CHEVROLET TRUCK CARAVAN TO VISIT GOLDTHWAITE 30TH

A caravan of twenty two Chevrolet Commercial cars, including the full Chevrolet line from Fire Truck to School Buses, Grain and Stock Bodies, trailers, panel bodies, as well as open express beds will visit Goldthwaite Friday, September 30 at from 11:30 to 2:00 o'clock.

Robert E. Lee's Farewell To His Soldiers

Headquarters Army Northern Virginia, April 10, 1865

"After four years of arduous service marked by unsurpassed courage and fortitude, the Army of Northern Virginia has been compelled to yield to overwhelming numbers and resources.

"I need not tell the brave survivors of so many hard-fought battles, who have remained steadfast to the last, that I have consented to this result from no distrust of them, but feeling that valor and devotion could accomplish nothing that would compensate for the loss that must have attended a continuance of the contest, I determined to avoid the useless sacrifice of those whose past services have endeared them to their countrymen. By the terms of agreement, officers and men can return to their homes and remain until exchanged. You will take with you the satisfaction that proceeds from the consciousness of duty faithfully performed, and I earnestly pray that a merciful God will extend to you his blessing and protection, with an unceasing admiration of your constancy and devotion to your country and a grateful remembrance of your kind and generous consideration for myself, I bid you all an affectionate farewell.

**TAKE DOWN WELCOME SIGN, GET RID OF RATS**

If you don't want rats, take down the welcome sign, advises Dr. J. C. Anderson, state health officer, who reports that rat infestation seems prevalent throughout the state at this time. "Rats infest buildings and premises where they can obtain food and shelter, and if they cannot get these accommodations, they go elsewhere," Dr. Anderson stated.

"Waste scraps or other food left on kitchen tables or cupboard shelves will draw an army of rat boarders. To prevent this, all garbage should be placed in metal containers with close fitting covers, and meat, potatoes, oatmeal, and other foodstuffs should be placed in containers that are rat proof.

"Damage by rats to produce and property in the United States is estimated by the Federal Department of Agriculture to be approximately \$200,000,000 annually. Rats are also disease carriers, and are filthy and full of vermin. When infesting large areas, it takes concerted community action to get rid of these pests.

"Trapping rats with snap traps is effective in buildings and is recommended where the use of poison seems inadvisable. If other food is available to rats, it makes trapping difficult.

"The most effective means of destroying rats is by poisoning and is recommended for use outside the home. There are a number of commercial poisons

that are good, but barium carbonate is perhaps the best suited for the purpose, it is inexpensive and slow in action. Powdered barium carbonate should be thoroughly mixed and worked into soft baits in the proportion of this mineral, 1 part to four parts of selected food. This poison can also be sifted over or rubbed into sliced baits. In using any kind of poison, be careful not to leave it or poison bait in reach of children or domestic animals.

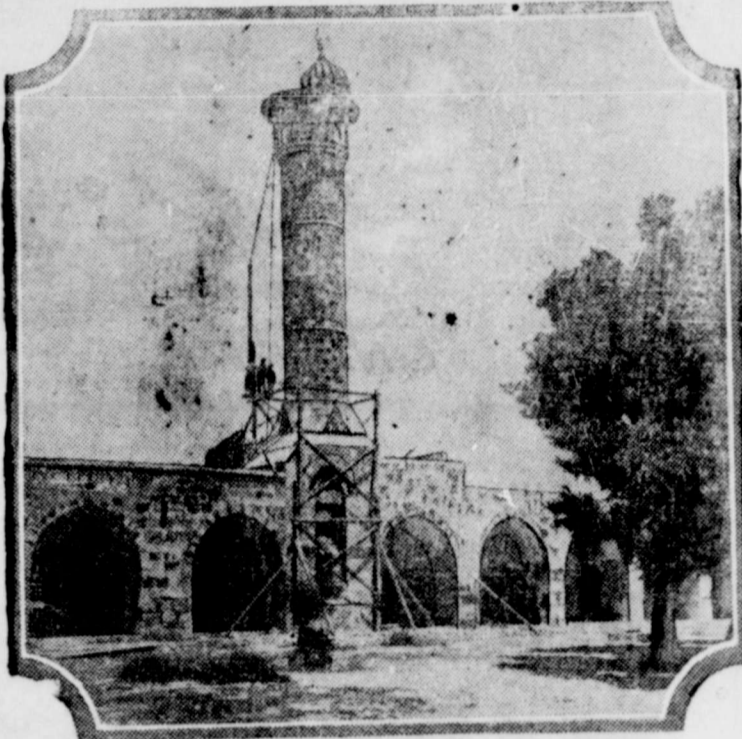

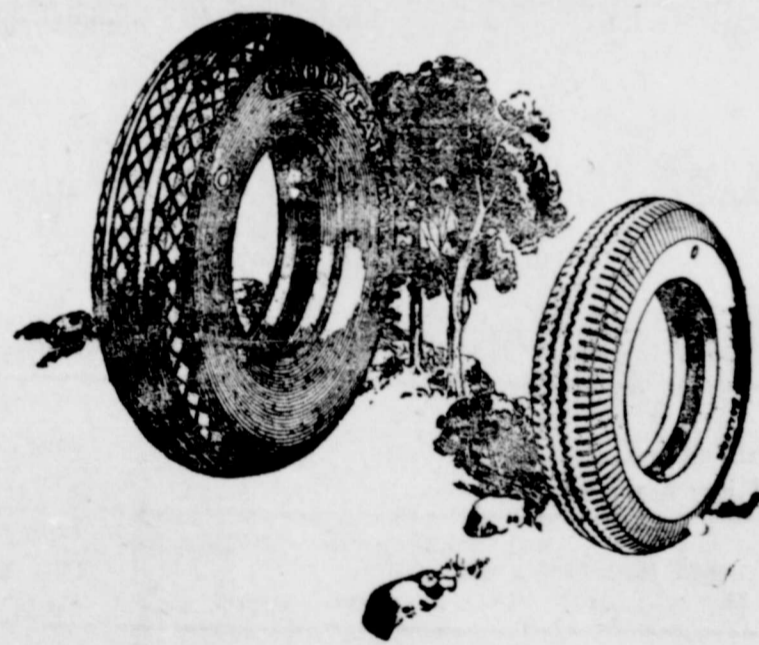

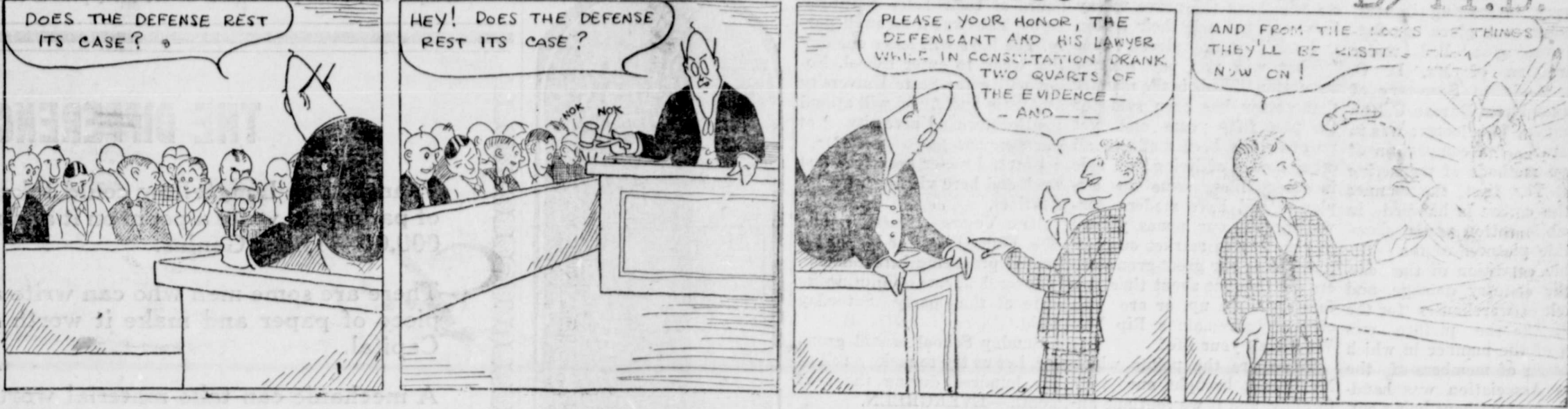

**INTERESTING LECTURE  
AT PRIDDY, TEXAS**

A very interesting illustrative lecture was given last Saturday evening at 8 P. M. under the direction of Mr. L. O. Hosek, Assistant Secretary of the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Association. This lecture was in the nature of a comparison of the two methods of marketing cotton. The first, the manner that the cotton is handled in the public cotton yards, showing slide pictures of the deplorable condition of the cotton, the country damage, and the lack of warehouses for the cotton. The picture was shown of the manner in which the cotton of members of the Cotton Association was handled. Shipped without being cut, insured at a cheap rate and carefully warehoused in a Triple A warehouse, which is absolutely fireproof.

Various pictures were shown of the Cotton Association members headquarters at Dallas, showing the sampling room, grade and staple, compressing, and marketing. Also accounting department where all the latest machinery is used and where the clerical help is cut to the minimum by the use of such machinery.

Another picture showing the non-member milking the member's cooperative cow through the fence, is one well worth considering. After working for the past five years to place cotton on a higher plain in regards to price, those on the outside have been milking our cow by receiving the benefits of roderly marketing which the members have been striving to bring about, and those on the outside have been withholding their support and yet receiving a better average price for their cotton.

If all the cotton farmers would sign a contract and place their cotton along side of other farmers who have the nerve to say they will not sell their cotton and ask just any street buyer "What will you pay me for my cotton?" This is the manner that cotton has been sold for the past fifty years, and yet progress has been made in all other modes of living; we ride in automobiles, some in airplanes, and have modern conveniences in our homes, yet we are content to market our cotton just as our great-grandfathers did. Isn't it about time we farmers wope up, or are you content to remain a Rip Van Winkle all your life?

These are the points which Mr. Hosek brought out very forcibly, and if we continue another generation in the manner there will not be enough farmers to form a corporal guard. Mr. Hosek will be with the people of Priddy again and expects to have the school house full at his next meeting. There were about fifty people present and all were well pleased with the address.

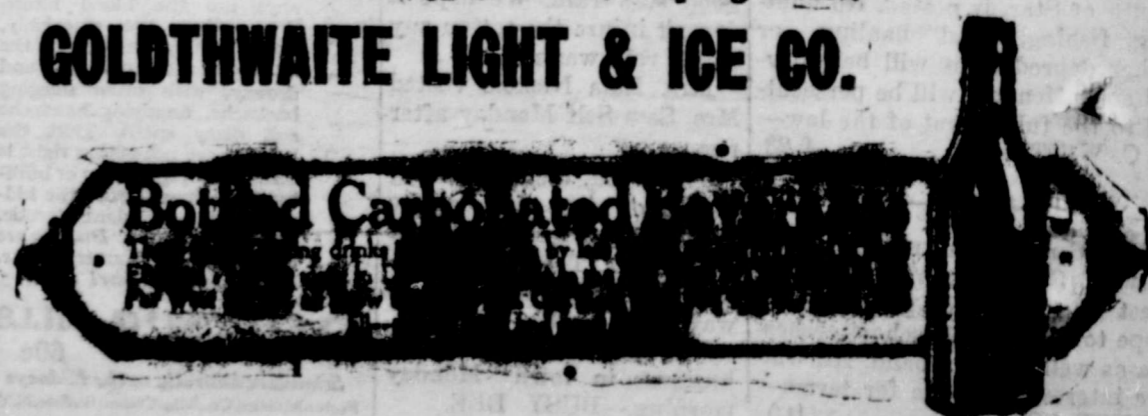

**SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON**

**REVIEW**

(Special Application to State Missions)

**GOLDEN TEXT.** Jehovah hath established his throne in the heavens; And his kingdom ruleth over all. Psalms 103: 19.

**Lesson Setting and Survey.** Today being State Mission Day among the Sunday schools of the Southern Baptist Convention, the Lesson Committee of the Convention suggests a review of the quarter's lessons with special application to State Missions. Under this arrangement the following topics are proposed for all departments: (1) Religion in Israel under Saul, lessons 1 and 2; (2) Religion in Israel under Solomon, lessons 3 to 9; and (3) Religion in Israel under Solomon and Rehoboam, lessons 10 to 12.

**Lesson Text and Outline**  
Psalm 67

Notes Analytical and Expository

**I. RELIGION IN ISRAEL UNDER SAUL.**

1. Saul Chosen King. Israel wanted a king. The transition from a heocracy to a monarchy was divinely permitted. Samuel, the last and greatest of the Judges, was put in charge by Jehovah and the people. Through him the king was chosen, called out, and crowned. The commencement of the kingdom was auspicious, for Saul showed admirable spirit and Samuel retained his spiritual primacy and the people went to the relief of their threatened brethren beyond the Jordan.

2. Samuel's Farewell. Samuel had served for 20 years as Judge of Israel. Now he turns over the reins of political power to the new king. Upon his retirement to private life he delivered a remarkable farewell address in which he appealed to his record, to the history of the nation, to Jehovah and to the future of his people. The latter part of his life was devoted to educational work and when the sun of his life set at Ramah there was sincere mourning throughout the country.

**II. RELIGION IN ISRAEL UNDER DAVID.**

3. Samuel Anoints David. When Saul had proven a moal and spiritual failure as king and was rejected by Jehovah, the heart of Samuel was greatly grieved, but he was divinely directed to go to Bethlehem in search of Jesse whose youngest son David was divinely designated and anointed as the future king of Israel.

4. David and Goliath. When the Philistine and Israelite armies were drawn up against each other and the Giant of Gath challenged the hosts of Saul there was none who dared to enter the combat. David who was but a lad appeared and was mightily stirred by the chal-

lenge of Goliath. With the permission of Saul he met and slew the Philistine whereupon Israel triumphed gloriously over the invaders.

5. David and Jonathan. The friendship of David and Jonathan is one of the most beautiful episodes in human history. At their first meeting on the battlefield after the slaying of the Philistine giant, it is said that Jonathan loved as his own soul. And he was true to his friend in trying times during the after years, even angering his royal father and risking his life. Hardly anything better can be said for David and Jonathan than that each was worthy of the other.

6. David Sparing Saul. The jealous monarch sought again and again to get David out of the way. To his credit David did not harbor a spirit of revenge. On the contrary he spared the life of Saul when the king was completely helpless in the hands of David whose at that moment he was seeking to destroy. Instantly Saul confessed his sin but the sequel shows he did not forsake it.

7. David Brings the Ark to Jerusalem. At length David came to the throne. For seven years and six months he was king of Judah at Hebron which was then the provincial capital. Upon being crowned king of

Judah and Israel he removed to Jerusalem where he dwelt thirty-three years in the national capital. Desiring to make Jerusalem also his religious capital he established divine worship there by bringing up the ark of the covenant to the metropolis.

8. God's Promise to David. When David was at the zenith of his fame and power he desired to build a national sanctuary. At first the prophet Nathan gave him permission to do so. Later there came through the prophet a direct prohibition from the pious undertaking. However the promises connected with the prohibition were so precious that David gained more than he gave up as we always do in like circumstances. David was assured that one of his sons should succeed him on the throne and build the house of God. And he was told also of a Son who in the fullness of time should appear and occupy the throne which should last forever.

9. Nathan Leads David to Repentance. It is a pity that the man of God's own heart should commit two or three of the blackest crimes credited to any man. But though a mighty monarch he could not escape conviction for adultery and murder. The faithful Nathan came to him through a

striking parable which he knew would arouse the royal wrath and enable him to thrust down into the king's vitals the blade of truth, "Thou art the man!" Sincerely the king repented of his awful sin and truly he was forgiven, though the scar remains to this day.

**III. RELIGION IN ISRAEL UNDER SOLOMON AND REHOBAM.**

10. Solomon's Wise Choice. In his youth Solomon succeeded to the throne of his father David. In the midst of the sacrificial feast at Gibeon, a suburb of Jerusalem, the young king had a dream which influenced his whole career. The divine offer resulted in the king's choice of wisdom to occupy the throne of David. The answer of David was not only

reassuring to the anxious youth but rich in promise of everything that accompanies wisdom, as riches, honor, and long life.

11. Solomon Dedicates the Temple. The crowning glory of Solomon's glorious reign was the erection and dedication of the Temple creating Mount Moriah in the city of Jerusalem. Never such another sacred structure was ever built with its holy associations, its Shekinah glory, and its far-reaching influence.
