**Hatching Facilities**

Mills County's hatching facilities have expanded so rapidly in the last two years that we can easily take care of all county business and much from neighboring counties.

Think of it! Equipment to handle 57,500 eggs every three weeks, an average of 2,738 eggs a day. This is enormous and is putting Mills County to the forefront in the poultry business.

This sufficient hatching equipment gets chicks off early enough to bring the best price for fryers. Then, too, chicks can be started off before mites and chiggers arrive.

Many large flocks of chickens and turkeys are being established and the poultry side of diversification is taking the lead.

The week beginning March 28, will be devoted exclusively to Pecan Budding. Assistance will be given to those desiring to improve their groves and who have buds and materials prepared.

Our part in this work will consist only in demonstrations in budding. We do not furnish buds and materials. Neither do we work an entire grove, but put on a few buds to show how it is done.

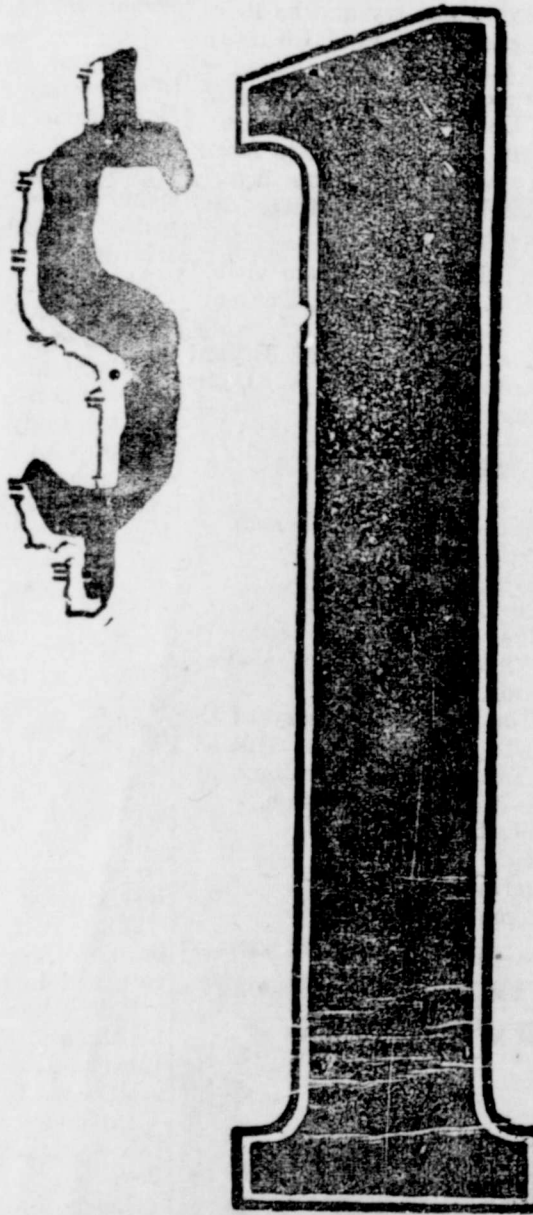

Mrs. Priddy is a very beautiful and lovely young lady, one of the social leaders of Pendleton, where she had lived for many years.

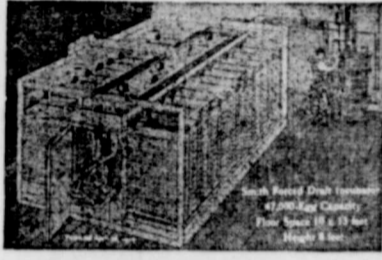

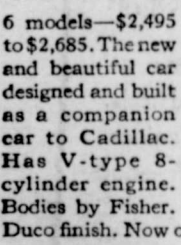
