proclamation and publication of this amendment and the election to be held hereunder.

Place Names

MULLIN.

Mullin, the second town in size in Mills county, is located near Mullins creek from which it takes its name.

This creek was so named from one of the earliest settlers in this part of the state, John C. Mullins. His father, Charles Mullins, and family came to Lampasas county in the early fifties, and the son John in 1854 moved a stock of horses to this county and built a cabin of logs at the spot where the people of Mullin now hold their picnics.

He made his home there for a number of years, and then moved to Jim Ned valley, where Thrifty now stands. His parents and a brother went to Brown county about the same time, and some of their descendants are still to be found there.

In the first year John C. Mullins was in the country some Indians visited his range and drove away a number of horses. With two or three ranch hands he made pursuit and overtook the Indians at Salt Gap in Brown County. Though the whites were greatly outnumbered they attacked and drove the savages away and returned with the stolen horses. This was the first time settlers of Mills county gave chase to marauding bands, and the first fight at Salt Gap, which was on a pass-way from the Indian reservation on the Brazos to San Antonio and South Texas.

So far as I am able to learn Mullins' cabin was the first permanent dwelling place erected within the bounds of what is now Mills County. Other cabins were built, occupied for a time and abandoned, but the Mullins home continued to be a dwelling place for twenty or more years.

The late M. C. Kirkpatrick was the founder of Mullin, and it's located on the J. D. Kirkpatrick survey, which survey was a grant from the Republic for services rendered in the Texas Revolution.
