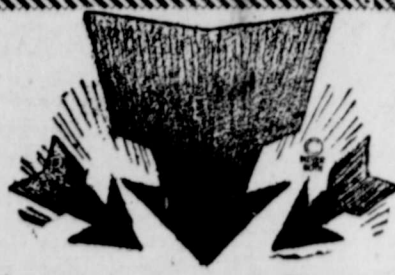

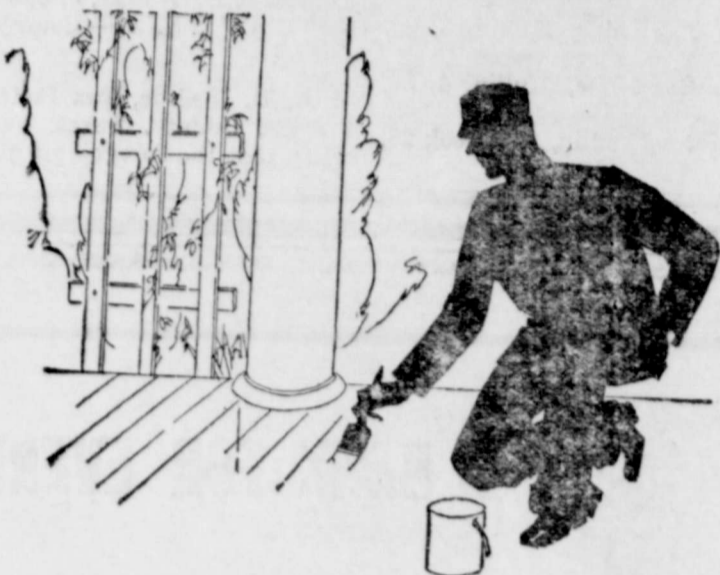

FROM H. C. EZZELL IN
"SUNNY CALIFORNIA"

Ventura, California.
June 22, 1927.

Dear Goldthwaite Eagle: With your permission I will write a short letter for publication as I cannot write all my Mills County friends a personal letter.

I arrived in Los Angeles Saturday, at 8:15 A. M., came to Ventura by stage. Arrived here at 12:30 P. M. Ventura is located 70 miles west of Los Angeles with mountains on one side and the Pacific Ocean on the other. It has a population of about 20,000 inhabitants.

Well as I said, I arrived here at 12:30 P. M. and as Ernest works from 8 A. M. to 4:00 P. M., as soon as he came in the first thing was to take a drive. We drove to the top of a mountain which is 500 feet high and overlooking the city and the great Pacific Ocean. From this point I viewed some of the beauties of God's creation, but the Devil's possession. We then came down and drove along the beach where I saw a boat 500 yards from the loading oil. They lay pipes under the water and pump the oil to the boat through these pipes. The capacity of the boat is 85 thousand barrels. A boat of this size could not come near the shore on account of the shallow water.

We went from the shore to the mountains four miles distant where we saw the refineries and some of the best producing wells are at the top of the mountains three and four hundred feet high. The wells on the average are about 6500 feet deep. We got home about 10 o'clock. I thought I had seen enough for one short evening.

Sunday morning I diked up in my "togs" and started for church. I found almost all the different churches. I attended services at the First Christian Church (I thought that would be second best). They have a nice building, costing about fifty-six thousand dollars. As soon as I entered the building a lady came forward and pinned a flower on the lapel of my coat. I turned pink, but finally recovered enough to stammer "I thank you".

Well, Sunday afternoon we drove about forty miles to some inland towns where the rich people have their summer resorts, the climate being much better there than near the coast. On the trip

I saw some fine orchards, the principle ones being English Walnuts, oranges and lemons. I saw quite a lot of date palms and plenty of the kind of the seventy palms where Moses camped with the children of Israel.

The row crops are nearly altogether beans, mostly linas, but some pink beans. On this trip I also saw some chicken yards that cost from \$1000.00 to \$50,000.00 per acre. They are all small yards so far as area is concerned, an acre and a half being considered a good sized ranch. I learned that they keep from 2000 to 2500 hens to the acre. I remarked to one of the men that their chickens never had enough range. He laughed at my ignorance, and said that they had nice houses for their chickens. The rest is fenced and cross fenced with poultry wire. They buy all their feed. If they can make money with chickens on \$5000 dollar land per acre where they have to buy their feed, why can't we get rich with chickens where we can have 160 acres for less money and can raise our own feed. The answer is because we don't know how. While eggs sell in Texas for 15 cents per dozen, they sell here for 25 cents. When fryers here sell for 35 cents they sell in Texas for 25 cents or not so much. It is all in knowing how to do a thing.

Well that takes me up to Sunday night. Monday I stayed at home and read and rested. Tuesday Ernest got a day off and we started early and went first to Hollywood. You have heard so much about Hollywood, but I want to say a word about it. We drove down through Broadway, which is said to be the busiest street in the world. Ernest did the driving while I sit in the car with my mouth and eyes open expecting to be dashed into Eternity at any moment. However, I was

able to read some of the signs as we sped along. One of them read like this, "Speed on, big boy, hell isn't half full." We visited San Pedro, as well as Long Beach. I will not dwell in San Pedro and Long Beach as the good Editor may not want to waste too much space. I will only mention one more place then I will close.

I visited the old museum here. It was built in the year 1782. They have quite a lot of things of interest in the old building. There is a flower that they call the Breath of Heaven. Of course I took a good whiff of it for fear it would be my last chance of ever feeling, seeing or smelling the Breath of Heaven here or here later. Well I must close.

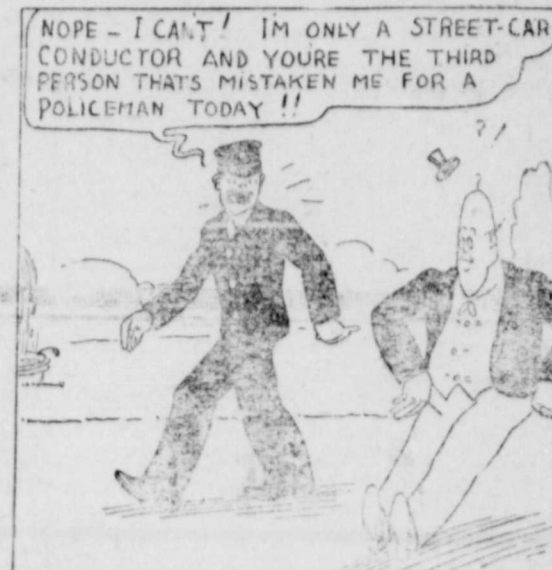
