Self Culture Club Observes Armistice With Fitting Program

Ladies of the Self Culture Club fittingly commemorate this Notable Occasion

The ladies of the Woman's Self Culture Club of Goldthwaite have earned the appreciation of the ones who were so fortunate as to be present at an Armistice Day memorial program at their club rooms in the court house yesterday afternoon from three to six.

About sixty members and guests were present and were thoroughly entertained for the entire time.

Mrs. E. T. Fairman, president of the club, called the house to order and in a few well-chosen words, welcomed the guests and stated the purpose of the gathering. She then called on Mrs. J. A. Hester, who was leader for this particular program and who presided throughout.

Mrs. Hester, after the invocation by Rev. Ira Preece, requested that the audience sing "The Star Spangled Banner," this was followed by "Dixie."

Mrs. J. M. Campbell touched the audience with the poem, "Bravest Battle." This program placed the mothers of the soldiers as the bravest warriors of all.

Mrs. L. H. Fairman read a very appropriate paper on "A Christian's Consistency Without War," being a portion of the address of the American delegate to the peace conference.

Mrs. L. B. Waters then rendered a short, dramatic poem, "A Tribute to the Sons of the Blue and the Gray," showing their uniting on the Flanders Field.

Mrs. W. E. Miller concluded the club members' portion of the program with a stirring eulogy of the United States wartime president and martyr, Woodrow Wilson.

Mrs. Hester then introduced Mr. Lucius Stephens of Lometa, who returned recently from the American Legion's A. E. F. to Paris. Mr. Stephens was appointed as representative of Texas on a good will tour of Europe. This tour lasted almost a month and Mr. Stephens kept his audience spell-bound for a couple of hours describing it. He makes no effort at oratory, but is an interesting speaker with full control of language and a smooth delivery. The fortunate listeners are greatly indebted to Mr. Stephens for the interesting talk and to the ladies of the Self Culture Club for securing him.

At the conclusion of Mr. Stephens' address, a few minutes social was enjoyed, refreshments being served.

Texas-Louisiana Light and Power Company Took Possession Yesterday

In a deal which has been in process for several months, the Texas-Louisiana Light and Power Company, a 100 million dollar corporation, bought the Goldthwaite Light & Ice Co. from B. F. and Edward Geeslin and took charge of it yesterday morning. The entire present personnel of the plant have been retained with a nice raise in wages. A manager, trained to the requirements of this company will be placed here within the next few days.

Capacity Increased

The Texas-Louisiana Light & Power Company, it is reported, will place another 100 horsepower generating unit here to take care of the load until their high line, which will be constructed from Hico or Gatesville to this place, and which will require approximately a year, can be completed.

To Build Ice Factory

B. F. Geeslin states that he is informed that this company intends to build an ice factory here and put in a large cold storage plant in connection with it. An ice factory has been a crying need for Goldthwaite for several years and this decision will be welcomed by the business interests of the town.

A few weeks ago Edward Geeslin, who had been manager and part owner of the light plant, took a position as manager of the municipal plant at Brady and it was then ascertained that plans were being made to sell this plant.

The lighting and power requirements of Goldthwaite are increasing at a rapid rate and the Texas-Louisiana Light & Power Company will be able to take care of them to the best advantage.

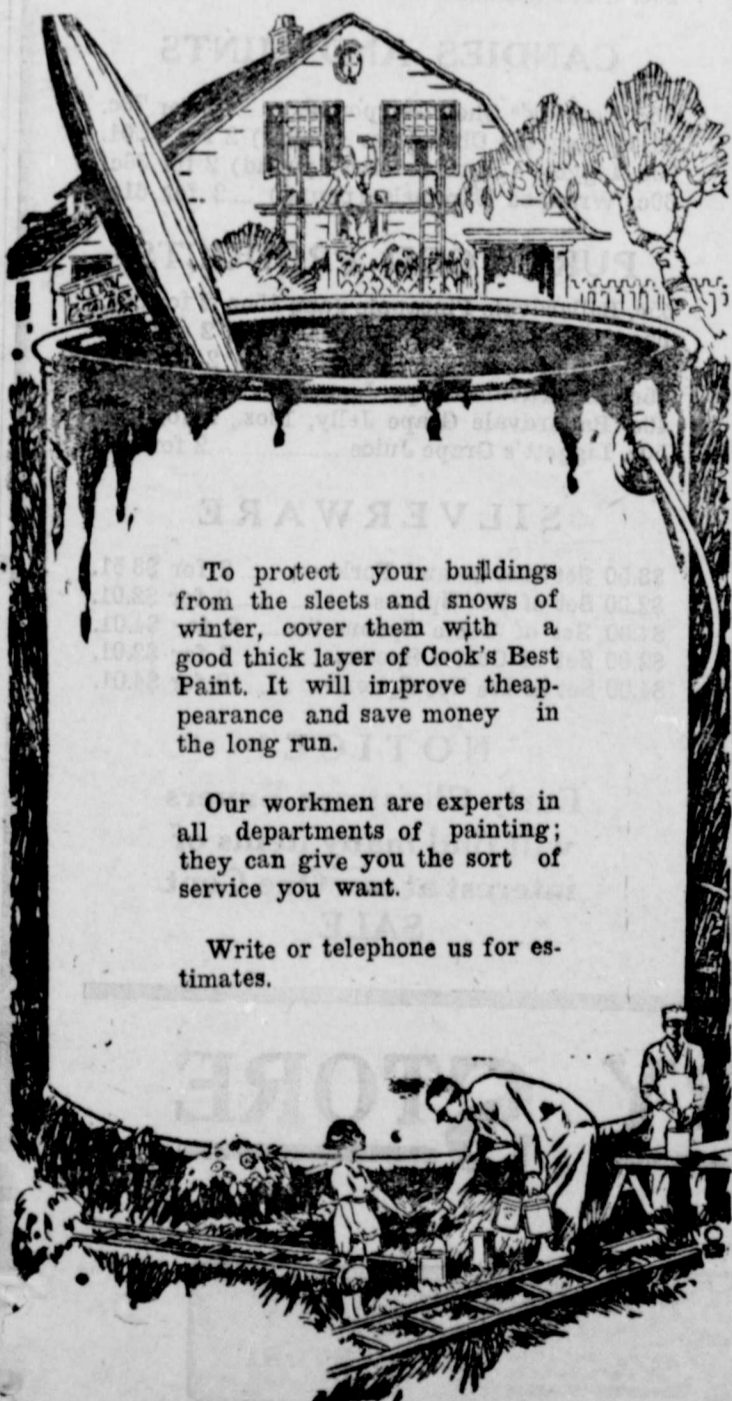

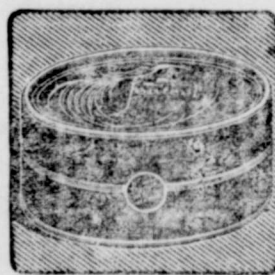

BUSY WORLD

—America's Ambassador to Mexico, Dwight W. Morrow, has been heralded by crowds of persons in Mexico City, who wish to express their friendliness toward the United States. Morrow met President Calles officially for the first time Saturday. The ambassador presented his credentials at noon.

—President Condouritis of Greece narrowly escaped death just before noon Sunday, when an unemployed youth, 25 years old, attempted twice to shoot him. President Condouritis was entering his automobile just outside the municipal auditorium, where he had formally opened the Congress of Greek Mayors. Only slight wounds were the result of the firing.

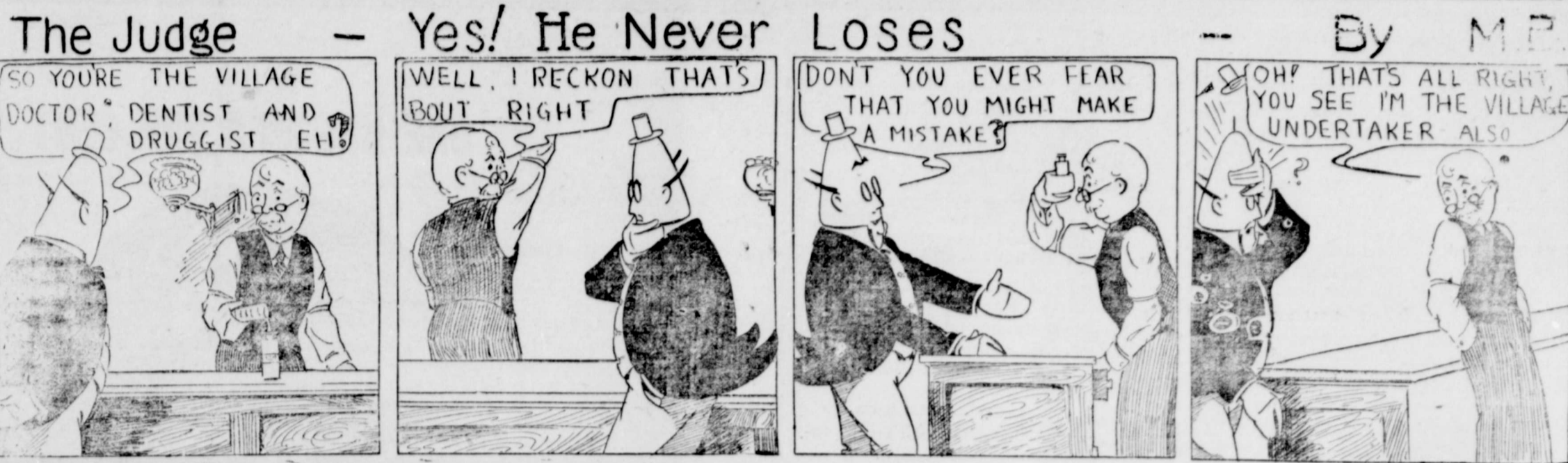
—Application has been filed with the Railroad Commission to increase the motor bus fare from Fort Worth to Dallas. The Texas Motor Bus Company is seeking to raise the fifty cent rate to \$1.10 for the 35 miles. The rate of fifty cents was used during the recent rate war between rival bus lines. The hearing on the petition for increase has been set for November 12.

—Shop facilities and terminals of the Missouri-Kansas-Texas Railroad Company will be moved from Smithville, according to the report from the case before the United States Supreme Court. The order granting a writ of certiorari was vacated because it was ruled not to have substantial basis. This case was first opened in 1913, when large sums were demanded from the Katy for violating the anti-trust laws.

—Governor Moody is contemplating a tax revision which will call for a five-cent reduction on each hundred dollars for the current year, if the law permits a change. The general prosperity of the State and large income from the prison farms have brought more money than was expected, Governor Moody said, and furnished the basis for the tax cut.

—S. Davies Warfield, president of the Seaboard Airline Railway, who died recently, left a will which directs that his entire residuary estate, estimated to be from \$5,000,000 to \$10,000,000 shall be used to found a home for dependent aged women.

—In an open letter to Al Smith published in the Saturday Evening Post, Will Rodgers does not give Al Smith much encouragement as candidate for the nomination to the presidency of the United States. He says: "If you get it you will split your party, because unfortunately they are not composed entirely of the brains of our commonwealth. * * * Now, Al, don't let them kid you; you can't beat this guy Coolidge."

—The American Bankers Association meeting in Houston last week elected as president Thomas A. Preston of Chattanooga, a country product, to succeed Melvin R. Taylor of Chicago, another country boy who grew up in Texas.

—Following the ruling of the University of Oklahoma that students could not use automobiles, the boys and girls have reverted to buggies. Antiquated buggies and horses are brought in from the farms to replace the motor cars.

—The Texas Chapter of the United Daughters of the Confederacy will hold their 1928 session in Waco, according to reports from the recent annual meet in Wichita Falls. Mrs. Forrest H. Farley, Austin, was re-elected president of the organization.

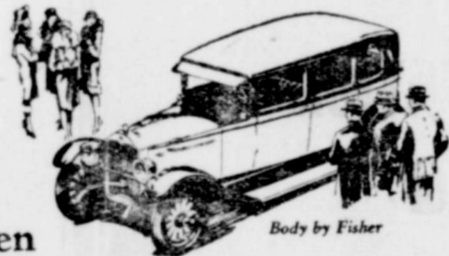

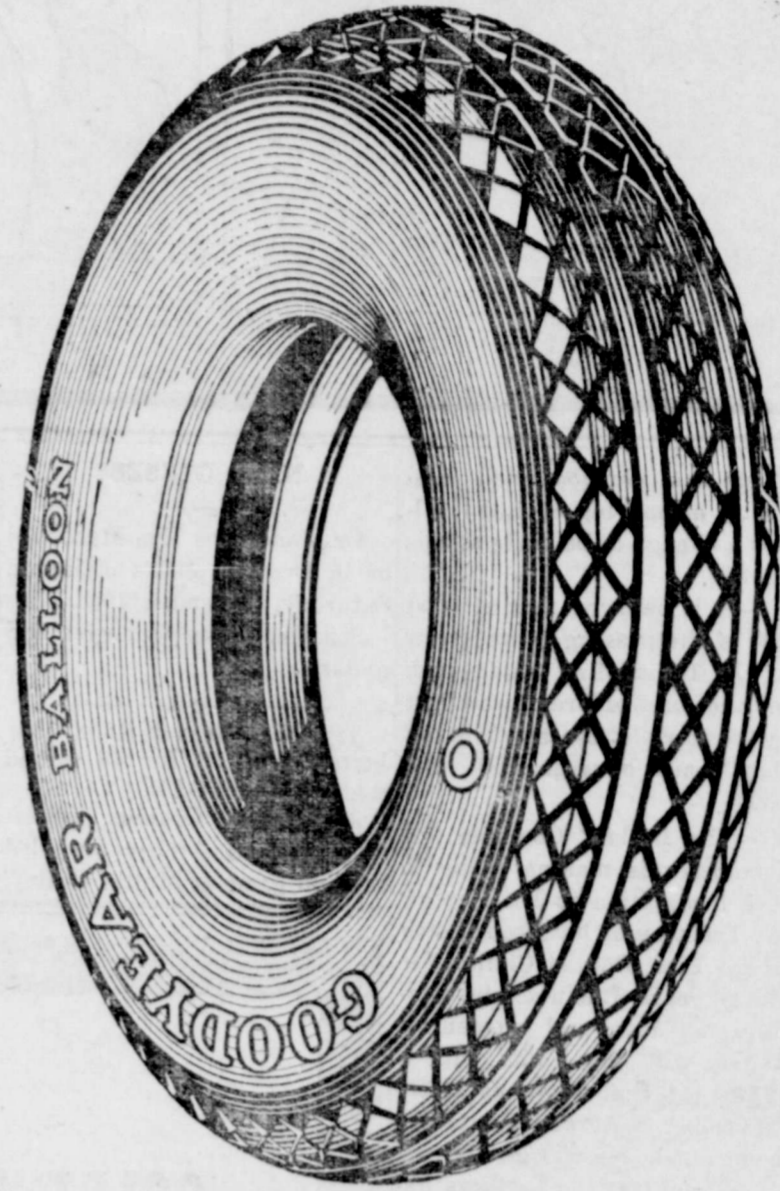

SUNDAY, NOV. 13, 1927

HOSEA PREACHES GOD'S LOVE

GOLDEN TEXT — I desire goodness, and not sacrifice; and the knowledge of God more than burnt offerings. — Hosea 6:6.

Hosea, the son of Beeri, was probably a native of Ephraim, strongest of the ten tribes. If the first three chapters of his book are not allegorical, his home life was wretched, but it enable him to proclaim more fully the love of God to a faithless people. His ministry probably closed a short time before the fall of Samaria, in 721 B. C. His book falls into two parts: three chapters of symbolic history, in which the prophet's family life, with its dark unfaithfulness and its dreadful misery, was but the picture of the relation Israel sustained to Jehovah; and the eleven chapters containing fragments of his later ministry with its denunciation of sin, the threat and vision of swift-coming punishment, the urgent plea for deep national penitence and the tender promise of restoration.

Lesson Text and Outline
I. THE PROVIDENCE OF LOVE.

When Israel was a child, then I loved him, and called him my son out of Egypt. 2 The more the prophets called them, the more they went from them; they sacrificed unto Baalim, and burned incense to graven images. 3 Yet I taught Ephraim to walk; I took them on my arms; but they knew not that I healed them. 4 I drew them with cords of a man, with bands of love; and I was to them as they that lift up the yoke on their jaws; and I laid food before them.

II. THE PATIENCE OF LOVE.

8 How shall I give thee off, Ephraim? how shall I cast thee off, Israel? how shall I make thee as Admah? how shall I set thee as Zeboim? my heart is turned within me, my compassions are kindled together. 9 I will not execute the fierceness of my anger, I will not return to destroy Ephraim: for I am God, and not man; the Holy One in midst of thee; and I will not come in wrath. 10 I will heal their backsliding, I will love them freely; for mine anger is turned away from him. I will be as the dew unto Israel; he shall blossom as the lily, and cast forth his roots as Lebanon. 6 They that dwell under his shadow shall return; they shall revive as the grain, and blossom as the vine, the scent thereof shall be as the wine of Lebanon. 8 Ephraim shall say, what have I to do any more with idols? I have answered and will regard him: I am like a green fir tree; from me thy fruit found.

Notes Analytical and Expository

I. CARE FOR THE CARE-FREE: There is the providence of God's love. From this point of view ten things are told us of the national childhood of Israel. (1) There was the helplessness of childhood, for Israel was a child in its early days. (2) There was the love of childhood, for God regarded the infant nation with tender compassion. (3) There was the call to childhood, for God called Israel out of Egypt at the exodus—a historical event typifying the flight into Egypt with the infant Savior, and in due time their return to Galilee. (4) There was the folly of childhood, for Israel ran away unheeding from its prophets and to their sorrow sacrificed unto the Baalim, burning incense also before graven images in wanton idolatry. (5) There was the instruction of childhood, for God taught Ephraim, strongest of the ten tribes and representative of all Israel to walk in self-reliance and safety. (6) There was the support of childhood, for time and again it was necessary for Jehovah to take the Israelites upon his arms omnipotent. (7) There was the guidance of childhood, for it was God alone who could relieve them of their

bruises and wounds, though often they failed to recognize his presence. (8) There was the guidance of childhood, for God drew them as a child is guided by leading strings which proved to be bands of love. (9) There was the alleviation of childhood, for God shared their burdens even as the humane teamster lifts the yoke from the jaws of his fatigued oxen. (10) There was the sustenance of childhood, for God laid food before them even as he provided quails and manna and streams of living water in the wilderness.

2. COMPASSION FOR THE CARELESS: There is the patience of God's love. (1) There was a triple cumulative strain on love yearnings: How could Jehovah give up Ephraim, the pride and glory of the northern kingdom? How could he cast off Israel the chosen people despite their teeming iniquities? How could he destroy the cities in the chosen land even as he had utterly consumed the towns of Admah and Zeboim with the neighboring cities of Sodom and Gomorrah? (2) There was a triple cumulative accomplishment of love refraining: God would not execute the fierceness of his anger though it were rightly deserved; he would not return to destroy Ephraim though that obstinate tribe had invited the blow; and he would not come in wrath which implies that he would come back to them in love. (3) There was a triple reason why the divine heart recoiled from deserved destruction and the divine compassion was kindled with mercy: he is God and not man, so he will be governed by a higher rule of conduct; he is the Holy One, and hence mercy must be linked with justice; and he is in the midst of his people so that he can hear their cry and guard their welfare.

3. COMFORT FOR THE CARING: There is the promise of God's love. Observe what is said by the Lord, the prophets, and the nation. (1) The Lord's promise, conditioned on the nation's penitence, involves a pardon for past sin and love for future protection. He then expresses his tenderness toward his people in a series of beautiful figures. He will be to them what the copious dews are to vegetation in the dry season. He will make them beautiful as the royal lily, permanent as the deep-rooted cedars of Lebanon, fruitful as the verdant olive, and fragrant as the odoriferous shrubs and flowers of the Lebanon mountains. (2) The prophet's assurance is to the effect that they that dwell under his shadow shall return. They shall not always remain alienated from God and maimed by successive calamities. As the buried grain breaks the clouds and emerges above the surface in living strength, so will Israel recover finally from its desolations. It shall also blossom as the vine with the further promise of glorious fruitage. It shall further enjoy a glad fruition comparable to the aromatic restorative wine of the famous vineyards of Lebanon. (3) The nation's profession involved abandonment of its idolatrous. It renounces false gods in the decisive interrogatory: "What have I to do any more with idols?" (4) The Lord's response to genuine repentance is ever and absolutely gracious: "I have answered and will regard him." Divine favor is naturally followed by (5) The nation's prosperity. It is like the green fir tree retaining its foliage alike in the heat of summer and the cold of winter. It attains royal-stateness despite handicaps and hindrances. But lest the nation should become proud and forgetful, it is reminded of (6) The Lord's claim: "From me is thy fruit found." Certainly the giver of life is the source of fruitfulness.
