NEW TRUSTEE ELECTION LAW.

Article 2820. All of the ballots for the election of school trustees in common school districts and in independent school districts having fewer than 500 scholars as shown by the last preceding scholastic census roll approved by the State Department of Education and exclusive of transfers shall be printed with black ink on clear white paper, of sufficient thickness to prevent the marks thereon being seen through the paper, and be of uniform style; at the top of the ballot shall be printed "Official Ballot,....."

Independent School District" the number or name of the school district in which the election is to be held to be filled in by the judge of the county when he orders the ballots printed. Any person desiring to have his name placed on said official ballot, as a candidate for the office of trustee of a common school district or independent school district as herein provided shall, at least ten days before said election, file a written request with the county judge of the county in which said district is located requesting that his name be placed on the official ballot, and no candidate shall have his name printed on said ballot unless he has complied with the provisions of this section; provided that five or more resident qualified voters in the district may request that certain names be printed. The county judge upon receipt of said written request, and at least five days before the election, shall have the ballots printed as provided in this Act, placing on the ballot the name of each candidate who has complied with the terms of this Act and deliver a sufficient number of printed ballots and necessary election supplies to the presiding officer of the election at least one day before the election is held, the said election supplies including the ballots, poll lists and tally sheets to be delivered by the county judge by mail or in any other manner by him deemed best, to the presiding officer of said election in sealed envelopes, and said sealed envelopes shall not be opened by the election officers until the day of the election. The expense of printing the ballots and delivering same to the presiding officers, together with the other incidental expenses, shall be paid out of the general funds of the county. The election officers of said election shall be required to use the ballots so furnished by the county judge as provided by the terms of this Act. The election officers shall make returns of said election to the county judge and certify the result in the same manner as is now required by law and said ballot boxes which have been furnished by the local school officials shall be sent to the county judge and said election returns shall be canvassed by the commissioners' court, and together with ballot boxes shall be safely preserved for a period of three months next after the date of the election.

In keeping with the life she lived, the words Jesus spoke concerning the faithful woman who came to anoint his body for burial, "She hath done what she could," was used as the scriptural bases of her burial service last Sunday afternoon at the Methodist Church of which she had been a member for many years.

Tuesday afternoon, less than three days and nights after death's first visit, he returned and called from the home Grandmother Hooks, who was approaching her eightieth birthday. Her life has been one above reproach. As was true in the case of Mrs. Ada, the beautiful floral offering and the host of friends which accompanied her body to its last resting place, speak for the influence of her Christian character upon those who knew her. She had been a member of the Presbyterian church from childhood and was faithful in the trust committed to her hands. Her funeral service was conducted in the Presbyterian church Wednesday afternoon and practically the same form of service was used as in the preceding occasion.

Our sympathy goes out for Mr. and Mrs. Berry. May they look forward to the general resurrection in the last day, and the life of the world to come, through our Lord Jesus Christ; at whose second coming in glorious majesty to judge the world, the earth and the sea shall give up their dead; and the corruptible bodies of those who sleep shall be changed and made into his own glorious body, according to the mighty working whereby he is able to subdue all things unto himself.

-- FARM FACTS AND FANCIES --

By W. P. WEAVER, County Agent.

College Station, Tex., March 8, 1926.

Mr. W. P. Weaver, Co. Agent, Goldthwaite:

Dear Mr. Weaver:

Your letter regarding sweet potato storage and the use of fertilizers, has just been received on my return to the office. I regret that it is impossible for me to visit your county at this time as I have a very full schedule.

I am asking the Experiment Station to send you a copy of their circular No. 31 and bulletin in 167 which will serve as good guides in connection with the use of commercial fertilizer.

The formulas given in circular 31 are the ones that we are recommending for the different crops and on the various soil types. For your deep sandy soil a 12-4-4 would be a good formula and for the better types of soil with a clay sub-soil, a 10-4-0 or 10-4-2 formula would be very good. A good home mixture consists of two parts acid phosphate and one part of Nitrate of soda, or three fourths part sulphate of ammonia.

In your section about 200 lbs. per acre would be a good application.

I am also asking our mailing clerk to send you a copy of our bulletin B-60 Entitled "Sweet Potato Storage in Texas." This bulletin contains plans of the various sized houses and also full directions in regard to the proper growing and handling of the crop so that it can be successfully stored. For storage purposes, it is very important that potatoes be grown free from black rot, and that they be very carefully handled during harvesting to prevent bruising. There should be no trouble in marketing potatoes that have been properly handled and stored as a great many are being shipped to your section from East Texas.

Particularly do we request those who are wanting to secure loans thru the Intermediate Credit Bank to meet with us and advise how many will require loans and other data concerning this important matter. We must make application to the office at Dallas, before we can secure the cooperation and approval of Bank officials we therefore request that all of members who will require financial assistance for this year, meet with us.

In view of the present indications of the farmers to plant more acreage to cotton this year than last, not only in Texas but the world over, it is not difficult to figure what the price be. But before increasing cotton acreage and reducing acreage of other crops, figure how many bales of cotton it will take at \$50 a bale, to buy the \$30,000,000 worth of canned goods that Texas buys each year.

How many bales at \$50 or \$60 will it take to buy the feed that you can raise, or the meat supply needed for the family?

These are pertinent questions which every farmer worthy of the name should consider, seriously, and if you will attend such meetings as we have each month, these

and others of equal importance can be thrashed out to the benefit of every farmer in the county. You are cordially invited to attend this meeting.

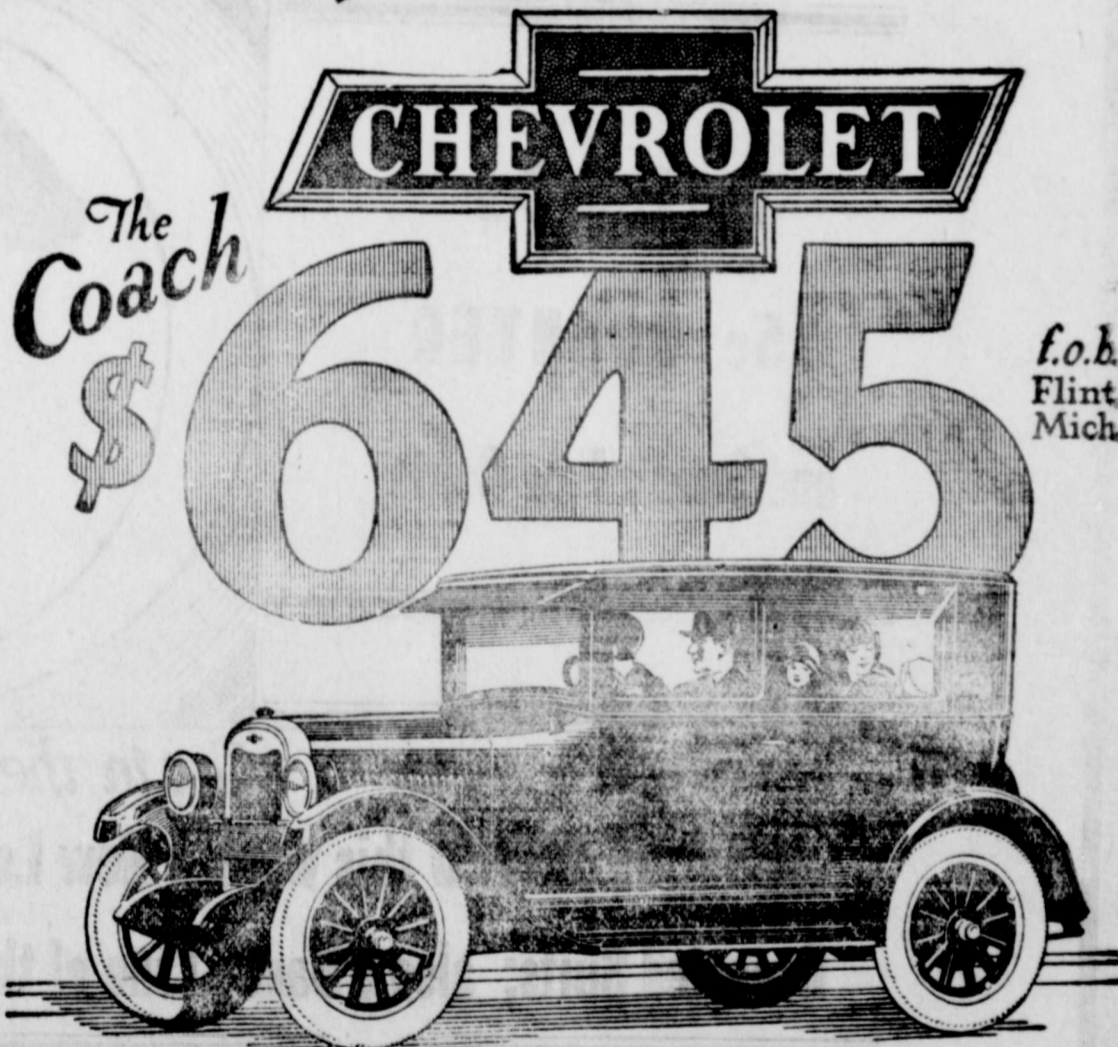
