## AMERICAN LEGION WILL HAVE OPEN HOUSE TO- NIGHT TO EX-SOLDIERS

Tonight is regular meeting night for the Mills County Post of the American Legion. All American Legion men in the county who can help out with the reunion are urged to be present, as final arrangements for pulling the biggest reunion in the history of the county will be made at this meeting.

Also all ex-soldiers and their wives, mothers and sisters are invited to be present tonight. An American Legion Auxiliary will be organized, and refreshments will be served.

## ARRANGEMENTS BEING MADE TO FEED LARGE CROWD BARBECUE DAY

Arrangements are being made to feed the largest crowd in the history of Mills county on the third day of the Thirty-Seventh Annual United Confederate Veterans Reunion and American Legion Jubilee, which will be held at the Reunion grounds south of Goldthwaite on Wednesday and Thursday and Friday, July 25, 26, and 27. Free barbecue, bread, coffee, pickles, etc., will be furnished the large crowd at noon.

All persons who have goats or other meat to donate to the barbecue are requested to bring them in and leave them with E. T. Fairman, in charge of the barbecue for the American Legion. He has a place to keep them until the time of the barbecue. Also as many people as possible are requested to bring plates and coffee cups for their own use, in order that there will be no shortage.

**Hold-Up.**—Two unmasked and armed men entered a bank at Bernice, Okla., Tuesday morning, locked the cashier and his wife in a vault and escaped with all the money in sight.

**Women Riot.**—A general riot was staged by the women in the women's ward at the Oklahoma state penitentiary at McAlester Tuesday, when guards attempted to end a quarrel between the women. One guard was stabbed with a pair of scissors, several were beaten and furniture was smashed.

**Venue Change.**—The cases of the State versus Tom Ross and Milt Good for the killing of H. L. Roberson at Seminole in April 1 this year, were Tuesday transferred to Taylor county.

**To Probe Killing.**—Acting Governor Davidson was to leave for Somerville Friday to make a personal inquiry into the shooting by masked men of Otto Lange, farmer. Davidson said he was not satisfied with results of the investigation conducted by rangers and local officials.

**Commerce Merger.**—The Panhandle Chamber of Commerce has been merged with the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, according to Amarillo dispatches.

**Prison Term Asked.**—Neither the death penalty nor life imprisonment for C. W. Berry, who is being tried at Seymour on a murder charge for the killing of Wood Barton, at Paducah, on Nov. 10, 1922. A pen sentence is asked.

**Head Howard Payne.**—Dr. Edgar Goodbold of Shreveport, La., has announced he has accepted the presidency of Howard Payne College at Brownwood.

## Place Names

### COMANCHE TRAIL.

Before the coming of the white men to this part of Texas, the Indians led a nomadic life. In their travels from the highlands to the coast country, though they journeyed on foot and later with ponies, beaten paths and well marked trails were established.

One of these passways which came to be known as the Old Comanche Trail extended across Mills County from a point opposite the mouth of the San Saba river to the Brown County line near where it crosses Pecan Bayou.

This trail passes between San Saba Peak and the Colorado river and through Salt Gap in Brown County, and could be easily traced up to the time the county was fenced.

Several tragedies occurred in Mills County on or near this traveled way. The Jackson family was murdered in Jackson valley, Mr. Lindsey, father of James H. and Finis H., was killed not far from the lower Bayou bridge, and the late Sanders Hufstutler was attacked and wounded on Elliott's Creek.

A Mr. Devine was killed west of Zephyr. This, however, was probably in Brown County.

In the early part of 1875 the late John T. Stark made a small enclosure and began clearing a field on the west side of the Bayou. The bank of the stream made one line of fence, except at one point where it was necessary to fell some trees to close a pass-way up the bank. In placing this obstruction he turned the travel on a great tribal highway.

A few days after doing this a band of Indians came along going north and found it necessary to hunt another ford. In doing this the band passed over the heads of Fayett and Charles Stark, then small, who ignorant of their danger were fishing just under the bank.

In clearing this field, Mr. Stark and his sons found signs of a long established camp ground, such as beads, arrow heads, parts of guns, pieces of iron, and old stumps of trees which appeared to have been cut down with tomahawks.

On Christmas day 1839 General Burleson gave battle on this trail to a band of Cherokees opposite the mouth of San Saba river (in Mills County) and killed a number of the braves and captured many women and children. Among the killed were John Bowels and Chief Egg. These Indians were a part of the Cherokee tribe which had been defeated in a two days' battle in east Tex-

**TEXAS COTTON REPORT FOR JUNE 25.**

The following cotton report for Texas up to June 25 was given the press by H. E. Schultz, statistician for the United States Department of Agriculture:

The growing condition of the cotton crop in Texas remains unchanged since the report a month ago. The condition is better than in any of the important states of the cotton belt. It is usual for the crop to improve in June. The 10-year average for June 25 is 78; present condition of the crop is 77 per cent.

As was indicated earlier in the year, the acreage planted to cotton has shown a substantial increase and more land is devoted to this crop in the state this year than ever before in its history. With 12,241,000 acres planted and standing on June 25, 1922, and 11,874,000 picked, the preliminary report for this year indicates an increase of 15 per cent in the acreage now planted. A considerable larger area was planted but due to cutworms, grasshoppers, floods, rains, windstorms, many acres were abandoned altogether or replaced with feed crops. It is estimated that the acreage standing totals 14,077,000 acres which with a condition of 77 per cent forecasts a production of approximately 3,910,000 bales gross weight, providing that average conditions prevail until picking time.

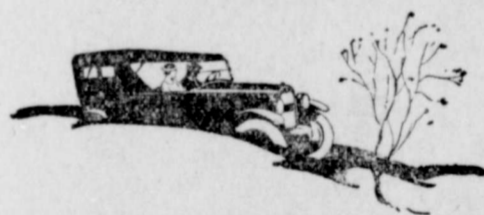

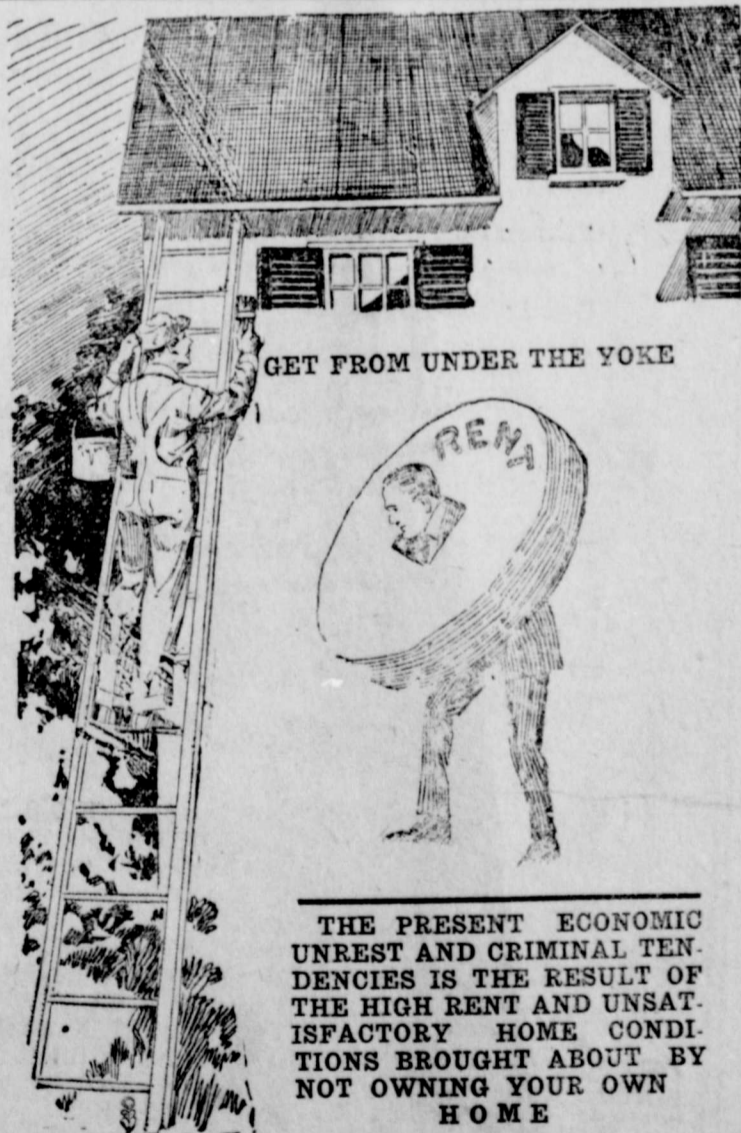
