**SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON**

By Hight C. Moore

APRIL 24, 1927.

**PETER AT THE TRANSFIGURATION**

Mark 9: 2-11 Peter 1: 16-18

**GOLDEN TEXT**—There came a voice out of the cloud. This is my beloved Son: hear ye him. Mark 9:7.

**Lesson Setting and Survey**

The transfiguration occurred a week after Peter's great confession. It was on one of the lofty, perhaps snow-capped spurs of Mount Hermon. Jesus, accompanied by Peter, James, and John, had sealed the summit for a season of prayer. But as he prayed he was irradiated with glory supernatural which the disciples were forbidden to report until after the ascension. Then they were at liberty to tell what they had seen as Peter did in a glowing paragraph of his second epistle.

**Lesson Text and Outline**

**I. THE ASCENT OF THE MOUNTAIN (Mark 9).**

2 And after six days Jesus taketh with him Peter, James and John, and bringeth them up into a high mountain apart by themselves.

**II. THE SCENE ON THE MOUNTAIN (Mark 9).**

And he was transfigured before them: 3 and his garments became glistening, exceedingly white, so as no fuller on earth can whiten them. 4 And there appeared unto them Elijah with Moses: and they were talking with Jesus. 5 And Peter answereth and saith to Jesus, Rabbi, it is good for us to be here: and let us make three tabernacles; one for thee, and one for Moses, and one for Elijah. 6 For he knew not what to answer; for they became sore afraid. 7 And there came a cloud overshadowing them: and there came a voice out of the cloud. This is my beloved Son: hear ye him. 8 And suddenly looking round about, they saw no one any more save Jesus only with themselves.

**III. THE DESCENT FROM THE MOUNTAIN (Mark 9).**

9 And as they were coming down from the mountain, he charged them that they should tell no man what things they had seen, save when the Son of man should have risen again from the dead. 10 And they kept the saying, questioning among themselves what the rising from the dead should mean.

**IV. THE MEMORY OF THE MOUNTAIN (2 Peter 1).**

16 For we did not follow cunningly devised fables, when we made known unto you the power and coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, but we were eyewitnesses of his majesty. 17 For he received from God the Father honor and glory, when there was borne such a voice to him by the Majestic Glory. This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased: 18 and this voice we ourselves heard borne out of heaven, we were with him in the holy mount.

**Notes Analytical and Expository**

**1. THE GLORY SUMMIT** was sealed. The party consisted of Jesus and that inner trio of disciples who alone witness the resurrection of the ruler's daughter and the agony in Gethsemane. They began the ascent late one afternoon and it must have been far in the night when they reached the top. The trip was tiresome though the air was invigorating. But the journey was more than a side-trip on the northward tour. The object of the climb was worship. The ascent carried them to the place of prayer.

**2. THE GLORY SCENE** was sublime. As Jesus was praying he was transfigured. His facial glory outshone that of Moses at Sinai, or Steven at his martyrdom. His raiment was illuminated with the intense splendor of his person. His recognized heavenly visitants were Moses and Elijah, two outstanding men of the old dispensation, representing the law of the prophets, respectively. The one theme of conversation with the celestial callers was his approaching death at Jerusalem; and doubtless his spirit was strengthened for the ordeal. The tired and drowsy disciples, aroused to com-

plete alertness, saw their irradiated Lord and his shining companions. Could not the vanishing visitants be detained? Why not tabernacle on the mountain top? But Peter knew not the meaning of his words and hence there was no answer. Then came the overshadowing cloud filling them with awe, and out of the radiant cloud-bank rang the Father's voice, heard before at the baptism and heard later on the eve of crucifixion, identifying Christ as the Son of God. Then the glory disappeared and the reassured disciples, arising from their prostrate position, found Jesus alone with themselves.

**3. THE GLORY SILENCE** was singular. And yet there was a good reason for it. Of course the elated witnesses intended immediately to inform their comrades of the glorious event of the night. But Jesus forbade them because they could not report the transfiguration with proper accuracy and emphasis until after the resurrection; and before that time the public would brand it as false.

**4. THE GLORY SIGHT** was ineffaceable. Many years afterward Peter wrote of it to the believers in distant lands and coming ages. He had not fashioned cleverly or followed blindly any fables or fancies concerning the Redeemer. He had told the simple story of the Coming of Christ. He had made known the power of Christ. He had personally witnessed the majesty of Christ. With his own eyes he had witnessed the irradiated form of Jesus in the holy mount of transfiguration. With his own ears he had heard the voice of the Father identifying Jesus as the Son beloved and approving his mission to earth. And now with faithful pen and fervent tongue he proclaimed the Majestic Glory he beheld when he was with the Master in the mount. Never could the sight celestial fade from his memory.

**The Lesson of the Lesson**

Glorify the Christ of Glory

**(1) The Glory of Personality**—Jesus himself was the central fulfillment on that night of nights. The glory of the mountain was the glory of his presence.

**(2) The Glory of Position**—He was teacher and leader of his dis-

ciples. He was companion of Moses and Elijah. He was the attested Son of God. Who stands higher than he?

**(3) The Glory of Prayer**—He went up into the mountain to pray. And it was while he prayed that he was transfigured. The mount of prayer is the mount of God.

**(4) The Glory of Appearance**—Jesus glowed with heavenly fulfillment. His face shone as the sun. His raiment was irradiated with light supernal. The halo circles him ever.

**(5) The Glory of Association**—The greatest of the past stepped into his presence from the spirit world. Higher stood he than Moses and Elijah who saw in his death, about which they talked, the fulfillment of the law and the prophets.

**(6) The Glory of Sacrifice**—Suffering attracts. Vicarious suffering is the mightiest of magnets. Jesus made the supreme sacrifice which draws unto him all men. From Mount Hermon he saw Mount Calvary.

**(7) The Glory of Achievement**—By his life Jesus achieved more than any other of earth's great. But by his death he accomplished infinitely more than by his life. The atonement was the achievement unparalleled and sublime.

**(8) The Glory of Acceptation**—See the three disciples prostrate before him there on the mountain top. Let all the world fall at his feet in reverential awe and worship.

**(9) The Glory of Attestation**—Hear the Father's voice from the light cloud identifying and commending Jesus as his Son. Then hear and heed the Son day by day for aye!

**(10) The Glory of Proclamation**—With sealed lips Jesus and the three descended to their comrades in the valley. But after the dark of Calvary, and the light of Olivet, the glory of Hermon shone forth and shines today throughout the world.






