TEXAS' FIRST CHEESE FACTORY LOCATED AT GOLDTHWAITE; WORK ON PLANT START AT ONCE

Ground is Broken for the First Cheese and Butter Factory to be Operated in Texas

MILLS COUNTY TAKES A BIG STEP FORWARD

Officials of the Texas Cheese and Butter Company, general headquarters at Fort Worth, were in Goldthwaite Monday to start operations necessary for a cheese factory at this place.

At 11:30 last Monday morning a representative bunch of Goldthwaite business men and others met at the site and ground was broken by Mayor H. G. Bodkin.

Located in Southeastern Portion of Town

Goldthwaite's Cheese factory has been located on the vacant land across the street and southeast from the stockpens. At a special meeting of the city council the land—which had been in the possession of the city since the waterworks were first established—was donated for this worthy cause.

Contract Has Been Let

The contract for erecting the building and installing machinery for the cheese factory has been let and work will begin the early part of next week.

Ready in Forty to Sixty Days

Forty to sixty days will see the cheese factory in operation, according to Mr. Murphy. This is the first unit of contemplated cheese factories over Texas and will be the criterion for the other units.

Will Make Cheese Here

The cheese factory being installed will perform all the operations necessary for the making of common cheese—except the curing process which requires 90 days and will be done at a central storage plant at Brownwood.

Fancy cheese will also be made by this company at their central plants.

W. C. Dew Responsible for the Securing of Factory

To W. C. Dew, president of the Trent State Bank, should go the credit for securing a factory in Goldthwaite. Representatives of the Texas Cheese and Butter Co., who were trying to organize here, were making practically no headway when Mr. Dew—after having become convinced of the merit of the idea, got behind it and "put it over."

May be Worth Millions to Mills County

Should this cheese factory any way near fulfill the expectations of the originators of the idea, it will be worth millions of dollars to the stock-farmers of Mills county during the years to come and may be the cause of converting

This county into a mammoth dairy farm, with a herd of from 20 to fifty good milch cows on every farm.

60c for Butter Fat

Mr. Murphy stated that this company would open up with a price of sixty cents per pound for butter fat. This means from 25 to 30 cents per gallon for sweet milk or from 75 to 90c per day for a common three-gallon cow. At that figure a herd of twenty cows will bring in a gross income of from \$450.00 to \$550.00 per month or a net income of \$300 or better. These figures, however, do not take into consideration accidents, etc., and are figuring on a sixty-cent basis.

Diversification the Keynote

When this factory is in operation one more step on the road to diversification will have been made by Mills county farmers. This county is forced out of the cotton business—as a major crop—and the success being made by those who turn their attention to sheep, goats, cattle, chickens and turkeys with a small fraction of the killing work necessary to the cultivation and harvesting of cotton, has proven the adaptability of this county to the many-crop idea.

Just a tip—good milch cows will bring a good price soon—don't sell too cheap.

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

By Hight C. Moore

SUNDAY, AUGUST 14, 1927.
DAVID BRINGS THE ARK TO JERUSALEM

GOLDEN TEXT—We shall be satisfied with the goodness of thy house, thy holy temple. Psalm 65. 4.

Lesson Setting and Survey

The story of David from his second sparing of Saul to his enthronement as king of Judah and Israel is told in ten chapters (the last five of 1 Samuel and the first five of 2 Samuel), and comes within the period of a decade. During this period David resided in three different cities—Ziklag, Hebron, and Jerusalem. He took three steps upward to the throne; in the first he was an exile; in the second he was king of Judah; and in the third he was king of Judah and Israel.

Lesson Text and Outline

I. ANOINTED KING OVER JUDAH (2 Sam. 2).

3. And his men that were with him did David bring up, every man with his household; and they dwelt in the cities of Hebron. 4. And the men of Judah came, and there they anointed David king over the house of Judah. And they told David, saying, The men of Jabesh-Gilead were they that buried Saul.

II. ANOINTED KING OVER ISRAEL (2 Sam. 5).

Then came all the tribes of Israel to David unto Hebron, and spake, saying, Behold, we are thy bone and thy flesh. 2. In times past when Saul was king over us, it was thou that leddest out and broughtest in Israel; and Jehovah said to thee, Thou shalt be shepherd of my people Israel, and thou shalt be prince over Israel. 3. So all the elders of Israel came to the king to Hebron; and David made a covenant with them in Hebron before Jehovah; and they anointed David king over Israel.

III. ACKNOWLEDGED LEADER IN RELIGION (2 Sam. 6).

12. And it was told king David, saying, Jehovah has blessed the house of Obed-edom, and all that pertaineth unto him, because of the ark of God. And David went and brought up the ark of God from the house of Adeb-edom into the city of David with joy. 13. And it was so, that, when they that bare the ark of Jehovah and gone six paces, he sacrificed an ox and a fatling. 14. And David danced before Jehovah with all his might; and David was girded with a linen ephod. 15. So David and all the house of Israel brought up the ark of Jehovah with shouting, and with the sound of the trumpet.

Notes Analytical and Expository

1. THE PROVINCIAL CAPITAL was Hebron where David spent seven years and six months as king of Judah. At Ziklag, a city of Philistia, he spent one year and four months, a fugitive from the wrath of Saul. After the death of Saul and his sons in the battle of Gilboa, David inquired of the Lord, doubtless through Abiathar, the priest, as to whether he should move back to the land of Israel. The divine directions were clear; he must return and the place of settlement must be Hebron. Thither he went and about him at once gathered the men of Israel to make him their king. He accepted the honor and responsibility and at once entered upon his duty. One of his first

acts was to send special messengers to the men of Gabesh-Gilead, east of the Jordan, to express his appreciation of their courage and patriotism in rescuing from the Philistines the mutilated bodies of and his sons and giving them a decent burial. The further intelligence was borne to them that David was now king of Judah. After Saul's death, his son Ishbosheth was made king and his capital was established at Mahanaim, east of the Jordan. Conflict between Judah and the other tribes arose, but the battle of Gibeon was decisive in David's favor. General Abner, of the northern kingdom, formed a league with David at Hebron, but was foully murdered by General Boab, of the southern kingdom, in revenge for the killing of his brother Asabel. With his great general gone, King Ishbosheth became increasingly unpopular and finally he was assassinated.

2. THE NATIONAL CAPITAL was Jerusalem where David dwelt thirty-three years as king of Judah and Israel. Long and patiently he had waited for the fullness of time when without a stain upon character or reputation he could wear the crown. At last he came into his own. Out of all the tribes of Israel now came to David at Hebron messengers and soldiers declaring that he was their kinsman, that during the reign of Saul he had led them out and brought them in, and that Jehovah had clearly designated him as real. The compact was made, the shepherd and captain over Israel, and David was duly anointed king. David saw that for the united kingdom he must make his capital more nearly in the center of the country. He therefore determined to capture the famous fortress of the Jebusites. Though they felt it could be defended against any invader, even by the lame and blind, David soon reduced it and made it capital of his kingdom. The royal palace was soon built and became the center of a brilliant court life. The Philistines declared war against David, but the battle of Rephaim was a disastrous experience for them. Thus David grew steadily in power among his own people and over the peoples round about him.

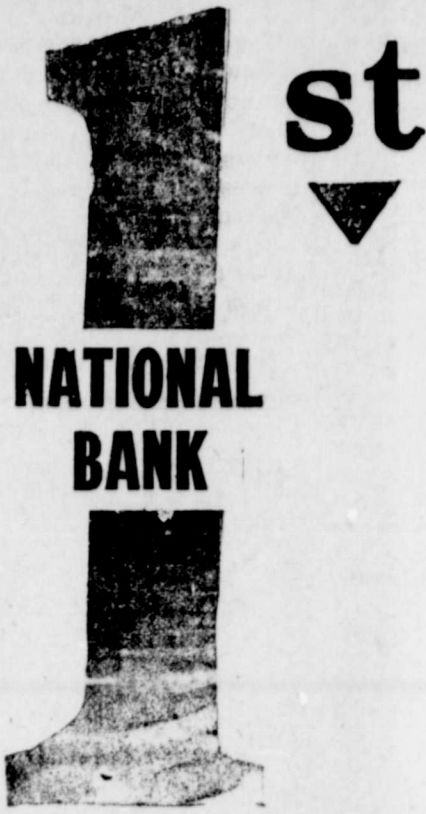
3. THE RELIGIOUS CAPITAL was also Jerusalem where divine worship was formerly established with the upbringing of the ark from the house of Obed-edom, where it had remained for three months. During this time Obed-edom was the recipient of the manifest favor of God. When David heard that the house of Obed-edom was being blessed because of the ark's presence in it, he decided to fetch the ark up to the capital. This time the king seems to have gone in a more reverential and obedient spirit than formerly. At any rate, we now see the ark being carried by the Levites instead of being drawn by oxen. And the Levites were not permitted to move more than a half dozen steps with the ark before the king offered sacrifice to the Lord. 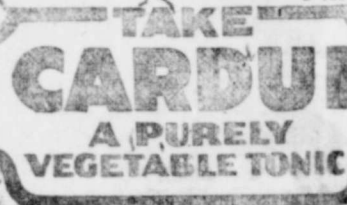

LITTLE BLACK BOX DEPENDS ON DRIVER FOR PROPER CARE

The little black battery box, hidden away beneath the floor boards has no meters or gauges conveniently located to warn careless drivers that it needs attention, and it does need attention, and that frequently.

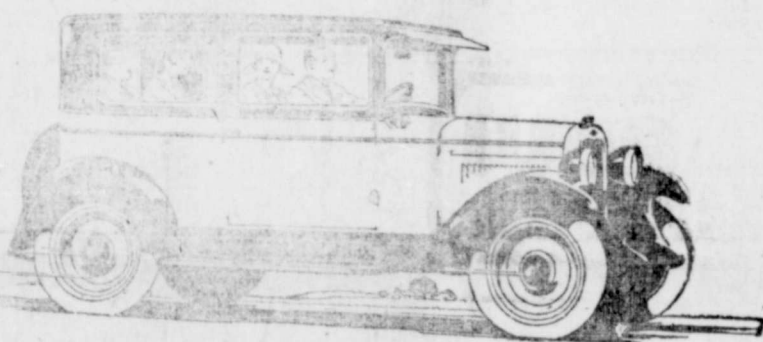

ON HEALTH Subjects Edited by

THIS column will be given to discussion of matters pertaining to public health. Any questions regarding public health administration, prevention of diseases, child care, sanitation, etc. will be answered in succeeding issues of this paper. Answers

1. Typhoid germs always enter the body through the mouth, the principal agencies of transmission of this disease being polluted water, milk or other food, flies and fingers. The germs are present in the excreta from the body of persons suffering from typhoid or persons who are typhoid carriers. This filth gets into the body of a well person through the mouth, by the agencies mentioned.
2. Typhoid can be prevented by vaccination; by safe disposal of human excreta; by safe water and milk supplies and by fly eradication. Everyone should keep his fingers out of his mouth, and wash his hands well before eating.
3. Diseased tonsils are often the source of systematic diseases arising from local infection, such as rheumatism, heart disease, Saint Vitus' Dance, and malnutrition.
4. A health examination is a thorough physical "going over" by a physician with a view of determining of the body is in first class condition. By this, an incipient disease can be detected, which may be stopped before it gets a serious hold on the body. A physical examination should be had by each person, preferably on one's birthday.
5. Vitamins are divided into five classes, A, B, C, D, and E. The most commonly used food in which these vitamins are found are: Vitamin A, especially needed by children, promotes growth, produces good teeth and straight bones, and is found in butter fat, egg yolk, leafy vegetables, and cod liver oil. Vitamin B, which increases the appetite and bodily functions, is found in vegetables, fruits, whole grain cereals, and glandular organs of animals, such as liver, sweetbreads, etc. Vitamin C, the absence of which causes scurvy, is found in fresh raw foods such as fruits, tomatoes, cabbage and lettuce; this Vitamin is destroyed by heat. Vitamin D, which prevents rickets, is supplied by cod liver oil, butter fat and egg yolks. Vitamin E is one of the late discoveries, and experiments have shown that healthy rats deprived of Vitamin in their food, are sterile.
6. Pasteurization kills any disease germs which may be in milk. Milk should be fresh and of a safe quality when Pasteurized.
7. Good health of parents and other members of the family; good living conditions, with cleanliness and plenty of fresh air and sunshine; proper food; sleep and rest; play and exercise; health training; medical and dental supervision.
8. Ground or "toe itch", is the beginning stage of hookworm. The tiny larvae bore into the skin

which causes the itch and eruption. These larvae are only active when in wet or damp ground, the infection of barefoot children occurring following a rain or in the early morning dew. Children should be protected from infection by being required to wear shoes until ground is dry.

10. High blood pressure is not a disease, but an indication that something is wrong physically. What it is can only be determined by a physician.

DUMPING GROUND LAW TO BE ENFORCED

Chapter 53 S. B. No. 103
Section 1. That no municipal corporation, private corporation, partnership joint stock association, syndicate, voluntary association or person shall use or maintain any dumping ground or dump any trash, refuse or debris or dead animals or permit the same to remain within nearer than three hundred yards of any public highway of the State of Texas; that no person, firm or corpora-

tion, as above named, shall dump or deposit any rubbish, trash, refuse or dead animals within or nearer than three hundred yards of any public highway whether said land belongs to such person, firm or corporation or not; provided, however, that the provisions of this Act shall not affect farmers in the handling of anything necessary in the growing or handling and care of livestock, or the erection, operation and maintenance of any and all such improvements that may be necessary in the handling, threshing and preparation of any and all agricultural products.

Section 2. Any violation of this Act by any person, firm or corporation shall subject the offender to a fine of not less than Ten Dollars nor more than Two Hundred Dollars, and each day of such violation shall be a separate offense. In event of any threatened or probable violation of this Act by any public corporation, municipal, city, town or village and injunction suit may be brought to prevent any such threatened or probable violation by the County or District Attorney, or by any private individual affected or to be affected by such threatened or probable violation. The enforcement of the remedy by Injunction as herein provided shall not prevent the enforcement of the other penalties provided in this Act.
