HOME CURING OF PORK

The cotton situation is causing farmers to think of the possibilities of hog production, also the production of feed and food for themselves and their live-stock. The records show that over half of the farms in Texas have no hogs, and we do not believe that it will be possible to get all the farmers to produce hogs for home meat consumption, especially during times of depressed hog prices until they learn to do a good job of curing their own meat, advises E. R. Eudaly, Extension Service Swine Specialist, A & M. College of Texas.

Curing pork is not only a matter of making it keep. It must be put up in such a manner that it will make a desirable food. Not only must it be tasty when first cured, but it should stay that way for twelve months. Mr. Eudaly does not think that the dry salt method fulfills these requirements. Sugar curing by the brine process, he says is always followed by folks once they have learned to use it.

There are several formulas for making this brine, the following being a good one:

- 10 gallons water
- 20 lbs. salt
- 5 lbs. brown sugar
- 5 ounces salt peter.

Bring the water to a boil, then add the salt. Stir this about a minute then add the sugar and salt peter. Continue to stir until all is dissolved. Allow this to cool and the brine is ready.

It's preferable to kill the hog in the afternoon. Cut up the meat and rub salt on it, spread it out and allow to stand overnight. In the meantime, make the brine as directed and allow it to stand overnight.

The next morning pack the meat in a barrel. Pack the hams and shoulders first, with the skin side up, then pack the side meat with the skin side up. Put a weight on the meat and pour the brine over it. Let it stand in this manner for three weeks. At this time, take out the side meat and hang it up to drip. Weight the hams and shoulders down in the brine again and leave it there another ten days. At this time, take these out and hang up to drip. When all the meat is drip ped dry, smoke it and then wrap it. This is usually done by first wrapping with newspapers and then cotton sacking. Be sure to sew the cloth on tight so that no bugs nor flies can get to the meat. Sew on a strap to hang the package with. Hang it in a cool place and you will have good meat as you can buy during the entire year.

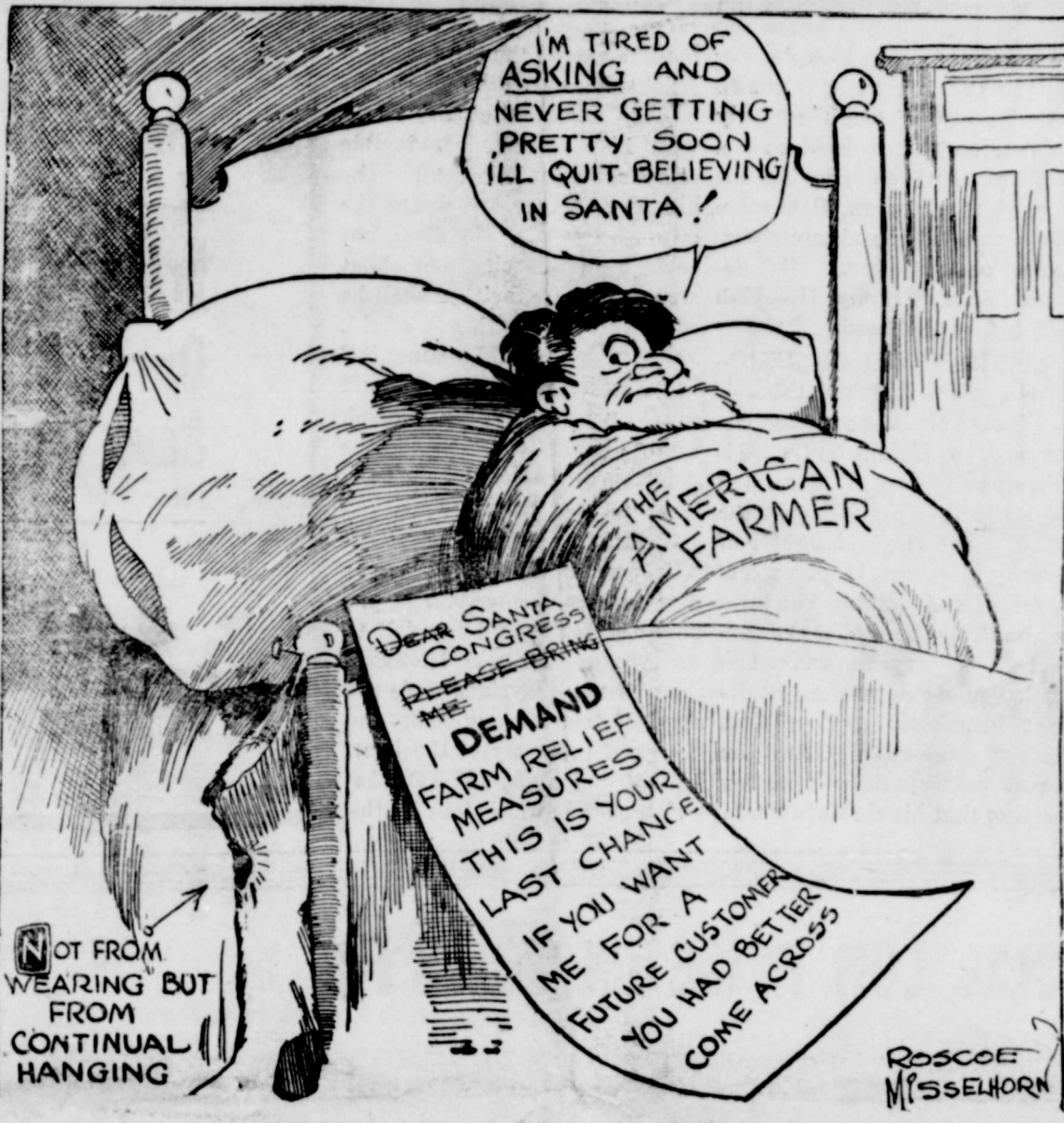

THE PASSING OF A PIONEER CITIZEN

On Tuesday afternoon, December 6, at one-thirty, the community was saddened by the news of the death of one of its most widely known citizens, M. C. Humphries. Mr. Humphries was in his eightieth year and had been in failing health for some months, and on Saturday night became critically ill, lapsed into a state of unconsciousness from which he never rallied.

Marion Calvin Humphries was born August 9th, 1848 in Georgia, but his parents moved to Alabama in early childhood. He was educated at Auburn College, Auburn, Alabama. He specialized in Latin and Greek, which subjects he taught in Clarksville, Tennessee during his early manhood.

In 1871, he was married to Miss Emily Comfort Simms of Elmore county, Alabama. Six children were born of this union and he is survived by three daughters, Miss Dera Humphries Goldthwaite, Mrs. William S. McCall, Waco and Mrs. John C. Hicks, Fort Worth.

Mr. and Mrs. Humphries were among the early citizens of Mills county and were present when the first lots of Goldthwaite were sold. They celebrated their golden wedding anniversary five years ago and soon after Mrs. Humphries passed on to her heavenly home.

Mr. Humphries (Prof. Humphries, as he was lovingly called by the early settlers) was early identified with the educational movements of this section. Assisted by Mrs. Humphries, he first taught the Big Valley School. Later Mr. Humphries was one of the first superintendents of the Goldthwaite Public Schools, and many of the leading citizens of Mills county and other parts of Texas bear witness to the extraordinary ability of both Mr. and Mrs. Humphries as instructors and moulders of character.

Mr. Humphries has served as President of the County Board of Education since its organization some fifteen years ago. During this period, guided by keen foresight and the courage of his convictions, he has worked faithfully for the consolidation and betterment of rural schools. His efficiency in this line was especially commended by the State Superintendent of Education and the county truly owes him a debt of gratitude for his untiring work.

Mr. Humphries was a director in the Trent State Bank and was actively engaged in the loan business up to the time of his death.

He had been affiliated with the Baptist church for over forty years and his long and honorable life was a continuous exemplification of the real principles of practical Christianity. Mr. Humphries was a southern gentleman of the old school. For genuine courtesy attainments he was without a peer.

More than thirty years ago he was suddenly stricken with total blindness, but rising superior to this great handicap, he radiated good will and cheer to all with whom he came in contact and was known as the

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

SUNDAY, OCTOBER 11, 1927

ISAIAH COUNSELS RULERS

GOLDEN TEXT—Thou shalt keep him in perfect peace, whose mind is stayed on thee; because he trusted in thee. Isaiah 26:3.

Lesson Setting and Survey

It was a dark and cloudy day for Judah when in 701 B. C. Sennacherib invaded its territory and called on Jerusalem for abject and unconditional surrender. But the Assyrian monarch did not figure on Hezekiah's prayer and Isaiah's faith and Jehovah's power.

Lesson Text and Outline

Isaiah 37:3-11, 14-20

I. THE COUNSEL OF ISAIAH.

5 So the servants of king Hezekiah came to Isaiah. 6 And Isaiah said unto them, Thus shall ye say to your master, Thus saith Jehovah, be not afraid of the words that thou hast heard, wherewith the servants of the king of Assyria have blasphemed me. 7 Behold, I will put a spirit in him, and he shall hear tidings, and shall return unto his own land; and I shall cause him to fall by the sword of his own hand.

II. THE THREAT OF SENNACHERIB.

8 So Rabshaken returned, and found the king of Assyria warring against Libnah; for he had heard that he was departed from Lachish. 9 And he heard say concerning Tihakah king of Ethiopia, He is come out to fight against thee. And when he heard it, he sent messengers to Hezekiah, saying, 10 Thus saith ye speak to Hezekiah king of Judah, saying, Let not thy God in whom thou trustest deceive thee, saying, Jerusalem shall not be given into the hand of the king of Assyria. 11 Behold, thou hast heard what the kings of Assyria have done to all lands, by destroying them utterly: and shalt thou be deceived?

III. THE PRAYER OF HEZEKIAH.

14 And Hezekiah received the letter from the hand of his messengers, and read it: and Hezekiah went up unto the house of Jehovah, and spread it before Jehovah. 15 And Hezekiah prayed unto Jehovah, saying, 16 O Jehovah of hosts, the God of Israel, that sitteth above the cherubim, thou art the God even thou alone, of all the kingdoms of the earth; thou hast made heaven and earth. 17 Incline thine ear, O Jehovah, and hear; open thine eyes, O Jehovah, and see; and hear all the words of Sennacherib, who hath sent to defy the living God. 18 Of a truth, Jehovah, the kings of Assyria have laid waste all

the countries and their land, 19 and have cast their gods into the fire: for they were no gods, but the work of men's hands, wood and stone; therefore they have destroyed them. 20 Now therefore, O Jehovah our God save us from his hand, that all the kingdoms of the earth may know that thou are Jehovah, even thou only.

Notes Analytical and Expository

We may glimpse in brief the religious aspect of one of the most remarkable military campaigns in history.

1. THE HOUSE OF JEHOVAH.

AH was the house of prayer for Hezekiah. He had been on the throne of Judah for twenty-three years. Isaiah had been prophesying for forty years, and Sennacherib had just ascended the throne of Assyria. So important was this Assyrian campaign into Palestine that record was made of it in the royal library at Nineveh and it is mentioned in three books of the Bible. We recall that king Ahaz, the father of Hezekiah, had during the reign of Tiglath-Bilaser acceded to the demands of that monarch and sent yearly tribute to Nineveh, the Assyrian capital. Revolt in the Northern Kingdom had been put down with a cruel hand in bitter campaigns waged successively by Shalmaneser and Sargon, culminating in the overthrow of Samaria and the deporting of many Jews to the far East. It appears that Judah continued the alliance with Assyria until Sennacherib, the son of Sargon, came to the throne. Thereupon insurrection broke

out in various parts of the Assyrian empire. Thus the fires of revolt were kindled in Palestine, Hezekiah joining the Philistines and the Phoenician states in throwing off the foreign yoke and refusing to send tribute. Of course, the new Assyrian monarch would use his utmost to put down the rebellion with great treasure, lion. Accordingly in the year 701 B. C. he invaded these countries, beginning on the north and with merciless hand laying waste the country, battering down the cities and subjugating the people. As the foe swept on toward Jerusalem, Hezekiah strengthened his fortifications and encouraged his people. However, he was decided to purifying the public purse and even stripping the Temple. For a time the invader was pacified, but eith through cupidity or fear to leave behind such a well fortified city during his Egyptian campaign, Sennacherib demanded the absolute surrender of Jerusalem. His defiant letter was by Hezekiah laid before the Lord.

2. THE WORD OF JEHOVAH.

VAH came to Isaiah at this critical hour. (1) It contained assurance to Hezekiah that his prayer was heard. It described the attitude of Jerusalem to the invader; the virgin daughter of Zion despises him, laughing him to scorn, and shaking her head at him. It declared that the conduct of the Assyrian was not so much against Jerusalem as defiant blasphemy against God, the holy one of Israel. And the merest balderdash was all his boasting that his chariots would

penetrate to the height of Lebanon mountains, and that with the sole of his feet he would dry up the rivers of Egypt. Let Hezekiah be assured from God in the presence of such a foe. (2) It announced the overthrow of Sennacherib. God is God who alone can say: "I have done it long ago." God permits, and hence the Assyrian could "lay waste fortified cities into ruinous heaps." God knows, and so every action and every word of blasphemy rises before him. God punishes; hence in return for his raging arrogance God will put a hook in his nose and a bridle in his lips and turn him back the way he came. The proud Assyrian should go down in defeat. (3) It predicted the safety of Jerusalem. The proposed siege of the Jewish capital should never take place. The mighty monarch of the East with his hitherto invincible army should not ascend the hill of Zion nor lay waste the city of David. "He shall not come unto this city, nor shoot an arrow there, neither shall he come before it with a shield, nor cast up a mound against it." Speedily he should take himself to his own country, for Jehovah would defend Jerusalem to save it for his own sake and the sake of his servant David.

3. THE ANGEL OF JEHOVAH.

AH accomplished the overthrow of Sennacherib. The prophecy of Isaiah did not fall to the ground nor did Hezekiah camp of the Assyrians went the angel of Jehovah and smote the flower of the army of the East. In that one night 185,000 Assyrian soldier were slain by the

angel of the Lord. What was the consternation of king and generals to find the camp next morning strewn with so many corpses. Under this swift, fell stroke the Assyrian monarch reeled; he at once abandoned his campaign; and by swift passage returned to Nineveh. Twenty years longer he sat

upon the Assyrian throne, but never again did he dare to invade Judah and defy the people of the living God.

MEMORIAL SERVICES FOR JAMES CHARLES GILLESPIE IN CHAPEL

On Wednesday morning, in the high school auditorium, memorial services were held for our beloved friend and fellow-student, James Charles Gillespie. The invocation was said by Reverend Moore.

After the invocation Brother Dance said the following passages from the Bible: The 14th Chapter of John, "Let not your heart be troubled; ye believe in God, believe also in me. In my father's house are many mansions. If it were not so I would not have told you. I go to prepare a place for you, and if I go I will come again; that where I am, there you may be also." The 17th chapter of Luke, "And it came to pass that the day after he went into a city called Nain; and many of his disciples went with him and much people. Now when he came close to the gate of the city, behold, there was a dead man being carried out, the only son of his mother, and she was a widow; and much people of the city were with her. And when the Lord saw her, he had compassion on her, and he said unto her, Weep not. And he came and touched the bier and they that bore him stood still. And he said, Young man, I say unto thee, Arise; the 15th chapter of First Corinthians, "Now this I say, brethren, that flesh and blood cannot inherit the kingdom of God; neither corruption inherit incorruption. Behold, I shew you a mystery; we shall not all sleep, but we shall all be changed in a moment in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trump; for the trumpet shall sound, and the dead shall be raised incor-

IN MEMORY OF JAMES CHARLES GILLESPIE

James Charles, one of our most beloved and highly esteemed students, was born in Ladonia, Texas, April the third 1908.

There he spent the first four years of his life.

In 1912 his family moved to Goldthwaite where they were respected citizen for 13 years. James Charles entered school

when he was seven years old, and for eleven years he ranked uppermost among his teachers, classes and classmates. While he was in the grammar grades he stood among the foremost in small class activities, always lending his aid to programs, plays and other entertainments. When he reached the fifth grade he still maintained his high honors. In 1921 he graduated from the Goldthwaite Grammar School. He was among the five who had the highest averages in the class. With this he ended his childhood days and entered upon the threshold of young manhood.

The following fall of 1922 he entered the Goldthwaite High School, registering as a freshman. Even in this rank he stood out, for he was one of the class officers.

In his sophomore year he began to take a more prominent place in student activities, again being one of the class officers.

In his Junior year he was a member of the football, track, and baseball teams.

In the year 1925-26 however, when James Charles was a senior he attained greatest glory. He was secretary and treasurer of the class, a member of the football, baseball, basketball, and track teams, took part in the senior play and was a leader

in student activities. Especially did he shine in athletics. He may well be remembered as "That plunging, tackling fullback of '25."

He graduated in 26 and as before he was one of the leaders of his class.

In the summer of the year James Charles finished school his family moved to Arizona. There James Charles attended junior college. He maintained his good high school and grammar school record there, and was also a member of the football squad.

The next year his family moved to Dallas and there James Charles took up the study of aviation. It was while he was in this occupation that he met his tragic but heroic death, November 28, 1927 at 2:45 p. m.

During the years that James Charles was in our midst all who came in contact with him learned to love him. Let us remember him as one of our brave, honorable and esteemed friends.

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

DECEMBER 18, 1927.

REVIEW

(Special Application to Works of Justice and Benevolence.)

GOLDEN TEXT—God, having of old time spoken unto the fathers in the prophets by divers portions and in divers manners, hath at the end of those days spoken unto us in his Son. Hebrews 1:1,2.

Lesson Setting and Survey
We have studied during the quarter some messages from the early prophets of Israel. Our review of these messages may be adapted to Benevolence Day as observed today for orphanages and hospitals by the Sunday schools of the Southern Baptist Convention. The following topics for all departments have been suggested by the Lesson Committee of the Convention: (1) The voice of God through his ministers, lessons 1 to 5; and (2) The plea of the prophets for justice and love, lessons 6 to 11.

Devotional Reading

Psalm 17
Jehovah, who shall sojourn in thy tabernacle?
Who shall dwell in thy holy hill?
2 He that walketh uprightly, and worketh righteousness, and speaketh truth in his heart;
3 He that slandereth not with his tongue,
Nor doeth evil to his friend, Nor taketh up a reproach against his neighbor;
4 In whose eyes a reprobate is despised,
But who honoreth them that fear Jehovah
He that sweareth to his own hurt, and changeth not;
5 He that putteth not out his money to interest,
Nor taketh reward against the innocent.
He that doeth these things shall never be moved.
Notes Analytical and Expository

I. THE VOICE OF GOD THROUGH HIS MINISTERS.

1. **Elijah on Mount Carmel.** At the word of the prophet, King Ahab had called a great national assembly on the summit of Mount Carmel. The prophets of Baal with everything in their favor failed to stand the test. At the hour of evening sacrifice Elijah repaired to the altar, made his sacrifice and offered his prayer. At once the fire of Jehovah fell and Israel shouted its verdict in favor of Jehovah as God of Israel.

2. **Elijah Hears God's Voice.** Under the threat of Jezebel and seeing that his expected reformation was nipped in the bud, Elijah fled far southward to Sinai. But God spoke to him so that as he hidged in the cave he heard the voice of attention; as he stood on the mount he heard the voice of authority; and as he wrapped his face in the mantle he heard the voice of action.

3. **Elijah in Naboth's Vineyard.** The petulance of Ahab, king of Israel, was due to his covetousness, for her ardently desired to own the vineyard of Naboth of Jezreel. Through the infamous plot of Jezebel the crime was committed resulting in the falsely accused Naboth and the reversion of his vineyard to the crown. But no sooner had Ahab gone to Jezreel to take possession than Elijah met him and thundered upon him the wrath of God.

4. **The Call of the Prophet.** Elisha was a planter at the plow when he received his call to be a prophet. Amos was a shepherd among the sycamores when he received his call. Isaiah was a courtier in the Temple when he received his call. In every case the call came from God and pointed the way

to high service for god and men.

5. **Amos Denounces Sin.** In his judgment which Amos pronounced upon Judah we have the Godward aspect of sin. In the judgment which he pronounced upon Israel we have the manward aspect of sin. In the indifference of all to the warning involved in the destruction of the Amorites, we have the selfward aspect of sin. Wanted: Prophets who will denounce sin.

II. THE PLEA OF THE PROPHETS FOR JUSTICE AND LOVE.

6. **Amos Pleads for Justice.** The national aspect of justice is presented in the lamentation of the fallen virgin of Israel. The social aspect of justice is presented in the opposition which tramples upon the poor. The moral aspect of sin is presented in the reformation which aspires to the higher goal of the good. The spiritual aspect of justice is presented in the redemption which produces righteouness as a mighty stream.

7. **Hosea Preaches Love.** The prophet tells us of the providence of God's love in the divine care of the care-free in their helplessness and dependence. He tells of the patience of God's love in the divine compassion for the careless. And he tells of the promise of God's love in the divine comfort for those who care. In the old dispensation, as in the new, love is the greatest thing in the world.

8. **Micah Champions the Oppressed.** The oppressor of his fellowmen is sure to invite the woes of divine wrath. He cannot escape his accountability to God. He must be arraigned before God and the world. Let not the divine expostulation be in vain. Let not one seek to hide his sins under formal sacrifices. Let him know what God requires of him in order to live a righteous life. Let him know finally that wickedness unrepented of ends in woe unutterable.

9. **Isaiah Teaches True Worship.** There is such a thing as false worship; and it is direct, not defiant, rebellion against God. Its sacrifices are sinful. Its oblations are vain. Its spirit is sinister. On the other hand, true worship is the possibility and privilege of everybody. We are invited to come and reason with Jehovah. He will show us our sins and how to be delivered from them. In mercy he is willing, if we are willing, to remove the blackness of darkness out of us and make us whiter than snow.

10. **Isiah Teaches Right Living.** In his beautiful Song of the Vineyard the great prophet sketches before us our opportunity and duty in right living. Alas, we, like Israel of old, do not seize the opportunity and perform our duty. Then we, like them, much merit the woes pronounced upon wrong living. Ruin at last is inevitable for those who rebel against God and refuse to do his will. But they who are right with God will be right forevermore.

11. **Isaiah Counsels Rulers.** when Sennacherib, king of Assyria, invaded Judah and called for the unconditional surrender of Jerusalem, it was a dark hour for King Hezekiah. But the invader did not strike the intended blow, for he himself recoiled homeward under the terrific stroke of Jehovah in answer to the prayer of Hezekiah and the counsel of Isaiah.

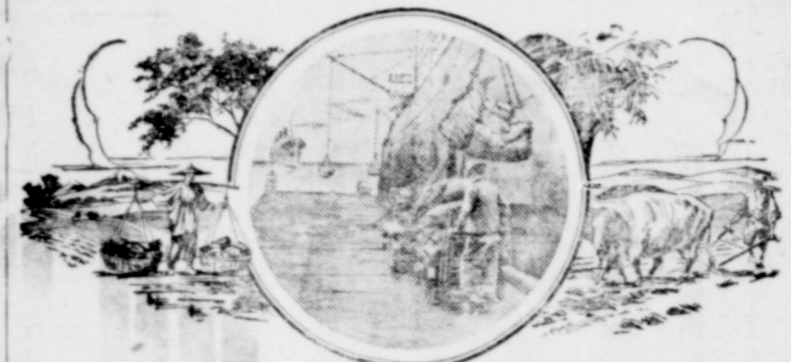

AIR FIXED NITRATE FERTILIZERS ARE NOW SHIPPED TO FAR LANDS

Made At Niagara Falls And Warners, N. J., For Shipment To Japan And Java

Nitrogen from the air—thousands of tons of it—are being manufactured and turned into fertilizers, right here in the United States. With all the controversy about making cheap fertilizers at Muscle Shoals, one might conclude that this is a highly questionable venture. It should be reassuring, therefore, to know that the product is not only made at Niagara Falls but is also being shipped to far lands.

make an extraordinarily high grade fertilizer. This product is ammonium phosphate, containing 15 per cent ammonia and 48 per cent phosphoric acid—about four times the strength of ordinary fertilizer. Strange as it may seem, nearly all of this high grade fertilizer is being shipped out of the country. Japan has been getting most of it, although Cuba, Porto Rico and Java have also received considerable quantities. The amount exported last year was about 65,000 tons.
