**COTTON GOES TO 24.50 ON GOVERNMENT ESTIMATE**

On account of the government estimate of slightly over twelve and one-half million bales of cotton, compared with about 14,000,000 last report, the price of cotton went to 24.50 yesterday morning, a rise of \$10.00 per bale, the limit on the stock exchange. On account of the gamblers taking their profits, however, the price dropped down about 75 points, but regained some during the day. If this estimate is accepted by the trade, it is likely that the price will advance again today.

**GOLDTHWAITE PUBLIC SCHOOL OPENS MONDAY**

The Goldthwaite Public schools will open next Monday morning and a full attendance is expected at first. A fine corps of teachers are eager to make this year's term a banner one. A list of teachers follows:

The following instructions will be of benefit to remember:  
1. Four subjects constitute the normal course.  
2. Pupils entering Goldthwaite High School for the first term will not be permitted to take more than four courses unless they are registered as candidates for graduation in the coming year. Then, only at the discretion of the Superintendent.  
3. Any pupil to be allowed five subjects must have carried five subjects successfully during the previous term, or four subjects with a final grade of not less than 80.  
4. A pupil to graduate from the Goldthwaite High School must have to his credit at least sixteen high school credits, fifteen of which must be accredited by the University of Texas.  
5. REQUIRED SUBJECTS: Four years of English, three years of Mathematics, preferably Algebra and Plane Geometry, Science two years, History three years and Latin two years.

**CHEESE FACTORY PRACTICALLY COMPLETED**

Texas' first cheese factory is almost a realization. Work on the building has been rushed and will be completed by Saturday night. The building is a beauty and will be one of the show places of Goldthwaite. Already delegations of citizens from other towns have inspected the building and it is probable that many others will visit it as soon as it is completed.

**Dimensions of Building**  
The actual building here is 27 x 51 feet over all, divided into 5 different rooms, namely; a boiler room, 13 1/2 x 20, coal room, 8 x 12 curing room, 8 x 12 office and a 26 x 28 main working room, which will contain two milk vats, 6 x 20 feet and two large presses, 3 1/2 x 18 feet.

**A Beautiful Building**  
The building is brick veneer, concrete floors, sheetrock interior walls and ceiling, shingle top. The brick are red, the openings are finished in white and the top in black, screens and bindings are in ocre, which makes a very attractive building. The building is located in the center of about an acre of good level land and it is the intentions of the company to place grass for a lawn.

The contract for this building and several more have been let to Contractor Cooksey and Mr. W. R. Tranford is in charge here. Roy Maisen and L. E. Booker are doing the painting.

**Machinery on the Road**  
Machinery for the making of cheese has been shipped and is expected any day. The contractors who are supplying the machinery were in Goldthwaite the first of the week looking over the building. Actual installation will require two or three weeks.

**Sharp Advance in Cows**  
A sharp advance in cows has been noted within the last three or four weeks. Good cows now are selling for from \$75 to \$100. Many cows from surrounding counties have been bought and Vernon Tyson and others are shipping them in by the carload. Nothing but good jersey stock is being bought.

**Real Money in Cheese**  
At the price of sixty cents per pound for butter fat, or about 25¢ per gallon for milk, real money can be made by the farmer with ten or fifteen good cows. A three gallon cow will gross seventy-five cents per day or pay 50¢ and her feed. Ten of these cows will net the owner \$150.00 per month, even though he buys all the feed. Most of the farmers in this county can raise practically all their feed, bringing the profit up to around \$225.00. Besides this, about 80 per cent of the milk, in the form of whey, will be returned to the producer to feed to calves, hogs, chickens, etc. This whey is of practically the same food value as the present separated milk.

**CHADWICK WELL DOWN TO 1027 FEET**  
Work has stopped on the Chadwick No. 2, well, the drill having reached the 1027 foot level, while casing can be set. A lime has been struck which it is possible is the Ellemburger, however, tests are being made by the state geologists, and should it not be Ellemburger, drilling will be resumed at once. Contract has already been let for another well in this territory and should this one fail to get the oil, with the data on these two wells, the third one will likely strike the pay sand. A nice showing of oil was encountered in this well when two feet of black lime was passed through.

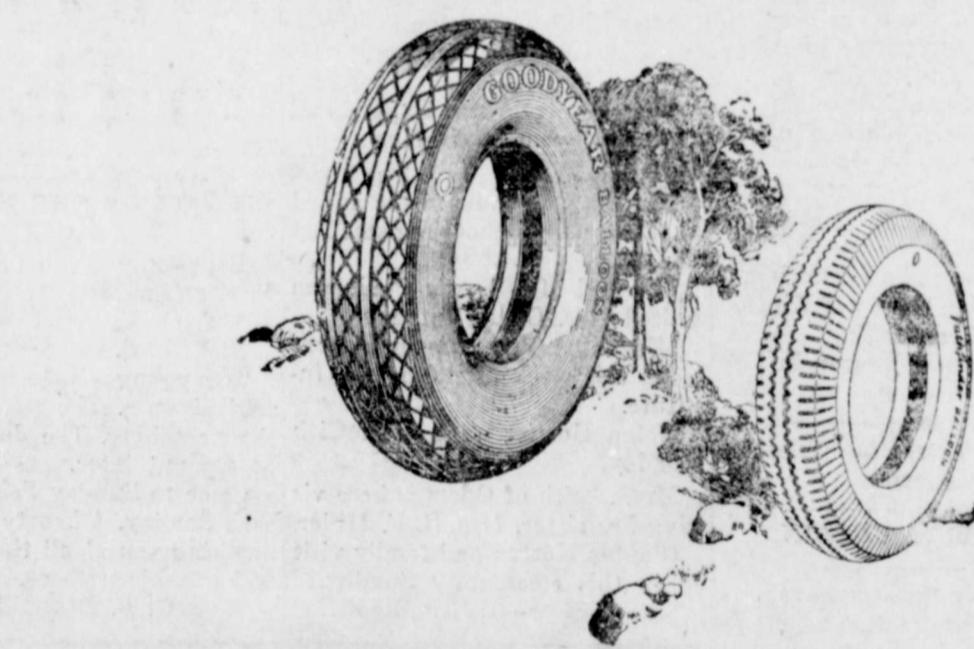

**SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON**

SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 11

**SOLOMON DEDICATES THE TEMPLE**  
1 Kings 8

**GOLDEN TEXT**—I was glad when they said unto me, Let us go into the house of Jehovah. Psalm 122:1.

**Lesson Setting and Survey**

The erection of the Temple at Jerusalem early in the reign of Solomon was the outstanding event of the Hebrew monarchy. The dedication exercises were imposing and impressive. The influence of that occasion has gone out through all the earth.

**Lesson Text and Outline**  
1 Kings 8: 1-11, 62, 63

**I. THE ASSEMBLY AT JERUSALEM.**

Then Solomon assembled the elders of Israel, and all the heads of the tribes, the princess of the fathers' houses of the children of Israel, unto King Solomon in Jerusalem, to bring up the ark of the covenant of Jehovah out of the city of David, which is Zion. 2 And all the men of Israel assembled themselves unto King Solomon at the feast, in the month of Ethanim, which is the seventh month.

**II. BRINGING UP THE ARK.**

3 And all the elders of Israel came, and the priests took up the ark. 4 And they brought up the ark of Jehovah, and the tent of meeting, and all the holy vessels that were in the Tent; even these did the priests and the Levites bring up. 5 And King Solomon and all the congregation of Israel, that were assembled unto him, were with him before the ark, sacrificing sheep, and oxen, that could not be counted nor numbered for multitude. 6 And the priests brought in the ark of the covenant of Jehovah into its place, into the oracle of the house, to the most holy place, even under the wings of the cherubim. 7 For the cherubim spread forth their wings over the place of the ark, and the cherubim covered the ark and the staves thereof above. 8 And the staves were so long that the ends of the staves were seen from the holy place before the oracle; but they were not seen from without: and there they are unto this day. 9 There was nothing in the ark save the two tables of stone which Moses put there at Horeb, when Jehovah made a covenant with the children of Israel, when they came out of the land of Egypt.

**III. THE GLORY OF JEHOVAH.**

10 And it came to pass, when the priests were come out of the holy place, that the cloud filled the house of Jehovah, 11 so that the priests could not stand to minister by reason of the cloud; for the glory of Jehovah filled the house of Jehovah.

**IV. THE OFFERINGS OF THE KING.**

62 And the king and all Israel with him, offered sacrifice before Jehovah. 63 And Solomon offered the sacrifice of peace-offerings, which he offered unto Jehovah, two and twenty thousand oxen, and a hundred and twenty thousand sheep. So the king and all the children of Israel dedicated the house of Jehovah.

**Bible Light on the Lesson**

**GOLD IN THE GOLDEN TEXT**

(1) Church-goers are benefactors. They receive blessing themselves. They show that they are benefitted. They are anxious for others to enjoy the services with them. They give a hearty invitation and extend the hand of joyous welcome. (2) Church-going is a great privilege. The house of the Lord is the place of prayer. It is the place of fellowship. It is the place of gospel proclamation. It is the place of yearning ideals and spiritual uplift. It is the place of joy and forward look. (3) Church-going is dependent humanly on church-goers. It grows as they grow in spirituality and influence. It grows in numbers and popularity as they win others through it to Christ and the King.

(22)—The Psalmist prays for the peace and prosperity of Jerusalem. His petition is fragrant with devotion to his country. But there was more to it than patriotism. It is rich in spiritual fervor. Why do the tribes go up to Jerusalem

To give thanks to the name of Jehovah. Why does the Psalmist seek its good? For the sake of the house of Jehovah our God. So the throne of the house of David is set there and secure because it is a throne of righteousness.

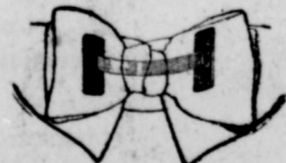
