**LABOR DAY CELEBRATION**

Plans for the most elaborate celebration ever staged in Galveston have been completed. The various features include International Life Boat Race, staged in Gulf parallel with Boulevard and Seawall, in which more than a score of fully equipped life boats from ships of all nations will compete for \$350.00 in prizes and valuable silver trophy to be presented to Captain of ship that furnishes the winning crew. This will be the first attempt at similar race ever staged in this section.

Another feature will be a complete demonstration by United States Coast Guard Service, under Captain George E. Phillips, that will include of crew of ship aground off shore, by means of shooting a life line and attaching breeches buoy, rocket display, showing various distress signals, capsizing boat drill and a thorough demonstration by the coast guard crew of their various methods of saving life and property.

Also, an aquatic program that will include fifteen mile swimming Marathon in Gulf for Gulf Coast Championship, in which swimmers start from a dozen states will compete.

Local Labor Council have plans for celebration of the day that include demonstrations in Public Parks, free Barbecue, Band Concerts, etc.

To care for the large crowd expected the Beach Association will compile lists of rooms and apartments that will be available for the period of the celebration.



**SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON**

By Hight C. Moore

SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 4

**SOLOMON'S WISE CHOICE**

**GOLDEN TEXT**—Happy is the man that findeth wisdom, And the man that getteth understanding. Proverbs 3:13.

**Lesson Setting and Survey**

Solomon became the wisest man of his age and of all ages because in early life he sought wisdom as the highest goal and essential usefulness. He felt that he needed wisdom in international relations, since Palestine was situated on a direct route between the rival kingdoms on the Euphrates and the Nile. He needed wisdom in the conduct of the nation's affairs and carrying out his architectural program, including the erection of the Temple, the palace, and the city wall. He needed wisdom to keep himself right at heart and upright in life.

**a Lesson Text and Outline**

**1. THE CHOICE OF SOLOMON.**

4 And the king went to Gibeon to sacrifice there; for that was the great high place: a thousand burnt offerings did Solomon offer upon that altar. 5 In Gibeon Jehovah appeared to Solomon in a dream by night; and God said, Ask what I shall give thee. 6 And Solomon said, Thou hast showed unto thy servant David my father lovingkindness, according as he walked before thee in truth, and in righteousness, and uprightness of heart with thee; and thou hast kept for him this great loving-kindness, that thou hast given him a son to sit on his throne, as it is this day. 7 And now, O Jehovah thy God, thou hast made me thy servant instead of David my father; and I am but a little child; I know not how to come out or go in. 8 And thy servant is in the midst of thy people which thou hast chosen, a great people, that cannot be numbered nor counted for multitude. 9 Give thy servant, therefore, and understanding heart to judge thy people, that I may discern between good and evil; for who is able to judge this thy great people?

**II. THE ANSWER OF JEHOVAH.**

10 And the speech pleased the Lord, that Solomon had asked this thing. 11 And God said unto him, Because thou hast asked this thing, and hast not asked for thyself long life, neither hast asked riches for thyself, nor hast asked the life of thine enemies, but hast asked for thyself understanding to discern justice; 12 behold I have done according to thy word: lo, I have given thee a wise and understanding heart; so that there hath been none like thee before thee, neither after thee shall any arise like unto thee. 13 And I have also given thee that which thou hast not asked, both riches and honor, so that there shall not be any among the kings like unto thee, all thy days. 14 And if thy will walk in my ways, to keep my statutes and my commandments, as thy father David did walk, then I will lengthen thy days. 15 And Solomon awoke; and, behold, it was a dream: and he came to Jerusalem, and stood before the ark of the covenant of Jehovah, and offered burnt-offerings, and offered peace-offerings, and made a feast to all his servants.

**Notes Analytical and Expository**

**1. THE PRAYER FOR WISDOM** was earnestly and effectually made. At Gibeon, the "great high place" where the Mosaic tabernacle stood, Solomon assembled the people from all parts of the country with a view of their unification before the altar of Jehovah. With unprecedented liberality and devotion he offered a thousand burnt-offerings upon that altar. The people and the occasion were suitable for the scene that followed. And to Solomon aglow with religious fervor, Jehovah appeared in a dream by night with the proposition: "Ask what I shall give thee." The fineness of fiber in Solomon's nature had appeared. He did not ask for material blessings but yearned for those spiritual qualities which would capacitate him for the greatest possible service. In his prayer he acknowledged the mercy of God to his father David; confessed himself though on the throne but a little child, knowing

not how to go out and come in as king in his father's stead; and he declared that the task before him was herculean as the monarch of a mighty people. Hence he prayed with all his heart in fervent words for wisdom rightly to judge the people as a true and faithful ruler.

**2. THE PROMISE OF WISDOM** was immediately and heartily given. Jehovah was pleased with the prayer of Solomon—pleased that he did not ask for himself lengthened days or great riches or the life of his enemies, but had asked for "understanding to discern justice." Therefore, the request was granted so that Solomon should be wiser than any predecessor. Not only so; but he should have riches and honor surpassing any of the kings of his time. Moreover he should have long life if he would walk in the ways of the Lord and keep the divine statutes as David his father did. Thus fully and gloriously was Solomon's prayer answered. When he awoke he realized that a life impetus had been given him. Ever thereafter he would be under the spell of that night scene at Gibeon. No sooner, therefore, had he returned to Jerusalem, his capital, than he made religion the central feature of his reign.

It had been twenty years since this family had been together and every one enjoyed the company of one another, especially the brothers and sisters, who had been separated for quite awhile.

In the afternoon everyone enjoyed a nice cool swim, and as it began to grow late we all departed for our various homes, wishing good times like this would happen more often.

Those enjoying this get-together meeting were J. R. 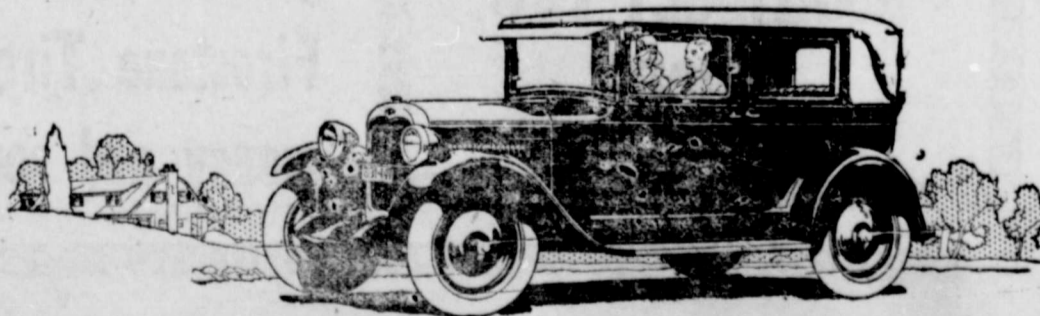

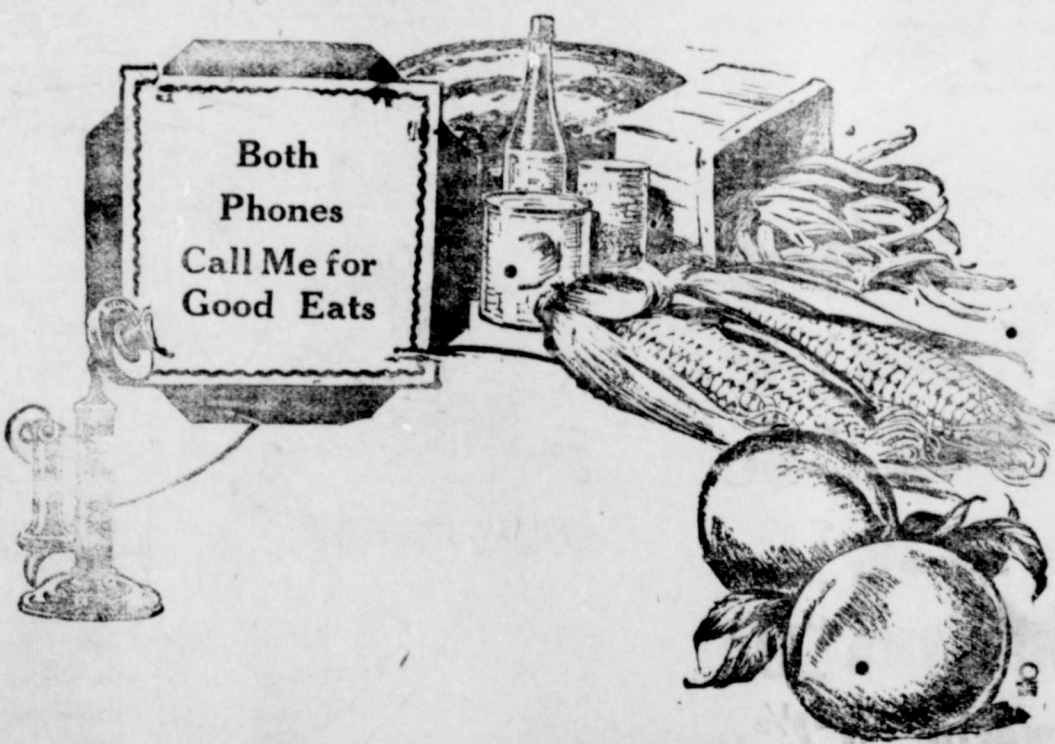
