**TO RURAL PATRONS ON THE FOUR ROUTES OUT OF GOLDTHWAITE**

To The Patrons on Rural Routes:

All boxes except the new ones erected on the new part of route No. 4, are badly in need of repainting, those who have not good supports (posts or other supports) should look after that part and see that good posts are at once provided. Your boxes should be erected on the right hand side of the road facing the direction travelled by the carrier, and the name of the box owner must be plainly printed on the side of box facing direction approached by the carrier. These are requirements that must have attention.

Boxes should be painted white and names should be in black lettering.

When boxes are well erected with both box and post painted white, and names neatly lettered in black it appears that patrons appreciate the government service and gives a cheerful aspect of thrift and appreciation along the route where they are erected.

The following are the requirements: All boxes must be erected on the right hand side of the road; must bear the name of the holder plainly lettered in letters not less than one inch in height; must be so erected that carrier can serve them without leaving his vehicle, anything more than of painting, neatness and tidiness will emphasize your appreciation of the service in a way that will make both department and carriers as well as your serving postmaster feel that they are all in a work that is really worthwhile.

What do you suppose your government pays out annually in order to have your daily papers, letters and parcels delivered at your door each week during the year? Ten thousand, five hundred dollars is in round numbers what it costs. Stamp sales by these carriers will not exceed in aggregate more than \$800.00 per year, leaving a deficit at this office on account of the services on the four routes of \$9,700.00 in round numbers. In other words the government is contributing that much alone at this office, over and above all returns from the sale of stamps that the farmer communities which these routes serve may have their mail daily. Certainly the neat erection of nicely painted boxes and posts would be a small contribution on the part of the patron for the expensive service the government is giving him. I hope each patron whose box does not meet all these requirements will at once put it in order without being served with the required official notice to do so. Notices must necessarily follow if the required corrections are not made very soon.

All whose names are not properly lettered on their boxes; whose boxes are not properly erected on right-hand side of the road and made easily accessible to carrier during all kinds of weather, must comply without delay.

This is a regulation required.

**SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON**

**PETER'S LESSON IN TRUST**

Matthew 14: 22-33

**GOLDEN TEXT**—Be of good cheer, it is I; be not afraid. Matthew 14: 27.

**Lesson Survey and Setting**

After feeding the five thousand late one spring afternoon, Jesus dispersed the multitude, sending the disciples away by boat. Then he ascended the mountain to spend the night in prayer. But to the distressed disciples who were struggling with the storm in mid-sea, he went, walking on the water, about 3 A. M., and taught Peter a graphic lesson in trust.

**Lesson Text and Outline**

**I. THE MASTER ON THE MOUNTAIN.**

22 And straightway he constrained the disciples to enter into the boat, and to go before him unto the other side, till he should send the multitude away. 23 And after he had sent the multitudes away, he went up into the mountain apart to pray: and when even was come, he was there alone.

**II. THE DISCIPLES AT SEA.**

24 But the boat was now in the midst of the sea, distressed by the waves; for the wind was contrary. 25 And in the fourth watch of the night he came unto them, walking on the sea. 26 And when the disciples saw him walking on the sea, they were troubled, saying, It is a ghost; and they cried out in fear.

**III. THE WALKING ON THE WATER.**

27 But straightway Jesus spake unto them, saying, Be of good cheer, it is I; be not afraid. 28 And Peter answered him and said, Lord if it be thou, bid me come unto thee upon the waters. 29 And he said, Come. And Peter went down from the boat, and walked upon the waters to come to Jesus. 30 But when he saw the wind, he was afraid; and beginning to sink, he cried out, saying, Lord, save me. 31 And immediately Jesus stretched forth his hand, and took hold of him, and saith unto him, O thou of little faith, wherefore didst thou doubt?

**IV. THE SCENE ON THE SHIP.**

32 And when they had gone up into the boat, the wind ceased. 33 And they that were in the boat worshipped him, saying, Of a truth, thou art the Son of God.

**Notes Analytical and Expository**

**1. THE OBJECT OF TRUST** is Jesus. (1) He is the constraining Christ. Even against their will, he sent the disciples away by boat so that he could have the solitariness for which he had come across the sea. (2) He is the beneficent Christ. After he had miraculously supplied the multitude with food, he dismissed them for the night to the nearby towns and villages. (3) He is the praying Christ. Left alone in the evening twilight, he penetrated the deeper solitudes in order to pray. How sweet to his wearied soul were those calm hours on the mountain top in communion with the Father!

**2. THE NEED OF TRUST** is shown in the experience of the disciples that night. (1) They encountered one of those sudden storms that sweep down the northern mountains upon the Galilean lake. Their boat was tortured with the waves. The contrary winds carried them out of their course, and far past midnight they were bending every effort to reach the shore they had left. Will no helper come to the rescue? (2) They thought Jesus a specter when he came to them walking on the water. Sea-treading had never been known before; and they thought they were escaping the storms only to fall into the hands of a spirit. Hence they cried out in consternation. Who can calm their souls and the sea?

**3. THE STRUGGLE OF TRUST** was graphic and heroic.

(1) The self-revelation of Jesus was instant and electric. Were words for the fearful ever more welcome? And how quickly tempestuous fears were stilled! (2) The proposal of Peter showed the complete change of feeling. But it was impetuous; the faith it showed was tinged with forwardness, presumption, self-confidence; and it was accepted by

Jesus in order to teach a lesson in trust. Peter left his boat and started to go to Jesus. For a few steps he succeeded admirably, but the boisterous waves caught away his attention from the Master, fear seized his soul, and he began to sink down into the depths. (3) The prayer of Peter at this critical moment was short, intense, earnest, believing, successful. (4) The answer of Jesus was first an act and then a word: he laid hold of Peter and saved him from being submerged; then he reproved the doubt that opened the jaws of the deep. But it is to Peter's credit that he could trust the Savior if not the stormy sea.

**4. THE TRIUMPH OF TRUST** appeared aboard the boat (1) The rescue of Peter and the arrival of Jesus with him on board the vessel came at the same moment that the wind ceased and the seething waters fell back to their level. (2) The conclusion of all was that Jesus is the Son of God. He had brought them safety, calmed their anxiety, aroused their faith, accepted their worship. Omnipotent power was linked with infinite mercy.

**The Lesson of the Lesson**

**Trust in God**

(1) Trust Obediently.—They wanted to stay with the miracle worker. He wanted them to go so that he could privately pray. They obeyed because they trusted.

(2) Trust Steadfastly.—When the disciples encountered the storm did they lose faith in the Master? On the contrary they must have deeply longed for him who before had stilled the storm. Who else can we trust in the time of tempest?

(3) Trust Expectantly.—The winds were adverse and the boat buffeted, but the mariners did not lose hope. Did they expect that somehow the great helper would reach and rescue them? They were alarmed when he came because he did not come the way they thought.

(4) Trust Bravely.—On the boat "they cried out in fear." On the water he shouted, "Be not afraid!" Courage was needed then. It is needed now.

(5) Trust Cheerfully.—"Be of good cheer!" Can we smile in the storm? Certainly, if Christ is with

us and says the word. It is doubt that brings despair. Faith is cheerful.

(6) Trust Humbly.—Peter overdid his faith that night. He strained it to the snapping point. Presumption is perilous. Self-confidence can but sink in the storm.

(7) Trust Incessantly.—Seeing the snarling sea instead of the Savior, Peter began to sink. Keep "your eyes upon Jesus." When trust falters, then we fail.

(8) Trust Believingly.—"O thou of little faith!" Straight to

faith where'er thy bark is driven!"

(9) Trust Triumphantly.—Into the boat again came the Master and disciple. The storm subsided. It was the triumph of trust. "Faith is the victory."

(10) Trust Gratefully.—See the voyagers, now afloat on a calm sea, fall at Jesus' feet in reverent worship and heartfelt gratitude! Trust and thank!
