TRAFFIC LAWS IN GOLDTHWAITE TO BE ENFORCED HEREAFTER

In the opinion of the Eagle one of the most useful steps towards promoting the safety and securing orderliness in the streets of Goldthwaite was the slight changes made in the city traffic laws and the decision to place a courteous traffic officer on the streets on each busy day made by the City Council at a recent meeting.

CHAPTER

An ordinance, to be a part of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Goldthwaite, Texas, providing for the regulation of traffic on the streets of the said city, providing rules and regulations for the parking of Automobiles, Limiting Speed, Prohibiting Driving and Parking on Sidewalks and space reserved therefor, prescribing a Penalty for violation of this Ordinance, repealing all Ordinances in conflict herewith, and declaring an Emergency.

ARTICLE I. Sec. 1.—All automobiles, trucks, motor vehicles and all other vehicles of every description, shall, on the following named streets, be parked or stopped, when brought to a standstill, in the middle of the street, squarely across, and at right angles with the center line of said street.

"CHILDREN'S WEEK" PARADE OCTOBER 10

On Monday afternoon, October 10, a brilliant parade, sponsored by the Parent-Teachers Association, was staged. The parade started at the Baptist Church promptly at 5 o'clock. It was led by two grammar school boys, Ben Davis Geslin and Allen Campbell, bearing a banner inscribed:

CHILDREN'S WEEK

October 9-15

"The World Moves on the Feet of Little Children"

Following this banner was the Goldthwaite High School Band, whose excellent drummers beat time for the parade, which was on foot. Thus the parade was much more effective than it would have been if floats and other vehicles had been used. The band was followed by a group of twenty tiny boys and girls between the ages of three and five years. The little tots wore paper "soldier" hats of black and yellow. Their uniforms were white trimmed in black and yellow. This group furnished "music" with their French harps, kazooes and toy horns. They were led by two high school girls, Mary Douglas Forehand and Doris Oden, both in soldier array. Next came a noisy crowd of painted clowns, one of the, Wayne Locklear, on horseback. The clowns kept the crowds in an uproar with their antics and capers. Following the clowns was a stately group of miniature "ladies" pushing their baby buggies. The "ladies" were grammar school girls in long dresses. After them came another group of grown-up little girls carrying their babies. Some of these were colonial ladies, while still others were Japanese girls in their kimono and slippers. Six green clad sprites tipped merrily after the Japanese girls. Two beautiful chrysanthemum girls in tarleton dresses of pastel

shades, carrying chrysanthemums, followed the sprites. Two round-faced Dutch girls were also seen. Next came the canine contingent headed by a banner—"Love me, Love My Dog!" This consisted of thirty grammar school boys leading thirty dogs of all different sizes and colors. The boys with the dogs were followed by the G. H. S. Pep Squad, carrying their black and gold G. H. S. banner. The pep squad marched in pairs and gave the parade thrill after with their hearty yells and songs. Behind the pep squad came the banner, "We Are Yours—What Are You Going to do With Us?" This was followed by a number of boys carrying guns, who, in turn, were followed by a large group of boys mounted on sticks and brooms. Then came about 20 girls from the intermediate grades carrying tennis rackets and book satchels.

After these were several members of the grammar school basketball team. Jesse Moreland brought up the rear leading a goat.

The parade drew up in an artistic group on the court house lawn, where they listened to songs, a band concert and a splendid speech by Professor Newton on "Children's Week."

Several hundred people gathered to witness the parade and hear the band concert.

EDITORIAL

Texas University, like many schools, finds itself tripping over ex-students at every point in its attempted progress. This autoeracy of alumni is bad enough in the denominational and semi-private schools and universities, but in a state institution it is intolerable. Often it is asked by what special privilege former students exercise their organized and individual officiousness? The university, it is logically contended, belongs to all the people—and especially to the tax-payers. Students far from pay their way. They are specially favored characters during undergraduate days. Why should they be privileged characters after receiving their degrees? Yet despite the unreasonableness of the situation, ex-students—and that includes all who have ever attended, whether for a few days or four years—up until they die, claim the right, and exercise it, to meddle at every point? Not only do they meddle—they usurp. Because they personally enjoy athletic spectacles, it is in football and other sports that they particularly dominate. It is the alumni who dictate to the coaches, who decide upon the building of stadiums who oust faculty members who happen not to be in accord with their violent enthusiasm, who warp and twist the entire program to suit their own unworthy ambitions for the institution. Those are hard words, but true.

As ordinary citizens, these graduates and former students individually are sweet tempered, reasonable, and of broad perspective. But as alumni, they are precisely what Sherman said of war. They protest that they are friends of their Alma Mater, and in the same breath wreak wrath upon some quiet, conscientious teacher or officer who happens to be working sincerely for the good of the institution.

Santa Fe Purchases Promote Prosperity

WHILE the Santa Fe is itself a large employer of labor—its payroll in 1926 totalled \$107,000,000, and its employes number more than 75,000—indirectly as a buyer of materials and supplies it helps to furnish employment to many more. Such purchases last year exceeded \$64,000,000. In addition it bought over \$12,000,000 of new cars and locomotives.

Its largest class of material was fuel, which totalled \$24,360,000. This consisted of about 2,267,000 tons of coal, and 507,800,000 gallons of fuel oil. The use of coal or oil on any division is determined primarily by which is the cheaper fuel in that locality.

The second largest class of purchases was iron and steel products, for which the expenditure was approximately \$19,750,000. This included an expenditure of \$9,500,000 for 152,700 tons of rail, frogs, switches, and fastenings. \$1,500,000 went for wheels, axles, and tires, and \$306,000 for flues and tubes for locomotives. Bridges, turntables, structural steel, forgings, and fabricated, unfabricated, and pressed steel took nearly \$3,000,000. Steel and iron are basic necessities in railroading.

Purchases of forest products totalled \$6,412,000, which included over 3,000,000 cross ties, and large quantities of lumber and timbers. The Santa Fe creosotes its ties and much of its timbers, otherwise greater quantities would be needed each year.

Folders, report blanks, notices, tickets, tariffs, and various items in the stationery line required \$1,225,000, electrical materials \$660,000, lubricating oil and grease, illuminating oils, waste, etc., \$1,180,000, and air brake material \$617,600.

These purchases were necessary to maintain the railroad properly and to give satisfactory service to the public. They were covered by 130,000 invoices and were made from 3,347 individuals and firms. Note the wide spread of this buying.

Thus the Santa Fe and all railroads are an important factor in maintaining the prosperity of our country through the employment arising from these large purchases of supplies, as well as the millions directly disbursed among their own employes for services.

When the railroads are doing well, they buy materials and supplies on a larger scale than when net revenues fall off. Money thus spent mainly pays for the labor of many persons, helping merchants, farmers, everybody—your own community included. You therefore are vitally interested.

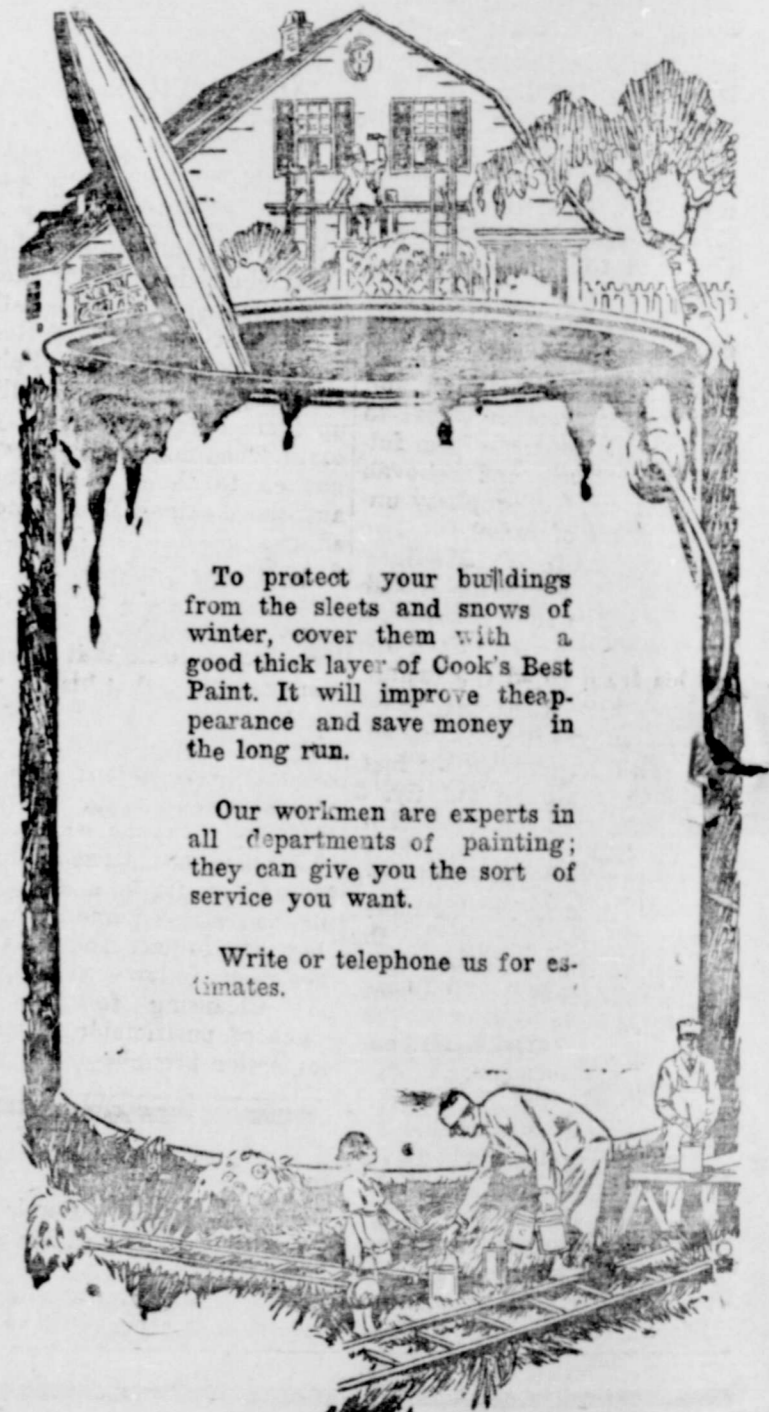

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

SUNDAY, OCTOBER 23, 1927

THE CALL OF THE PROPHET

GOLDEN TEXT—And he heard the voice of the Lord saying, Whom shall I send, and who will go for us? Then I said, Here am I send me. Tsasiah 6: 8.

It was about 909 B. C. that Elijah by divine direction designated Elisha as his prophetic successor in the northern kingdom of Israel. It was probably 752 B. C. that Amos, a native of the southern kingdom of Judah, was called to be prophet and the scene of his ministry was mainly at Bethel in the northern kingdom. It was in 735 B. C. that Isaiah, the son of Amos, who may have been a brother of King Amaziah of Judah, received his call in the temple at Jerusalem and immediately began his prophetic work which continued to his death about 680 B. C.

Lesson Text and Outline I. THE CALL OF ELISHA.

19 So he departed thence, and found Elisha the son of Shaphat, who was plowing, with twelve yoke of oxen before him, and he with the twelfth; and Elijah passed over unto him, and cast his mantle upon him. 20 And he left the oxen and ran after Elijah, and said, Let me, I pray thee, kiss my father and my mother, and then I will follow thee. And he said unto him, Go back again; for what have I done to thee? II. THE CALL OF AMOS.

14 Then answered Amos, and said to Amaziah, I was no prophet, neither was I a prophet's son; but I was a herdsman, and a dresser of sycomore trees: 15 and Jehovah took me from following the flock, and Jehovah said unto me, Go, prophesy unto my people of Israel. III. THE CALL OF ISIAH.

In the year that King Uzziah died I saw the Lord sitting upon a throne, high and lifted up; and his train filled the temple. 2 Above him stood the seraphim: each one had six wings; two he covered his face with, and with twain he did fly. 3 And one cried unto another, and he said, Holy, holy, holy, is Jehovah of hosts: and the whole earth is full of his glory. 4 And the foundations of the thresholds shook at the voice of him that cried, and the house was filled with smoke. 5 Then said I, Woe is me! for I am undone; because I am a man of unclean lips, and I dwell midst people of unclean lips: for mine eyes have seen the King, the Jehovah of hosts. 6 Then flew one of the seraphim unto me, having a live coal in his hand, which he had taken with tongs from the altar 7 and he touched my lip with it, and said, Lo, this hath touched thy lips, and thine iniquity is taken away, and thy sin forgiven. 8. And I heard the voice of the Lord, saying, Whom shall I send, and who will go for us? Then I said, Here am I; send me.

Notes Analytical and Expository

1. A PLANTER AT THE PLOW was Elisha when he received his call from the prophet. Elisha was reared on the farm of his well-to-do and evidently pious father, Shaphat, at Abel-Meholah, in the Jordan valley south of the Sea of Galilee. He was busy plowing the twelfth yoke of oxen when Elijah, just back from his flight to Mount Horeb, came to him in the field and cast his mantle upon him, thus investing him with the prophetic office and designating him as his own successor. As Elijah, true to his type, withdrew, Elisha, leaving his plow and his team, ran after his great teacher in eager acceptance, although desiring to return home for a leave-taking due his parents. Elijah bade him go (and indeed may have gone with him), but told him not to forget the ceremony of the mantle nor let the home folks keep him from his prophetic work. So he entered at once upon his preparation as a servant and disciple of Elijah whom he succeeded in a prophetic career covering a half century or more.

2. A SHEPHERD AMONG THE SYCOMORES was Amos when he received his call to be a prophet. Amos was a native of Tekoa, a village of Judah six miles south of Bethlehem. As wool-grower and fig-orchardist, he did not receive training in the schools of the prophets. But while theological uneducated, he was thoroughly acquainted with the earlier books of the Old Testament. He drank in inspiration from the wild scenery of southern Palestine. Often he must have visited the market centers and came into observant contact with the national life of his day. His prophetic work was performed at Bethel in the bounds of Israel which was twenty-five miles from his home in the southern kingdom. He flourished in the eighth century before Christ.

3. A COURTIER IN THE TEMPLE was Isaiah when he received his call to be a prophet. (1) Conviction followed the vision of God. In his glimpse of the glory of Jehovah, high enthroned, and Temple-irradiating, Isaiah beheld the attending seraphim. These angelic beings are nowhere else mentioned in the Bible. From their close attendance upon the throne of God it is thought that they belong to the highest rank in the angel world. They are here described as having six wings each. The first pair used in covering the face in reverence; the second, for covering the feet in token of humility; the third, for flight in obedience to the will of God. They hovered on both sides of the throne, and thus two semi-circular choirs in reverent adoration chanted the superlative holiness of the Lord of Hosts, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, and sang of his glory swelling up from every quarter of the earth. Then the thresholds were shaken to their foundations and the shekinah cloud concealed the vision. (2) Confession followed the sense of sin. The prophet felt that no sinful man could see the holy God and live. He realized that his lips were not pure, that his life was not clean, and that his associates also were sunk in sin. Yet his eyes were permitted to see the Sovereign of the universe. How unworthy he was! How sin-stained he realized himself to be! How far he and his people had strayed and how low they had fallen! And does not woe fast follow wickedness? (3) Cleansing followed the touch of purification. Isaiah's confession brought him a minis-

tering seraph having a live coal which had been the ordinary live coal used for carrying fire into the Temple service, or the glowing stone used generally for conveying heat or transferring fire as variously needed in Oriental household life. This was taken by the seraph with the golden altar tongs and laid

upon the prophet's mouth with the welcome declaration that his iniquity was taken away and his sin purged. It was the touch of purification from sin and its power for new life. (4) Call is embodied in the summons to duty. A great work for God was to be done for Israel and for the world. It was to be

difficult, hardening and un-successful ministry measured by human standards. The divine call was voluntary, not conscript. The call was in the interrogative rather than the imperative mood. Who will be sent by Jehovah? Who will go for the true God? There is no mightier impulsion anywhere than the appealing summons in the voice of God. (5) Consecration is assured in the answer of devotion. No wonder Isaiah volunteered. No wonder he announced himself an eager lis-

tener to the divine call and a ready messenger in divine service. And no wonder his ministry though fruitless in his own day, has been so abundantly fruitful down the ages.

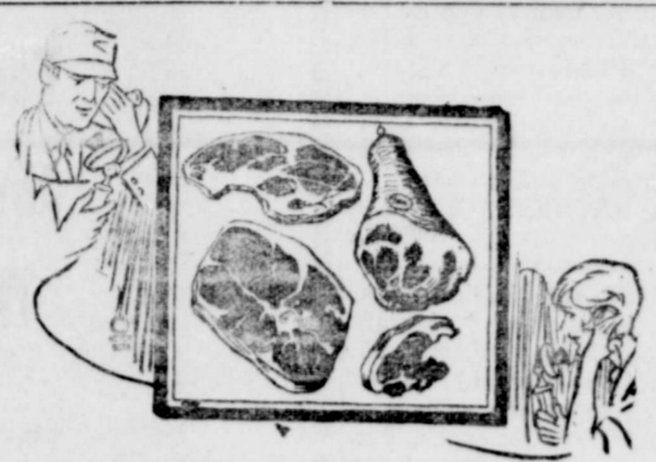

CITY ORDINANCE (Cont'd)
 draws for hauling freight and express on the above designated streets, shall, whenever possible, load and unload from the side, when such loading or unloading is necessary to be done at the front of any store or building fronting said streets or any of them.

Sec. 6.—The provisions of this article shall not be construed to prohibit curb parking around the Court house curb. Vehicles may be parked around the curbing of the Court house lawn, provided they are parked with the right front wheel as near the curb as possible, and at an angle of 45 degrees with the said curbing and side walk. No parking shall be done at the corners of said Court house lawn, but along the sides thereof, only.

Sec. 7.—Any person or persons, violating any of the provisions of this Article, shall be deemed guilty of misdemeanor, and upon conviction, shall be fined in any sum not exceeding One Hundred Dollars.

ARTICLE II.

Sec. 1.—In the City of Goldthwaite, all automobiles and other vehicles, except when passing another going the same direction, shall keep and travel on the right-hand side of the street, and as near the right-hand curb as possible.

Sec. 2.—Any vehicle meeting another, shall pass to the right. A vehicle overtaking another, shall pass to the left and not pull over or turn back until far enough ahead not to interfere with the progress of the vehicle passed.

Sec. 3.—Any automobile or other vehicle, in turning into another street, road or alley, to the right, shall turn the corner with its right hand side near the curb. In turning to the left at street intersections, every vehicle shall pass the intersection of the center lines of the streets and roads upon which it is traveling, before making the turn to the left.

Sec. 4.—All automobiles and other vehicles, when stopping and waiting shall head in toward the curb or sidewalk, and shall stop with the right-hand front wheel as near the curb as possible, provided that this method of parking shall not apply to back streets or parts thereof as are covered by Article I of this ordinance.

Sec. 5.—No race, or contest for speed, regardless of the distance run or whether pre-arranged or not, shall be held on any of the alleys, streets or roads of the City of Goldthwaite, Texas.

Sec. 6.—No automobile or other vehicle shall stop or park anywhere on any of the street intersections, or at the intersection of any street and alley in the said City of Goldthwaite, Texas. And for the purpose of this ordinance, street and alley intersections are designated as being all that part of any street and alley used for travel, and which is also used for travel by the intersecting street or alley, as shown on the map being in the office of the clerk of the intersecting streets and alleys respectively.

Sec. 7.—No automobile or other vehicle shall stop or park on any side walk, whether at a street crossing or otherwise, in the said City of Goldthwaite, Texas, and whether the same be a cement, stone, wood or dirt sidewalk. And for this purpose a space, eight feet wide, between the property lines and the street, of all property adjoining the streets is designated as sidewalk, where no sidewalk is now built, or has been heretofore designated.

Sec. 8.—Drivers of vehicles of any kind on the streets of the City of Goldthwaite, shall at the approach of any fire truck, or any other apparatus of the Fire Department, pull as far to the right as possible, and stop until such fire truck or apparatus is past.

Sec. 9.—For the purpose of this ordinance, where no curb has been built, the lateral boundary of that part of the street designated for travel and the use of vehicles, shall be regarded as the curb.

Sec. 10.—Any person or persons, owning, operating or controlling any automobile or other vehicles upon the streets

of Goldthwaite, Texas, violating any of the provisions of this ordinance, from Sec. 1 to 9 inclusive of this Article, shall be deemed guilty of misdemeanor, and on conviction, shall be fined in any sum not exceeding One Hundred Dollars.

ARTICLE III.

Sec. 1.—No person shall drive or operate an automobile or other vehicle on the streets and alleys of the City of Goldthwaite, Texas, at a rate of speed exceeding 20 miles per hour. Any person violating the provisions of this Article, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction shall be fined in any sum not less than \$5.00 and not more than \$200.00.

All ordinances, or parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of the above Articles I, II, and III, are hereby repealed.

The fact that there is no adequate traffic ordinance, and regulations of travel on the streets and alleys of the City of Goldthwaite, Texas, creates an emergency and an imperative public necessity exists that the rules requiring ordinances to be read at three several meetings be suspended, and this ordinance is hereby passed to its third and last reading, and is unanimously adopted by the City Council of the City of Goldthwaite, Texas, all members present and voting in favor of it, and shall be in force and effect immediately after its passage and publication.
