### EFFORTS TO CASE OFF WATER FROM FISHER WELL UNSUCCESSFUL

Considerable excitement was created in this county Thursday and yesterday, when it was expected that the Fisher oil well near Priddy would come in a producer.

Several days time have been spent trying to pull the 5 3-16 inch liner out of the well in order to attach the casing recently secured from the Lometa well to it, but the casing could not be pulled. Wednesday work was started lowering the casing down to the liner and attaching it by means of a thread-cutter. The last casing was set Thursday and it was expected that this would cut off the water. A few buckets of slush were drawn from the well late Thursday, indications of oil and gas being present.

Yesterday morning an attempt was made to bail the water out, but it was discovered that it had not been cased off. Therefore the well can not be tested until a way is found to cut off the water.

A concrete bridge will likely be placed in the well where the water leaks in and then drilled out.

A large number of visiting oil men and others were present at the well both Thursday and Friday, and several leasing deals were closed. It is the opinion of oil men that if the water can be cut off, the well will blow in.

### CITY MAYOR AND THREE ALDERMEN TO BE VOTED FOR HERE TUESDAY

Next Tuesday there will be an election held at the court house for the purpose of selecting a mayor, three aldermen, a city secretary and attorney, a treasurer and a city tax assessor and collector.

Jas. Rahl will hold the election and all qualified voters who have resided within the city limits for a period of six months immediately preceding the date of election are entitled to vote.

The names of all candidates whose names may appear on the ticket must be filed with the city secretary two full days before the date of election, or by tonight.

### BEATING BOLL WEEVIL.

Mr. E. A. Miller, Extension Agronomist A. & M. College, delivered an interesting address before the Mills County Chamber of Commerce and visiting farmers on better seed, soil improvement on nd fertilizers. This address was well received by the farmers and merchants alike, several of whom arose and expressed their appreciation.

In the course of his address he explained how South Texas farmers, by planting cotton on uniform dates, were able to produce cotton in spite of the weevil. He explained that early plantings served as breeding plats for the weevil. These plats furnish new broods which attack the later plantings. When all the cotton is planted at the same time the new broods do not get to work in time to prevent fair crops.

An effort is being made to get this matter of planting on uniform date before Mills County farmers.

The Center Point, Rock Springs and Liberty communities have had meetings and all present unanimously agreed to plant not earlier than April 25th.

The farmers in every community are urged to meet and discuss this important matter at once.

# Clean-Up & Paint-Up

## PROGRAM FOR STATE HEALTH WEEK, SUNDAY, MARCH 30, TO APRIL 5.

The following is the program for State Health and Clean-Up Week:

### Sunday, March 30—Sermon and Lecture Day.

Arrange for sermons on subjects pertaining to public health, in all churches. These sermons may contain the scriptural references to the Law of Moses in Deuteronomy, and other appropriate passages.

Sermons and lectures might also be delivered on specific health improvement and protection topics.

The ways in which certain preventable diseases are transmitted. Malaria, yellow fever and dengue, by the mosquito. Bubonic plague by the flea. Typhus by the louse. Diphtheria, influenza, and tuberculosis by disease germs in the sputum.

Personal Hygiene is another important topic. Care of the teeth and skin. Ventilations, proper food, exercise and clothing. The danger of infection from the use of the common drinking cup or towel.

### Monday, March 31—Health Appraisal and Food Protection Day.

Have health survey of yourself made by competent physician. Have your teeth examined and eyes tested. Ascertain number of cases and kind of communicable diseases in your community.

Filthy food means food not securely protected from flies, dust and dirt. Food establishments of all kinds should be inspected at regular intervals to prevent the sale, or offering for sale, of filthy food.

### Tuesday, April 1—Mosquito and Fly Control Day.

Mosquito Control: Create Official Working Committee for providing:

Inventory of number of cases of mosquito borne sickness in the community.

Quinine and chill tonic sale by druggists.

Days lost from school and industries on account of mosquito borne infection.

Preliminary survey locating existing and potential mosquito breeding places.

Estimate cost to correct and control mosquito breeding for season.

Education: School instruction and four minute talks by health officers, sanitarians, teachers and civic leaders.

Advocating use of 16 mesh screen.

Constructive: Draining standing water and filling low places, stocking ponds and fountains with top minnows.

Screening houses, covering cisterns, wells and other necessary containers.

Removing or destroying other containers, such as tin cans, old barrels, etc.

Fly Control:

Abate all fly breeding places by: Placing all garbage and decomposing organic matter in covered pails.

Seeing that horse and cow lots, pig pens, chicken roosts, are cleaned daily.

Placing all manure in covered pen or boxes, or better still, haul and scatter in fields.

Using sprinkling powder, borax or heiliver in barn yard periodically.

### Wednesday, April 2—Disease Prevention Day.

Emphasize special health programs in the schools, in all club meetings and all general gatherings. Have health talks, moving pictures, demonstrations, health plays.

We would suggest that the Su-

perintendent act as State Health Officer of his school, city or rural. Have students and parents get up suitable talks on the prevalence of smallpox, typhoid, measles, diphtheria, dengue, etc., stressing the importance of vaccine in smallpox, typhoid and diphtheria, and tell how to destroy the mosquito breeding places.

Have each child discuss all these topics with the folks at home.

Tuberculosis: It is fitting that on Disease Prevention Day special attention should be given to tuberculosis, as it is one of the most important causes of death in Texas.

Information regarding this very important subject can be secured by addressing the State Department of Health, 616 Littlefield Building, Austin, Texas.

### Thursday, April 3—Child Health Day.

Birth registration: Secure the co-operation of all school children parents, teachers and organizations in locality and report to the Bureau of Vital Statistics of the State Board of Health every child whose birth is not recorded in the community, and arrange for the future recording of all births.

Prenatal letters will be supplied by the State Board of Health, Child Hygiene Bureau, to expectant mothers on request.

A study should be made of facilities for care of children's health in the schools. The vital importance of physical inspection of all school children should be stressed. Scales should be provided for each school so that children may be weighed and measured monthly.

Material for programs for this day may be obtained from the Department of Health.

### Friday, April 4—Sanitary Im-

### provements and Fire Hazards Day.

Appoint committees on sanitation to inspect the town's drinking water supply, sewer system, dumping grounds, swimming pools and mosquito breeding places, fire departments and general fire hazards.

Also inspect surface closets, and leave suggestions for fly-proofing and conditioning as needed.

Specimens of drinking water from public schools and private supplies may be sent to the State Bacteriologist of the State Board of Health for analysis.

Water mains should be flushed, standpipes cleaned out, cisterns covered and fire hydrants tested.

Encourage the use of covered garbage pails.

Examine electric wiring, including attic, basement and garrets to see that no insulation is broken, that no wire is resting on nails or wood, that there are no fuses bridged with pennies or other metal, and that there are no knotted lamp cords.

### Saturday, April 5—General Clean-Up Day.

It will be fitting to complete the program with a grand finale, and week end polish for all previous activities started during campaign.

After checking up all rubbish, refuse that has not been collected and burned should on this day be reduced to ashes.

Ditches and vacant lots should be freed from weeds and culverts open for free drainage.

Continue paint up, varnish and white wash activities to add civic atmosphere to the community.

The use of umigants and disinfectants might be further stimulated in those places where needed.

Permanent play grounds and parks and a systematic campaign for continuing health education may receive consideration on this day.

Building codes, health, sanitary and fire prevention ordinances, with enforcement machinery should be perfected, or made to function more efficiently where needed during the ensuing year.

Prizes may be awarded or special mention made of the cleanest premises, etc.

The foregoing program is suggestive only, and every community should take stock of its health and sanitary defects, and concentrate to correct the most pertinent evils.

The State Board of Health may give detailed information on other activities that you desire to carry out during the week and supply a limited number of leaflets, folders and placards.

### Health Promotion Week.

Directed by the State Board of Health, assisted by Texas Public Health Association, Bureau of Extension Service of the University of Texas, and the Texas Fire Insurance Commission with other state-wide agencies co-operating.

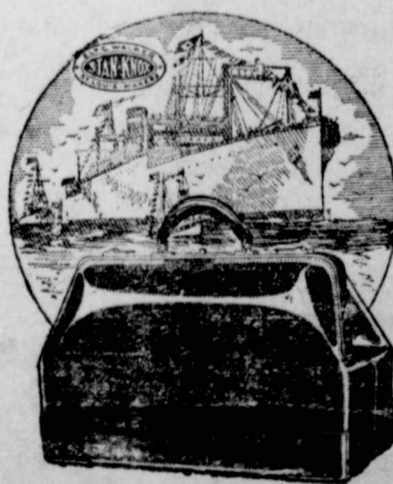

## YOUR OWN HOME

Gries, Chief Division of and Housing, Department of Commerce, Washington, has a very interesting booklet on the "How to Buy a Home" which is being distributed free of charge. Copy of same is being written to him for it. Or, desire bulk lots of the book be obtained from the printing office at Houston, at the rate of \$4 per hundred.

Handbook, which was prepared the instance of a large number of individuals and organizations, contains a foreword by Hoover and 28 pages of text "aims to set down the outline of problems" confronting the home seeker and to the steps and precautions taken in carrying out the plan with the least possible dissatisfaction. Mention is made throughout of the assistance to be expected from the groups and the institutions with whom the home builder will ordinarily win the foreword of Secretary Hoover are tables showing percentage of families owning homes, by states and large cities. In 1900 out of every thousand families in the United States owned the homes they lived in. In 1920, the proportion had dropped to 456 out of every thousand families.

Text itself begins with an introduction showing that, although men and women who buy a home have never done it before, they are usually unskilful, as people generally are in the things they do but once or twice in a lifetime. They can proceed with confidence if they go about it

in the right way, and check their own judgment by consulting experienced persons.

The danger of attempting to buy beyond one's ability to pay is pointed out and a margin of safety to provide for illness or other emergency is advised. On the other hand it is noted that nearly every family can and should cut down their expenses when the savings are to be invested in a home. A family that pays a sixth of its income for rent may, for example, be able to devote one fourth or more to buying and maintaining a house, for the amount thus used may include both rent and savings.

It is important to have agreements in regard to financing, building and purchasing properly signed by both parties and drawn with careful attention to legal details, according to the pamphlet.—Porter A. Whaley, Manager West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

## CHANGE S.O.S TO O.S.O IN FIGHT ON MOSQUITOES

(Texas State Board of Health.)

In the past, man has fought mosquitoes single-handed and by such defensive methods as the use of screens and the so-called "mosquito lotions." He has often been driven in-doors, giving "S.O.S." signal—that is "screen or suffer." Through combined efforts and the application of offensive methods, the fight against the mosquito nuisance can be made a marked success, and the new signal, "O.S.O."—"organized scientific offensive"—might well be adopted.

By the "S.O.S." method, efforts were made to defend oneself from the pest after they had been permitted to breed in large numbers. The new way—O.S.O—is to remove all breeding places, thus giving no opportunity for them to increase in numbers.

Organization is essential. Systematic work is required from April to October. Definite areas for aggressive control measures should be established and responsibility for the success of the undertaking assigned to some one.

Scientific application of suppressive measures is necessary. There are many species of mosquitoes in Texas; however, a definite program against only four of these have been found imperative. Thus, the particular species of mosquito should be studied in order to know what measures to use in combatting his depredations.

Offensive methods have been proven more successful than defensive methods. The western cowboy has said, "I always shoot first; it's cheaper." Even so it is cheaper to prevent the breeding of mosquitoes than it is to pay for the damage that has been wrought by their presence.

Organization is a matter for each local community. An Anti-Mosquito Committee should be prominent in every town.

Scientific advice as to methods of mosquito suppression might be obtained by making request to your local City or County Health Officer, or by writing the State Board of Health, Austin.

Offensive mosquito control campaigns are not prohibitive in cost.
