PREDICTS HIGHER PRICES FOR COTTON

Henry Crews & Co., brokers, of Wall Street, New York, in their latest weekly financial review, have the following to say about the cotton situation. Henry Crews & Co. are not cotton operators and have no direct interest in the price of cotton:

The developments of the week bearing on the present and future cotton situation have generally been construed by the cotton and cotton goods trade as in favor of higher prices for the raw material. The English commodity markets have scarcely been affected by the Japanese disaster or the Greco-Italian situation, probably owing to improved prospects for some negotiations toward a settlement of the Ruhr trouble and the small available stocks of raw material on hand. Anticipation of fresh stimulus to buying various raw materials, including cotton, in this country, to replace stocks destroyed in Japan, has been an important market influence in turning sentiment in favor of the constructive side of values especially for the long run.

The recent rapid advance in contract values and the elimination of an important short interest has probably weakened technical market conditions materially, although sentiment of the speculative element still appears in favor of the buying side.

Expectations of a broadening trade demand for spots in the near future, together with evidence of another moderate sized crop this year, would seem to form a strong combination in favor of high cotton prices being maintained for some time to come. In forecasting the probable future course of the cotton market, present calculations could, however, be upset by unexpected unfavorable developments in the foreign political or domestic industrial situations. As reactions are always in order after such a violent advance, we would recommend for the time being new speculative purchases on good price recessions only.

MANY CHANGES IN BUSINESS FIRMS IN 30 YEARS

If you will compare the advertising columns of the Mills County Advocate of 1894 with the Eagle of this date you will note many changes in business firms. In fact, there is little else but change.

Thirty years ago the following were leading merchants of the city: A. J. Gatlin, W. N. Bowden, J. H. Logan, Wm. Cameron & Co., J. I. Campbell & Co., Cole Bros., Ferguson & Pardue, W. C. Urbach, and Mrs. I. C. Everly.

Under head of professional cards, it appears that G. N. Harrison was then practicing law in Mills County and had his office in "The Post and Land Office Building." No one seems to remember what became of that noted building, but Harrison landed safely in Brownwood, then a struggling village on Pecan Bayou, some thirty miles northwest of Williams Rancho. He has prospered in his profession, and is generous enough to attribute much of his success to the fact that he once resided in Goldthwaite where he was broken to the bar and received much of the unwritten work pertaining to the times and to the place.

Lewis and Anderson practiced law in those days, "in all the courts of the state," if their ad can be believed. Certainly very few law firms have had so wide a clientage. It is recalled by old settlers that Mr. Lewis specialized in Kangaroo courts and was a favorite with all connected with such litigation. These early day lawyers did not take the public into their confidence and tell where they could be found, but it is probable that they had an office scattered round somewhere. Mr. Lewis now lives at St. David, Arizona. Mr. Anderson has not changed his address.

J. J. Cox, Lawyer, had an office at Mullin. He afterward came to Goldthwaite, remaining several years, then moved to San Angelo, where he died nine years ago. A son, S. S. Cox, is now district attorney of Dallas County.

Another card announced M. L. Brown, Physician and Surgeon. "Office at Spark's. Residence at night."

Not very specific, you may say, but the doctor could always be found. Once a man asked a small boy in the street where he could find Dr. Brown. "Just over on the second block," said the boy, "out in the lot currying Richard." The man rode on when the boy called out, "You'll know the Doctor. He's got a hat on." Richard was a famous saddle horse in the days when doctors carried saddle bags. Doctor Brown was the first professional man to sport a car. It was red and the boys called it the "red heifer" to distinguish it from Dr. Everett's car which he called the "grey mule."

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE ENDORSES AGRICULTURAL PROGRESS AT MEETING

The regular meeting of the executive committee of the Mills County Chamber of Commerce was held Monday night. Plans for improvement of the city park recently donated by the city council were discussed.

County Agent Weaver presented the plans of the Colorado River Pecan Growers Association for a pool at Goldthwaite this season, and for a pecan exhibit. The Chamber of Commerce, the Pecan Association and the county agent will co-operate to make this one of the best exhibits in Texas. The association plans to pool each year and the proposed exhibit, properly handled as it will be, will help greatly in advertising the excellent pecans of this section.

Mr. Weaver also discussed the purpose of the Better Cotton Association recently planned and the effect its success will have on the cotton market at Goldthwaite. The club unanimously voted to get behind the move for better seed and uniform varieties.

This year 1200 bushels of Mebane seed were planted 100 farmers and is being ginned separately. The results are very gratifying. All are highly pleased with the yield and turnout. These seed are available for next year's planting, and it is hoped that every bushel will be used. McDermott, Linkenhoger and Obenhaus, the committee of the Better Cotton Association, will assist in locating good planting seed and in determining the reliability of dealers.

Growers should get the best seed now for next year's planting. Get some of these good seed from your neighbor. The best is not too good. No farmer can afford to match his money and time against scrub seed or scrub stock.

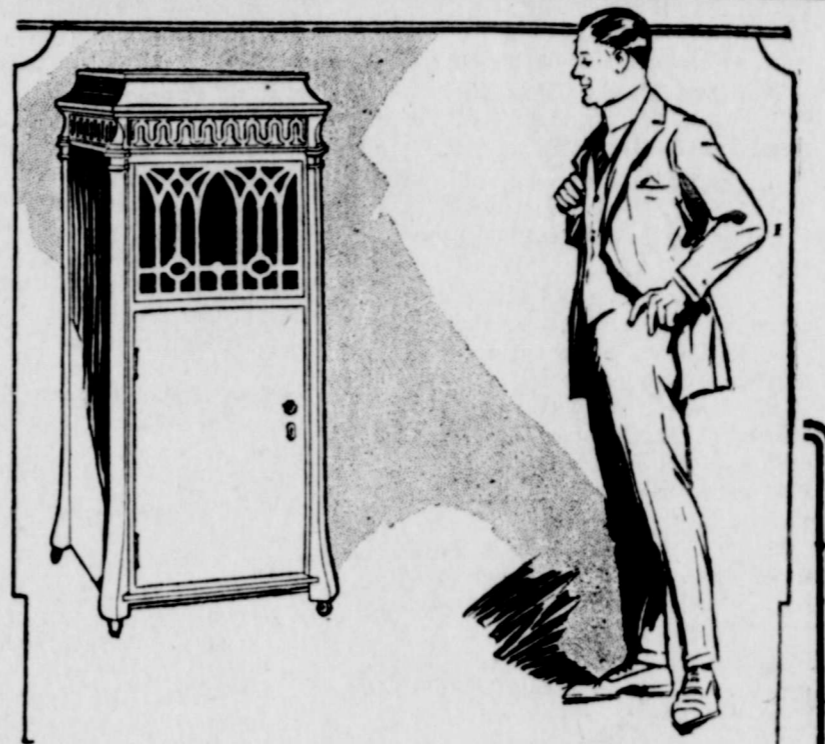

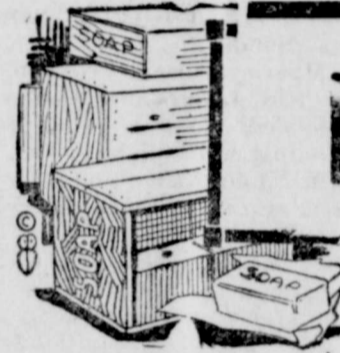

How to Build Attic Aerials for Your Radio

Attic aerials are easy to construct, and when properly made, the results obtained with them are nearly as good as those obtained with outdoor aerials. Attic aerials should not be confused with top aerials, as they have no directional effects. They also have an advantage over outdoor aerials in that they do not need a lightning switch.

The end-to-end type of this aerial consists of a number of lengths of No. 14 stranded copper wire, strung parallel to each other, and attached to the uprights at each end of the attic by means of ordinary aerial insulators. The total length of the wire used should not be less than 150, nor more than 200 ft., and the wires should be spaced about 1 1/2 ft. apart. One end is left dead; the wires are then connected in series, as shown, and the other end is soldered to the lead-in wire, which is brought down to the instrument through a length of flexible loom.

In attics where less space is available, such as those with hip roofs, the aerial can be strung along the rafters, as shown in the upper right-hand drawing. One length of No. 14 wire, 150 to 200 ft. long is strung in four parallel rows as indicated, the wire being attached to the rafters by means of round porcelain insulators, which can be purchased at any electrical supply store. One end is left dead, and the other is connected to the lead-in wire, as before.

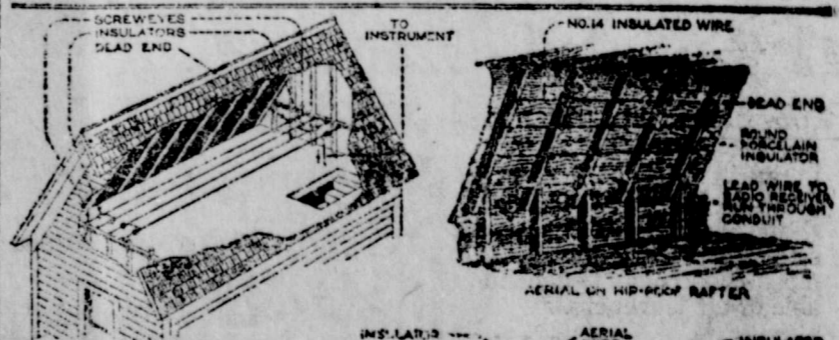
The flat top aerial, shown in the lower drawing, is designed for small attics. Two lengths of rope are strung across the attic from corner to corner, and are tied together at the point where they cross. The aerial wire is attached to the ropes, as shown in the drawing, being

tied firmly at every point where it touches the ropes. The inner end is the dead end, and the outer end is connected to the lead-in wire. The turns should be spaced about 1 ft. apart.

In apartments where there are no attics, an inside aerial that gives good results with a tube set can readily be

made by running several turns of annunciator wire behind the picture molding, leaving one end of the wire dead, and bringing the other down to the receiving set. With such an aerial an amateur has received stations 1,000 miles distant, using a two-step spider-coil receiving set.

To obtain the best results with any receiving set, just as much pains must be taken to secure a good ground as to construct the aerial. Number 14 wire should be used, and one end soldered to a water or radiator pipe. A clamp can also be used, the pipe, of course, being scraped where the clamp is attached. Gas pipes



are not so good for grounding purposes, as they are often insulated from the ground by the meter. However, this can be remedied by shoving a wire around the latter.

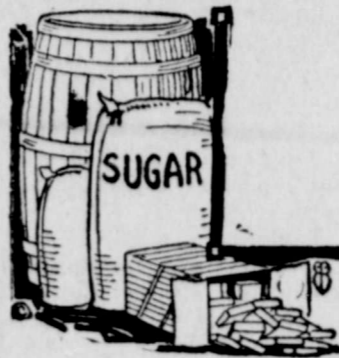

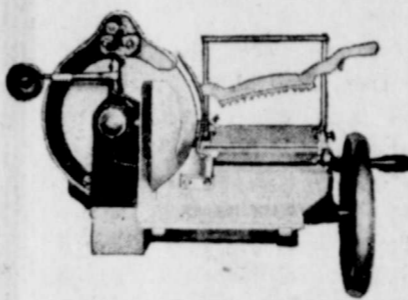

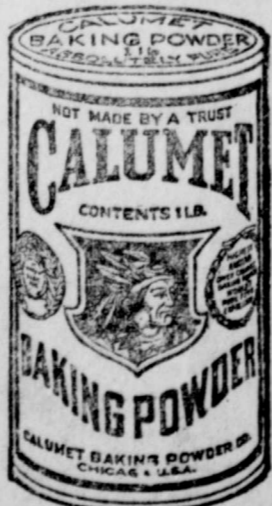

Travel by Stagecoach and Camels in Australia

The interior of Australia covers so vast an area that only a small portion of it can be reached by rail. In the early '50s an



American started a line of coaches from Melbourne to Castlemaine. This was soon after gold was discovered. Since that time a network of coach routes has been built up, covering a large area. These run up the coast cities, situated on railroad lines, with the interior—the "back" country. A journey by coach is not at all ways a pleasant experience in Australia. South Australia lays claim to the doubtful honor of what is called the "dead finish" coach travel. This is a trip from Had-don Downs to Farina, some 404 miles, and the fare, one-way, is \$50. It is not a "de-lux" journey, as may be judged from the time-table, which states distinctly that "Passengers are Not Carried." For is the coach used at all times by the travelers. One coach line notifies its passengers that they "must be prepared to travel the latter part of the journey on camels."

Ant Army Marches in Circle

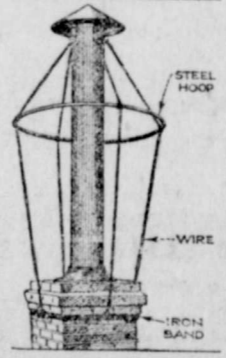
In watching the march of an army of ants, seeking a new home, a naturalist recently noted that, in many days and nights of constant moving, the insects had blindly tracked a circle more than a thousand feet around, and ended at the starting point. Urged by blind instinct, each one follow-

ing the ant in front, bearing eggs and food for a new nest, they tramped along in a strong column. The army marched six abreast at some places.

Bracing Chimney Extension

A tinsmith who was confronted with the problem of erecting an extension on a low chimney, without attaching guy wires to the roof, braced the extension in the manner shown in the drawing.

An iron band was bolted around the chimney as indicated, and stovebolts were fitted in holes drilled on each side, for the guy wires. The latter were fastened to the top of the chimney extension and to the stovebolts, and were spread apart by means of a steel hoop, which was held in position by wrapping each guy wire around it once. This bracing made the extension so strong that it has withstood the heaviest gales.



Attaching Wire to Concrete Posts

A good method of attaching wire to concrete fence posts is shown in the drawing. One side of the post, as far as it extends above the ground, has small grooves formed in it, about 2 in. apart. These grooves are made by wooden strips nailed to the face of the form in which the posts are made. The fence wire is laid in the grooves as shown, and bound in place by a



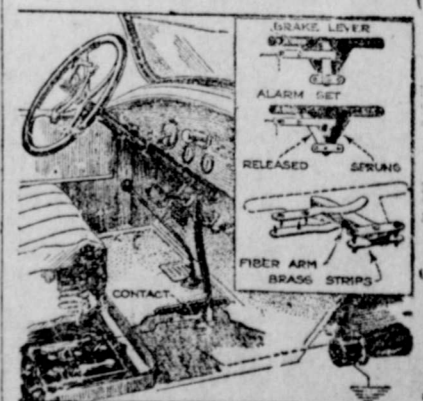
short length of wire, passed around the post and twisted around the fence wire.

Pail With Float Prevents Calf Drinking Too Fast

Fast drinking is a habit which careful stock raisers are anxious to correct in young calves, for if allowed to continue, it is likely to cause digestive disorders, that affect the animal in after life. An effectual check against this is believed to have been found in a simple metal float that fits into a straight-sided pail in which it slowly drops as the calf feeds. A hole in the center of the float, the upper surface of which forms an inverted cone, regulates the flow of milk, and prevents its being drunk too fast.

Simple Alarm Safeguards Car Against Theft

The drawing shows a simple theft alarm that can be attached to any car, and will, when set, sound the horn and keep it sounding, the moment the emergency brake is released. It consists of a switch having two spring-contact blades located in a V-shaped slot, cut in the floorboard at right angles to the brake-lever slot, and a movable fiber arm that is pushed between the ends of the blades, after the



brake lever is pulled back, so that the lever cannot be moved forward without dislodging the arm and closing the switch. When the owner uses the car, he pulls the arm back, so that the brake lever may be moved past without disturbing it. The circuit, of course, is independent of the regular horn circuit.

WORLD'S NEWS IN BRIEF.

Kills Self.—Cornered by the sheriff at Marshall Wednesday, a young man about 25 years of age, wanted for the robbery of a bank at Mooringport, La., of approximately \$5,000 Tuesday, shot and killed himself in a restaurant at Marshall.

Removal Terms.—Charging that Tulsa County's three jury commissioners, sheriff and the police commission of Tulsa, Okla., are dominated by the Ku Klux Klan, Governor Walton Wednesday demanded the resignation of the jury commissioners and asked a committee of citizens to call upon the sheriff and police commissioner to retire, in presenting the terms upon which he will revoke his declaration of martial law in Tulsa.

Building Increases.—Building in leading American cities during August increased 13.9 per cent over the same month last year and involved an expenditure of

\$205,230,374, the heaviest since May, according to statistics compiled by Run's review.

Woman Shot.—When she refused his proposal of marriage, W. H. Carter, 75 years old, shot and killed Mrs. Nancy Pruitt, 35, near Sulphur Springs Tuesday, according to Sulphur Spring news dispatches.

Life Prolonged.—The average life of the human being has been prolonged from 12 to 15 years as a result of recent advances in medicine and surgery, according to Dr. Charles H. Mayo of Rochester, Minn.

Battleship Texas.—Ploughing through a heavy sea in a dense fog, the battleship Texas crashed headlong into the freighter Steel Seafarer off Port Arguello light at 6:55 o'clock Wednesday morning, according to radio dispatches to Los Angeles. The crash occurred near the rocks where seven United States destroyers went on to the rocks last Saturday.

Freights Collide.—Four trainmen, all residents of Birmingham, were injured Wednesday when two freights collided at Littelton, 20 miles from Birmingham.

Sheriff Indicted.—Indictments against Sheriff Less Whitaker, County Attorney Henry Ford and four other men in connection with the flogging at Amarillo of E. T. McDonald, were returned Wednesday by the Potter County
