Place Names

PARKSFORD.

The word town has been described as a "tract of land divided into streets, blocks and lots and plotted, for convenience in designating parts thereof." With that definition in mind it is proper to say that Parksford is the oldest "town" in Mills county.

It is probable that very few citizens will recall that such a place exists, but our deed records reveal many transfers of property "situated and being in the town of Parksford, Brown County, Texas."

The surveying and mapping was done by Henry C. Knight, who at the time was surveyor of Brown County.

On Nov. 28th, 1875, John M. Parks and Henry Ford purchased the "lower half" (320 acres) of the W. W. Williams 640 acre survey then in Brown county but now in Mills County. This purchase covered the village of Williams Rancho which had begun to take on new growth. Up to this time the settlers were "squatters," having no title to the land on which their homes stood.

The plotting was done with careful regard to protecting each citizen in the possession of his cabin. Those who were able paid for their lots and received deeds to the same; those who were unable to pay received deeds also.

The effort to change the name of the place was a failure for everybody except conveyancers continued to call the place Williams Rancho and the government retained the name when establishing the postoffice in 1877.

Parks and Ford were leading cattlemen of that day and drove their herds to Kansas and other ranges and markets. Parks moved with his family and others to Arizona in 1880 and located near Solomonville. His son Jams was for years sheriff at that place.

Henry Ford was elected county clerk of Brown County in 1876 and moved to Brownwood. After serving eight years as clerk he engaged in the banking business. He died at his home eleven years ago. After he was gone and could not defend his name, some one was unkind enough to suggest that he was Jesse James, the noted bandit, and a few others were uncomplimentary enough to Ford's friend, who knew and loved him, to believe the story. Governor Thomas T. Crittenden of Missouri, after hearing proof, paid ten thousand dollars reward for the death of Jesse James. Governor Crittenden was not "buncoed." Henry Ford was

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MILLS COUNTY CROP PROSPECTS ARE GOOD

T. J. Harrison of South Bennett Mills county crop reporter to the State Department of Agriculture, last Friday sent to the department his report covering the principal crops. The percentages given below are figured on a ten-year average:

Cotton, 100 per cent east of railroad; lower west due to grasshopper ravages.

Corn, 75 per cent; oats, 110; wheat, 100; hay, 100; kaffir, 85; milo and other improved feed sorghums, 100; syrup sorghum, 50; sweet potatoes, 60; peanuts, 25; rye and barley, 100; rabbits, 150.

Who owns the Santa Fe?

Not a few persons, but many thousands, are stockholders in this great railway. All have a voice in its management.

The number of stockholders living in states traversed by the Santa Fe is steadily increasing.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 16.

Proposing an amendment to Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, which relates to taxation and revenues, by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 9a, directing the Legislature to provide for construction, operation and maintenance, under State control, of a State system of public highways; providing for an election for the ratification or rejection of amendment herein proposed, and making an appropriation to defray the expenses of said election.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. That there be submitted to the people of Texas, for ratification or rejection at a special election provided for herein an amendment to Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending said Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 9a, which shall read as follows:

SECTION 9a. The Legislature is authorized and directed to provide for the creation, establishment, construction, maintenance and repair of a system of improved highways throughout the State to be under the control of the State; and in order that the state may provide the means, revenues and instrumentalities the establishment and maintenance of such system of highways, the Legislature is empowered to levy and cause to be collected specific excise and ad valorem taxes, in addition of those permitted for other purposes in the Constitution, but such an ad valorem tax shall be imposed only for the purpose of retiring the bonds authorized by vote of the people of this State as provided for hereinafter in this Section.

When said system shall have been designated and taken over for the State as provided in Section A hereof, the Legislature is authorized to make provision for the equitable compensation to such counties for the value of such improvements as have been theretofore constructed by the Counties in the State.

Provided, also that, save for the State highway system, in all other respects, Counties shall have the right to build, construct and maintain roads, turnpikes and bridges within their respective boundaries and the Constitutional provisions relating thereto are not qualified or repealed by reason hereof.

The Legislature, at any Regular or Special Session, is authorized and directed to pass and enact all appropriate legislation necessary to carry out and effectuate the purpose and intent of these Articles.

SEC. 2. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to cause to be issued his necessary proclamation for an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in July, 1923, at which election this amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of this state for adoption or rejection and shall make the publication required by the Constitution and Laws of the State. Said election shall be held under and in accordance with the General Election

Laws of the State, and the ballots for said election shall have printed or written thereon in plain letters the following words:

"OFFICIAL BALLOT." "For the amendment to Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for a State system of highways." "Against the amendment to Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for a State system of highways."

Those voters who favor such amendment shall erase by marking a line through the words "Against the Amendment to Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for a State system of highways." Those who oppose such amendment shall erase by marking a line through them, the words, "For the amendment to Article 8 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for a State system of highways." And the result of the election shall be published and declared according to the majority of the votes cast in such election.

SEC. 3. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury not otherwise appropriated for the purpose of paying the necessary expenses of the proclamation and publication of this amendment and the election to be held hereunder.


