WORLD'S NEWS IN BRIEF.

Woman Slain.—Mrs. Roland Clark, of New Orleans, candidate for mayor in the recent primary, is dead, her son and daughter wounded, and Louis Meyer, her opponent in the race, is in a St. Louis hospital mortally wounded as a result of a gun battle in which the four participated.

Meyer, after being shot by Mrs. Clark, drew his pistol and shot her to death. Her daughter took possession of her mother's weapon and fired at Meyer, who shot and wounded her. Mrs. Clark's son then took up the baton. I was shot and wounded by Mr. Taft Stricken.

Former President Taft was taken with acute indigestion Wednesday and was unable to act as honorary pallbearer for former President Woodrow Wilson.

\$64,000 Loss.—An entire block in the business district of Alford was destroyed by fire of undetermined origin at 2 a. m. Wednesday, entailing a loss of \$64,000.

Captured.—“Diamond Joe” Sullivan, who with Emory Connell and Eulos Sullivan escaped from death cells in the Arkansas penitentiary last Friday after holding up the warden and several other men with a wooden pistol, was captured near Redfield Arkansas, Tuesday. Sullivan offered no resistance.

Revolution Broken.—According to private dispatches received in New York Tuesday, Adolfo De La Huerta, leader of the Mexican revolution, and his staff left Vera Cruz, Mexico, on a steamer for an unknown destination. Federal troops have occupied Vera Cruz.

Snow Tuesday.—According to press dispatches, a light mantle of snow covered a great part of east Texas Tuesday, with flurries in west Texas.

Evacuation.—Consular advices received by the State Department in Washington Tuesday announce the evacuation of Vera Cruz by De La Huerta insurrectionists against the Mexican government. Vera Cruz was the headquarters for the rebels.

Ten Killed.—A news dispatch from Chicago Tuesday says ten men were killed and 30 men and women hurt, some dangerously, when a train crashed into a street car at a grade crossing in that city.

FORMER PRESIDENT WILSON DIED AT 11:15 SUNDAY

Washington, Feb. 3.—Former President Wilson died today at 11:15 a. m. Fatigued and worn by the battle of death which began before he left the White House in 1921, the twenty-eighth President of the United States—the war president of two terms—eight of the most momentous years in the history of the world—closed his eyes and slipped peacefully away.

The end came when vitality no longer could retard the steady dissolution which set in with the stroke of paralysis that laid Mr. Wilson low on his return from the western speaking trip in 1919 in which he declared he was glad to give his life for the league of nations if that would make it a success.

The cause of death, as officially announced, was general arteriosclerosis and haemoptilia.

A digestive disorder, which developed last Monday, hastened death by a new and vicious attack on the waning vitality of the former president. He took a sudden turn for the worse Thursday night and his physicians found that thereafter it was only a question of how long they would be able to prolong life.

Washington, Feb. 4.—Woodrow Wilson will sleep for a time in a stone vault within the great cathedral rising on the hills that look down over Washington from the westward. His funeral Wednesday will be as simple as his last years of life.

The Funeral.

Washington, Feb. 6.—In the sacred privacy of the home, and in the presence of only the president and the few who were his colleagues in days of greatness and the quiet thousands waiting outside under wintry skies for humble share in the last leave-taking, marked the funeral of former President Woodrow Wilson Wednesday.

MEMORIAL SERVICES IN HONOR OF WOODROW WILSON HELD HERE

Last Wednesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock most of the stores of Goldthwaite were closed in order that homage could be paid to ex-President Woodrow Wilson, whose remains were laid to rest in Washington on that day.

A memorial program was rendered at the Dixie Theatre to a full house of sympathizers and admirers of President Wilson. The program was arranged by a committee composed of Mrs. J. A. Gillespie, A. J. Harrison and E. B. Anderson, and it was, from beginning to end, a very beautiful tribute to the man who held the helm of the United States throughout the most stormy voyage of its career.

The program, as rendered, together with the proclamation of Mayor Littlepage, follows:

Whereas, Woodrow Wilson, the Twenty-eighth President of the United States, and America's greatest patriot and statesman, died at his home in Washington Sunday, Feb. 23, 1924, at 11:15 a. m., and

Whereas, the last sad rites over his remains will be solemnized this afternoon;

Therefore, every business and professional enterprise should cease from 2:30 until 3:30, in order that due respect may be paid America's greatest leader.

Consequently, you are urged to attend the Memorial Services at the Dixie Theatre, beginning at 2:30 this afternoon.

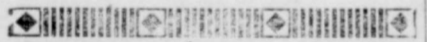

MULLIN OIL WELL LOOKS PROMISING

Considerable excitement is manifested around Mullin and among Goldthwaite's oil men on account of the showing of the Fisher well, 6 miles from Mullin, owned by the Home Oil Co. The well is around 3100 feet, and there is considerable gas in the well now. Drilling has been suspended until casing can be procured and set to the new depth in order that several hundred feet of water, which is now standing in the well, can be cut off. It is thought by men who know the oil business that when the water is eliminated, strong gas pressure and possibly oil, will develop.

Latest reports from the well (Friday afternoon) indicate that the gas pressure is increasing and arrangements are being rushed to get the casing set before this pressure ruins the well.

FORWARD MOVEMENT BRINGS IN LARGE SUM FOR MISSIONS, EDUCATION AND BENEVOLENCES.

ASK FOR \$27,000,000 MORE

This Sum Needed to Complete Campaign Quota by End of 1924—People Are Called to Pray.



DR. L. R. SCARBOROUGH Who Will Lead Southern Baptists in Raising \$27,000,000 in 1924.

Up to December, 1923, Southern Baptists had paid in on their subscriptions to their 75 Million Campaign the sum of \$48,172,866.72. It is announced by the Campaign headquarters in Nashville, four years of the five-year period have now expired, leaving approximately \$27,000,000 to be raised by December, 1924, if the original Campaign objective is to be reached in the hope of obtaining this amount of money for the further advancement of all the general missionary, educational and benevolent enterprises fostered by Southern Baptists, the Campaign Conservation Commission has inaugurated an intensive effort that it is expected will reach every state district association and local church in the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention during this year.

Dr. L. R. Scarborough, who was general director of the original Campaign organization, has been asked to return to the Nashville headquarters from his home at Fort Worth for this closing year of the forward movement and give his personal attention to the direction of the special effort that will be waged for collecting the full \$75,000,000 by the time the period for the program expires in December next. Dr. Scarborough, through the assistance of the various state and associational workers, will seek to enlist every Baptist in the South in some definite share in this closing year of the Campaign.

"WOODROW WILSON THE PEACE-MAKER"

(Extract from speech delivered by F. P. Bowman at the Memorial Services for Woodrow Wilson, at Dixie Theatre Wednesday afternoon.)

I will preface my remarks by a quotation from the first chapter of Nahum, verse 15: "Behold upon the mountain, the feet of him that brings glad tidings, that publishes peace." I believe today the world recognizes the fact that foremost among all the ambitions of Woodrow Wilson's life was a longing ambition to bring about peace—peace and good will toward all men. Every man was Woodrow Wilson's brother. And, above everything, except justice and right, he prized the good will of all men and all nations.

As has been said here today, Wilson came into political prominence at a critical time in our nation's history—a time that tried men's very souls; a time that winnowed out the chaff, and burned it and left only the bright and burnished wheat. Wilson stood the trial because he was solid to the core.

In the beginning, Wilson called for peace. He tried in every way to keep the peace with the world. For three long years he kept us out of the European conflict with honor. In the dissatisfaction with Mexico in 1914, when it seemed that war was eminent, Wilson waited. Then when Argentine, Brazil and Chile, the A. B. C. Alliance, offered their services as mediators, though they were insignificant nations, Wilson gladly accepted and war was averted. In 1915, after the Lusitania was sunk, and the whole world rose in anger, Wilson first attempted peaceful measures, sending a note to Germany demanding disavowal and reparation so far as it could be made. Germany paid no heed. He then prepared another note so strong and forceful that William J. Bryan, who was then Secretary of State, resigned because he said it meant war. But it did not mean war at that time. Germany agreed to retract her policy of submarine warfare without warning, and the blow was withheld.

In 1916 Wilson sent his first note, and the first note of any nation, to the warring powers, offering his services as mediator, still fondly hoping that reason would prevail. But alas for Reason, alas for Humanity, the world would not listen, and we were plunged into the conflict. The great President said in his message to Congress: "It is a fearful thing to lead this great peaceful people into war, into the most terrible and devastating of all wars, Civilization itself seeming to be in the balance. But the Right is more precious than Peace, and we shall fight for the things we have always carried nearest to our hearts. The day is come when America is privileged to spend her blood and her might for the principles that gave her birth."

Again, in that darkest hour when the carnage was at its most sickening height, Wilson the Peace-maker came forward with his famous 14 point message for peace. All the nations recognized the reasonableness and necessity of his plan. They hailed him as a master; and from that time on he was the recognized leader and spokesman of the allies. Germany still continued the sanguinary conflict in a most stubborn way and not until Oct. 4, 1918, would she speak; and then she accepted as a basis for proposed peace the program as laid down by President Wilson in his 14 point message. And at last on Nov. 11, that glorious day, the last shot was fired, the last sword was placed in its sheath, and that message was sent flying over all the wires in all the land, into every city, village and hamlet, wherever human life held sway—Peace, Peace, the war is ended. The flags were flung, the bells were rung, and heart and tongue proclaimed the joyous, Peace with Victory.

"The Yankee boys are coming home,

Across the war-swept seas.

The Yankee boys are coming home

Old glory to the breeze.

For long as Yankee boys shall live,

Wherever they're beset,

Their slogan, coming home, shall be,

We ain't been lied till yet!"

When Abraham Lincoln died, the poet fittingly portrayed his departure in the masterpiece, My Captain. Oh Captain! My Captain! the fearful trip is done. The Ship has weathered every risk. The prize we sought is won." This could not be said of Wilson, because the great ambition of his life, and for which it was sacrificed,—world peace—has not yet been won. The hearts and minds of men have not yet accepted his mediation. He blazed the trail and marked the way to peace, but the world has not yet followed. Yet, such is the love and affection that the common people all over the world had for him and the universal regret at his untimely death, let us hope that what he failed to accomplish in this life he accomplished when he died. That as the old man dieth, there is born into the world a spirit of brotherhood that shall finally unite all people in lasting reunion.

Wilson is dead. Let us revere his memory. It is not the evil men do that lives after them, but the good. Who then can measure the future influence of this great man. It matters not whether his body is buried in the simple country churchyard or whether it is laid to rest in that great amphitheatre of fame at Washington where now only the unknown soldier sleeps, know this, that "On Fame's eternal camping ground his silent tent is spread. And Glory guards with solemn round the bivouac of the dead." We cannot dedicate his resting place with words of ours. Only the future, generations can dedicate it

by their actions and their accomplishments. We can only wish for him a well deserved, a long and peaceful rest and sleep.

"How sleep the Brave, who sink to rest, by all their Country's wishes blessed. By fairy hands, their knell is rung. By forms unseen their dirge is sung. There Honor comes, a pilgrim gray, to bless the turf that wraps their clay. And Freedom doth a while repair, to dwell a weeping hermit there."

You know that on that final great day, I do not believe that all the good and noble things of mankind will be lost. But I believe that when time is ended, when the Angel of the Lord shall step forth and with mighty trumpet sound shall proclaim that no more the world shall be; when the mists of time shall clear away and the rosy dawn of eternity shall span the eastern sky; when all the great accomplishments of men are gathered together on that great and illimitable plane, that one of the most illustrious jewels that America will have to offer as a nation will be the life of Woodrow Wilson.

COTTON STANDARDIZATION.

By W. P. Weaver, County Agent.

Last year some progress was made toward a uniform variety of cotton for Goldthwaite ginning territory. The farmers did a sensible thing to adopt the variety being grown by the greatest number. This was Mebane. An organization was formed and ginning accommodations secured for this variety. Enough of this seed is available to plant the entire crop this year.

An order has been placed for 100 bushels with the Mebane Sales Agency for pedigreed seed to plant seed plots to further improve the planting seed.

It seemed that all was drifting toward standardization until the seed salesman appeared on the scene last fall. Cotton seed salesmen are like solicitors in general—good, bad and indifferent. Each one has the best seed. They criticize other varieties. They show pictures of astonishing top roots and surface roots and wonderful bolls and show unheard of length of staple. But they forget to mention that new varieties have no official test in our section over a term of years. Consequently the farmer in too many cases falls for it and buys a sack or two, thereby bringing into the county more varieties to be mixed at the gin and postponing indefinitely the time when standardization will be realized.

With a greater degree of co-operation, the Goldthwaite gins might have been ginning one variety next year. But we regret to say that the itinerant seed salesman has more weight with many of our farmers than have their neighbors who are striving for the betterment of all by adopting a uniform variety.

What are the facts relative to varieties in West Texas? Government tests covering a ten year period have been completed, showing that the highest average yield was made by Mebane; the greatest season yield was made by Burnett, but it fell far short in average.

We find that the varieties sold here last fall are all comparatively new, untried and without official test. Therefore, we contend it is a mistake to put it against varieties that have stood the tests covering many years.

I am not saying Mebane is the best variety. But I do contend that it has been highly satisfactory to our farmers and as we had made some progress with it, we should have had full co-operation of our farmers regardless of the representations of strangers.

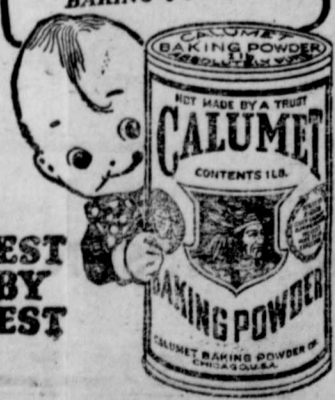

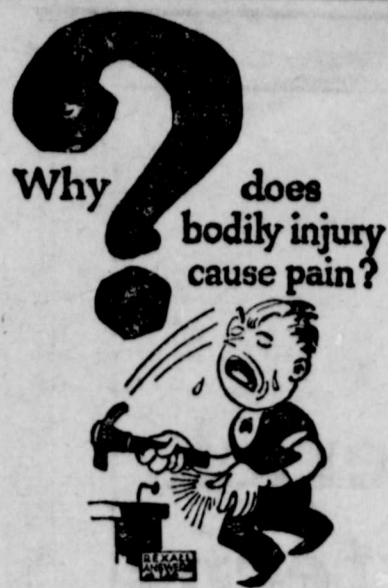
