CONCERT

Tuesday evening, March 8th the Treble Clef Club presented to the music lovers of Goldthwaite an unusually attractive concert, by bringing to town Mr. Charles Boggs, bass-cantate, with his all-star trio, consisting of Mr. Boggs, Madame Anita Starrs Gaedcke, violinist, and Miss Dorothy Borchers, pianiste.

Miss Borchers opened the program with her Allegro (Carnival de Vienne) by Shumann, and held her audience enrapt by her charming personality and rare display of technique. Her Chanson d'Amour by Stienfeldt and Romance by Sebilius, also showed her to be an artist of exceptional ability. Miss Borchers graciously responded with two encores, her last being request number (Valse of the Wild Flowers by Carrie Jacob Bond.)

Mr. Boggs' first three numbers, Shipmates O' Mine, Sanderson: To an Evening Star, Wagner; On the Road to Mandalay, Speaks; endeared him to his audience. Seldom is there a singer who gives Wagner with the resonance and legato worthy of the great master. His interpretation of To an Evening Star was matchless in its artistry. His following numbers brought him still nearer the hearts of his audience. The first of Mr. Boggs' encores he dedicated to the men; his Captain Mac was a subtle bit of humor, and his rendition of Obey Speaks' Sylvia was indeed graceful. Mr. Boggs' mellowness of tone, volume, resonance and timbre and unsurpassable English diction, mark him as one of America's outstanding young artists.

Seldom has any artist been given the power to hold her audience spell-bound from the moment of appearance in the manner in which Madame Gaedcke enthralled her audience Tuesday night. She is a woman of fascinating poise and stage appearance. Her ability, dexterity and technique was apparent throughout the seven numbers: Shou Rosmarin, Kreisler; To a Wild Rose, MacDowell; From the Cane Brake, Gardner; Minuette in A-Major, Bocherini Musui.; Fantazia Characterisque, Musui, and Suones' Souvenir and Swanee River.

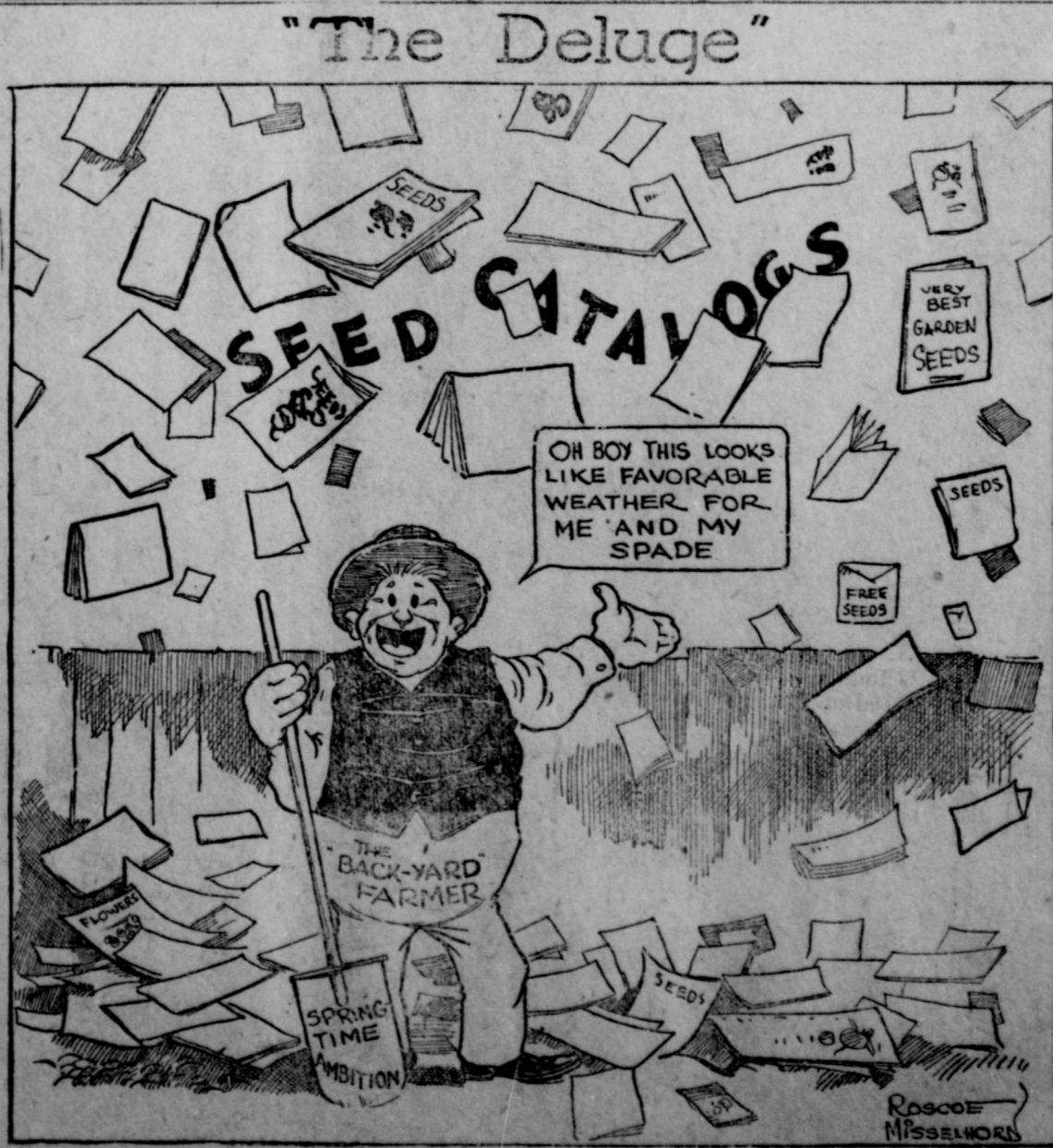

D. A. NEWTON AT TENDS THE N. E. A.

Mr. D. A. Newton, superintendent of our schools, has just returned from the convention of the National Educational Association, held at Dallas. He says: "The meeting of the N. E. A. was one of the greatest and most inspirational assemblies ever held in our country. Its membership was composed of all the educators of the nation. They meet for the purpose of keeping alive national interest in education. These men believe that the largest business of our nation is the training of its boys and girls, and they are giving their time, ability and energy to this work."

"They hope to make the schools of the United States the most efficient in the world."

"During the meeting many able men from the various states in our Union made addresses on school questions of the day. This work was very valuable. Superintendents and teachers received instruction and enthusiasm which will enable them to do their work more efficiently."

All the time, however, Mr. Newton states, was not given to work and study. The members of the convention spent a part of their time in play. Dallas showed her hospitality to her guests by offering them an almost continuous program of entertainment. Some of the things that the visitors enjoyed most were the program given by the Dallas High School Band; the entertainment of Miss S. L. Williams, director of the Choral Club; and the songs of the negro high school Choral Club. This club is made up of six hundred negro boys and girls. They sang many of the old southern songs and charmed their audience. Besides these musical programs, there were banquets and other forms of entertainment to be attended by those who were interested.

The meeting as a whole was as successful as any of its members could have hoped. It proved of great benefit to all who attended. Texas is indeed fortunate to be the place chosen for the calling of such a convention.

PROF. NEWTON TELLS OF NATIONAL EDUCATION ASSOCIATION

Entertainment, Feature of Convention

Last Tuesday morning, during the chapel period, Mr. Newton told us about his trip to Dallas to attend the National Education Association. Judging from his talk, he had a very pleasant and enjoyable trip. This was the first time that the Association has met in the South.

Last Friday morning Mr and Mrs. Newton left Goldthwaite for Dallas. They spent the night in Ft. Worth, and motored to Dallas early Saturday morning. The exhibit opened at one o'clock at Fair Park Exhibit Hall. The Dallas High School Orchestra, composed of the best players in all the Dallas high schools, furnished the music. The first number they played was "America" while the whole exhibit hall of thousands of people stood up. They gave a great demonstration of the patriotic spirit.

There were people there from every corner of America, from the islands and even from foreign countries. It was the greatest meeting of school people that has been held in the South.

After "America" was rendered by the band boys, there was an opening address by the President of the Association from Cincinnati. After that, one of the principals of the schools at Dallas gave a powerful speech.

Sunday, Mr. and Mrs. Newton spent the day with Mrs. Newton's

brother, who lives in Oak Cliff. Sunday afternoon they went to see a practice meeting at one of the auditoriums. It showed that the Dallas children have been trained to be responsive. There was a negro orchestra which was composed of the best musicians in the different Negro High Schools of Dallas. Six hundred negro boys and girls were on the stage. They marched with precision and everyone was in his place. They put on a most wonderful singing-song ever heard. The choir was led by Portia Washington Pittman, who is a daughter of Booker T. Washington. She is the director of music in the Booker T. Washington School in Dallas. The members of that choir were very artistic in their work. They sang old-time melodies and camp-meeting songs to the joy and enthusiasm of the whole audience. This was something new to the Northerners. After these numbers were concluded, Mrs. Pittman was applauded. Then she repeated some of the numbers. This was the beginning of a good program that lasted until twelve o'clock.

Sunday night Mr. and Mrs. Newton went to church where they heard a good sermon.

Monday morning they went to the formal opening of the National Education Association. The formal opening address was made by Governor Dan Moody. According to Mr. Newton, he looked the boy that he is. He is slim, self-controlled, unpretentious, and un-concerned. He walked out like he wasn't in any hurry. He gave the welcome address. At first he began his talk quite-like but later carried his audience with him in a powerful speech.

The Mayor of Dallas, and old man, told the audience a few points in the growth of Dallas. He told them that forty years ago, during the prohibition election, he was a visitor in Dallas. He con-

tinued, "I was struck by the fact that the people were giving more time to the building of the city than to their own businesses. No wonder Dallas is destined to become the biggest city in the world." "For the benefit of the Northerners present," he continued: "I was forty years old before I knew that 'dam yankee' wasn't all one word."

The State Superintendent from Maine replied to this welcome address. He was a tall man, was very dignified, and looked somewhat like Daniel West. He began his talk with, "I want to remind you with a great deal of reverence that I am one of those 'dam yankees' that you've been talking about."

The opening program was greatly enjoyed Monday night. School teachers and directors of school music filed in and sang: "Beautiful Dallas" and some old southern airs.

After this the real work of the meeting began. Instructional addresses by the great educational leaders of the United States were given during the several days. The value of the convention can scarcely be over estimated.

Adiel Wilson, captain of the basketball girls, entertained the team with a party Friday night. As the guests arrived, a small gold bow was pinned on each. After everyone was there, Adiel explained how each person was a rival of the other in trying to keep his bow and get the other fellow's.

As it was a basketball party, the guests played basketball. A strip of gold and black paper was pinned to each side of the room for the goal. Jack Locklear and Billy Stephens chose sides. The teams were placed on each side of

the goal and given a gold balloon for a ball. The players had to blow the balloon from one side to the other. When one side blew the ball against anything, the opposite side made a point. The side that got beat had to put on a one-act comedy play. Jack's team lost and we were entertained by a comedy entitled: "An Old Fashioned School."

Later the guests were given a card with some subject written on it. They were compelled to make a two minute talk on it. Beatrice Hendry won first place on "Dialogue of Grandpa While Taking His First Automobile Ride." Ray Ford spoke on "Why the World Is Round" and received second place. Jack Locklear's "Why I Prefer Blondes" won third place.

After that each person was given another card with a name of one of the other guests on it. Each made rhymes about the characteristics of the person whose name he got.

Many interesting and snappy rhymes were made.

Time was passing quickly, so all were ushered into the dining room and partook of hot chocolate and cake. As soon as everyone was served, the guests became interested in music. They sang some popular songs, and then bade Adiel adieu, hoping that she would not wait so long next time to give a party.

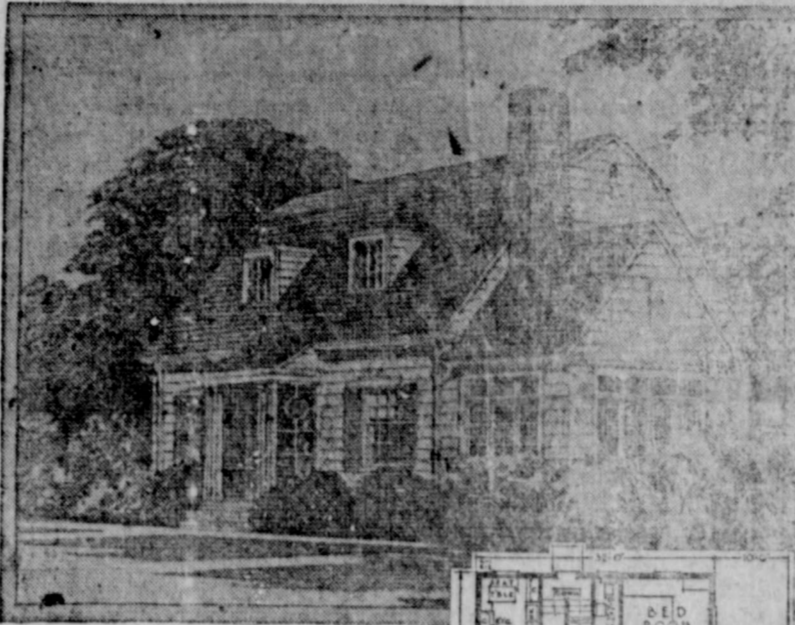

REPRESENTATIVE THOMAS L. BLANTON EXPLAINS

YOU BELIEVE IN FAIR PLAY. Because I have prevented Washington citizens from paying most of their civic expenses out of the U. S. Treasury, and forced them to pay as other citizens do, the press here tries to punish me by never permitting any reference to my work, except that which is degrading, to reach our Texas papers.

Here are the Bloom facts: For years our Committee has sought to pass a reasonable Sunday closing law for wide-open Washington. It is not a "blue law", but permits amusements to open between 2 and 7 P. M., is less drastic than any state now has, but it provides one rest day each week for the hundreds of men and women now employed by Washington theatres, picture shows, dance halls, amusement parks, barber shops and other businesses. Millionaire owners of amusements from big cities have blocked us for years.

With Congress about to adjourn, our Committee wanted to report the bill. We have patiently heard all opposition. Congressman Sol Bloom, an interested millionaire from New York, had been heard for hours. He was not a member of the Committee, yet attended every session, interrupting the Committee, and leading the opposition.

On this morning, the opponents had packed the room with 1,000 propaganda spectators, who loudly applauded every attack on the bill, would interrupt, ridicule and jeer Committeemen who insisted that such hearing should be a proper one. Bloom continually interrupted and insulted the Committee. Both Chairman McLeod and Read of Chicago were against the bill, yet they repeatedly called Bloom to order. Bloom had some buffaloes. A Government Printing Office employee as an opposition witness testified that when he took the oath of allegiance, ending with "So help me God," he crossed his fingers in mental protest, as he didn't believe in any God, and he was loudly applauded. Another Bloom witness posing as a Baptist preacher claimed that he appeared for 11,000 Baptists who against Sunday closing. Not believing him, McLeod, Read, and myself challenged him to prove it, and Bloom again insulted the Committee. I told him that he mustn't let his New York amusement interests cause him to interrupt any more, and he said my statement wasn't true, and started toward me. I caught both his wrists and held him back against the table so he couldn't move. A Sunday Amusement Park owner ran in to attack me and was knocked to the floor. Thus our Committee controlled its own meeting and resumed its hearing. That is all that happened. And that night by a vote of four to two we favorably reported the bill. I don't like fights. I never engage in one unless it is forced upon me. But when it is necessary to fight to perform one's duty, I don't run. If one didn't fight here once in awhile, he wouldn't do very much.
