With a fine open Fall such as occurred in 1924, with a minimum of weevil damage a large yield is possible. While weevil emergence was light this year and damage from them to date is small, the weather has been favorable for propagation and there has been increasing complaints of weevil infestation. Due to lateness and poor bottom fruiting, only a small percent of the crop can be called safe. The facts are that the 1926 cotton crop is on the defensive and perfect weather is essential to insure a satisfactory yield. Opinions differ as to the most desirable weather, the majority of our correspondents say that high tem-peratures are likely to cause considerable shedding due to the excessive moisture, and the sappy condition of the plant.

This being so, I want to call particular attention to the fact that the minimum price of rubber fixed by the new restriction is 42 cents instead of a minimum price of 25 cents, fixed in the Stevenson Rubber Restriction Act of November 1, 1922, or 17e. a pound higher. One cent a pound advance on rubber imported into the United States in one year means over eight million dollars. It is very easy to figure that Amer ican automobilists have an additional minimum fixed charge on their transportation of \$136,000. 000 per year.

It is unthinkable that Americans will sit idly by and allow a commodity so vital to our welfare, transportation and commerce to be held in the tight grip of a foreign monopoly that tells us how much rubber we may receive and how much we are to pay for it.
