**ATTENTION RURAL  
ROUTE PATRONS**

Last year, after inspecting rural routes, I sent out about 150 notices to rural route patrons who were not complying with regulations. On inspecting routes again this year I find that very few patrons had paid any attention to my notices. This, of course, was very disappointing.

I am again notifying all rural route patrons that I will give you until July 1st to comply, by properly erecting your boxes and having your names placed on each side of the box as the regulations require. After that date I propose to make a list of all delinquents and send into the Department and ask that service be withdrawn from such delinquents until they meet the reasonable requirements of the Post Office Department.

Following is the question the postmaster must answer when inspecting routes. "Are the boxes of the patrons in good condition, properly erected, with names of owners printed on them?" Who could say yes to that question? Not your postmaster. Seventy-five per cent of the boxes on the four routes emanating from this office a new box you will receive the are without names. A decent service would be impossible in many instances of the regular carrier should find himself unable to serve his route. I saw six boxes on a route I recently examined on one wheel with no names on the boxes to distinguish their owner. This is really a deplorable condition. I am out of excuses to offer for such neglect and my fourteenth report to the Department

will carry facts, but no excuses. Names must be placed on boxes as regulations require. That is the great neglect. Where your box need new support or needs to be replaced by new box you will receive the regular department notice to repair that defect. This notice is intended to secure your name on your box. If your box lacks the name the regulations require this notice is to you.

**SAN SABA NEWS COMMENTS ON THE EAGLE'S BROADCASTING STATION**

In last week's San Saba News appeared the following article concerning the Eagle's broadcasting station KGKB:

**Goldthwaite To Have Broadcasting Station**

San Saba radio bugs, fans and enthusiasts will soon have the pleasure of listening to a station very close to home. Rumors have been afloat for some time now that the neighboring city of Goldthwaite was going to have a radio broadcasting station of its own. Such is an actuality and according to the last issue of the Eagle the station will be on the air the first of June. This enterprising city is to be commended and the Eagle deserves especial praise for the trouble and expense it has gone to in order to provide its city and the world with this modern improvement. The report from the Eagle follows:

**THE CRYSTAL SET**

Part Two

(By M. E. Boatman)

It is a little harder to explain just what is meant by oscillation, so we'll pass it up with this: It is the feeding back of a plate current into the grid circuit of a tube set. Up to a certain point this is called regeneration, and it is one of the most powerful amplifiers in radio. If it is carried too far, the tube will "spill over" and oscillate, causing the unpleasant squeals most of us have experienced whenever a station is tuned in.

Let us go back and review a little to find out why we need a crystal or tube to hear by radio. In the first place, radio frequencies run from about 10,000 cycles per second up into millions. Audio frequencies run from about 10,000 cycles down to about 8 per second. The reason for the two classes is that the human ear will not respond to frequencies about 15,000 cycles per second; some of us can hear a sound pitched that high, and some cannot hear a frequency of over 8,000.

On account of the great distances covered by the higher frequencies, radio transmitting apparatus is tuned so that it sends out a signal on one of these high frequencies. By the arrangement of the apparatus at the sending station the music and voice sounds are sent out at this high frequency wave; the methods of doing this in design, but the effect, called modulation, is the same.

Now we have the signal, or music, on this high-frequency wave—too high for anyone to hear, but which will travel a great distance—so the only logical conclusion is that we must have something to change this high, or radio frequency, back to a low, or audio-frequency, so we can hear the music.

This is exactly what the crystal and vacuum tube does, by

a method that will be explained in a later article.

Some crystals work better than others. Some will require a small battery to make the sounds loud enough to hear while the majority work better without a battery. Some are artificially made and are sensitive to radio waves all over their surfaces, while others are sensitive only in spots, and these must be hunted out and the one found that will give the best results.

Care should be taken in selecting a crystal and in handling it. One should be selected that is fairly sensitive over its entire surface. The crystal should never be handled with dirty or sweaty fingers, as this will get the crystal dirty and make it useless as far as radio is concerned.

The following is a list of parts required for the construction of the crystal set:

- 1 panel, 6x6 inches.
- 1 baseboard, 6x6 inches
- 1 switch lever.
- 10 switch points.
- 4 binding points.
- 1 ice cream container, 4 inches long.
- 100 feet of No. 18, 20, or 22 enameled wire.

- 1 crystal holder and crystal.
- 1 pair 2000 ohm phones.
- 1 aerial equipment.

The aerial equipment consists of two insulators, 100 feet of antenna wire, 25 feet lead-in wire, 25 feet ground wire, ground clamp, lightning arrester, and lead-in insulator.

Next week we will start work on the set itself, so get everything together and be ready to begin.

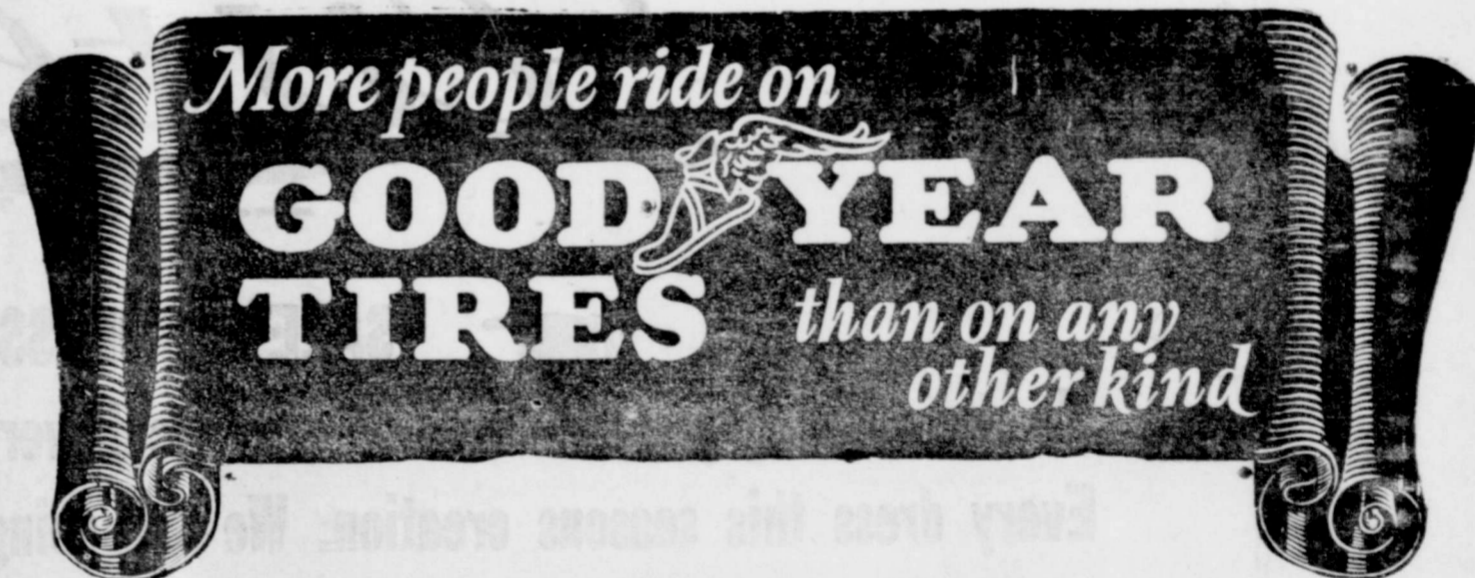

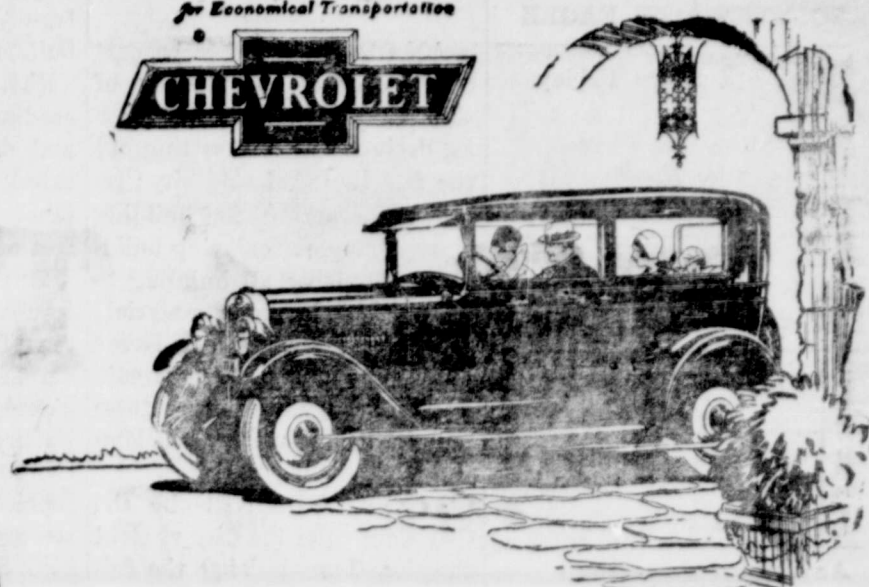

**CHAPTER**

AN ORDINANCE to be part  
of the code of ordinances of  
the city of Goldthwaite, Tex-  
as, designating and setting out  
the fire limits of said city; re-  
quiring a permit for building  
or repairing or removing build-  
ings; requiring all building to  
be of incombustible material;  
limiting building of frame  
buildings; controlling gas con-  
nections, providing for fees;  
and fixing a penalty for viola-  
tion.

BE IT ORDAINED by the  
City Council of the City of Gold-  
thwaite, Texas: That the fol-  
lowing ordinance be enacted:—  
SEC. 1.—FIRE LIMITS:  
The following shall be and  
are hereby declared to be the  
Fire Limits of the City of Gold-  
thwaite, Texas:

BEGINNING at a point in  
the South line of Block 14, mid-  
way between to SE and SW cor-  
ner of said block;

THENCE N 17 W with alley,  
through said Block 14, cross-  
ing 4th street, entering  
Block 9 at alley, thence in the  
same direction through Block 9,  
crossing 3rd street, entering  
Block 5 at alley, continuing in  
same direction, through Block  
5 to North line thereof;

THENCE South 73 W with  
N line of said Block 5; cross-  
ing Fisher street to NE corner  
of Block 6, continuing with N  
line of Block 6 to NW corner  
thereof, crossing Parker street  
to NE corner of Block 7, con-  
tinuing in same direction to al-  
ley in middle of Block 7;

THENCE S 17 E through  
Block 7 to S line thereof, cross-  
ing 3rd street to N line of  
Block 11, through Block 11 in  
the same direction to the S line  
thereof, crossing 4th street to  
N line of Block 16, continuing  
in same direction through  
Block 16 to corner in center of  
S line of said Block 16;

THENCE 73 E with N line  
of 5th street to place of begin-  
ning.

SEC. 2.—PERMIT REQUIRED:  
No wall, structure, building  
or part thereof shall hereafter  
be built, enlarged, or altered  
until a plan of the proposed  
work together with a state-  
ment of materials to be used  
shall have been submitted to  
the Building Committee, who  
shall, if in accordance with the  
provisions herein contained, is-  
sue a permit for the proposed  
construction, authorize the  
City Secretary to issue a per-  
mit for such building or struc-  
ture.

Structures hereafter erected  
without permit or not in con-  
formity with this ordinance,  
shall be removed.

No building shall be mov-  
ed from one location to an-  
other within the fire limits un-  
til a permit has been obtained  
therefor. Permit shall be issued  
only in case the construction is  
in accordance with this ordi-  
nance.

SEC. 3.—INCOMBUSTIBLE  
CONSTRUCTION required  
within the Fire Limits:

Every building hereafter  
erected, altered or enlarged  
within the fire limits, shall be  
enclosed on all sides with walls  
constructed wholly of stone,  
well-burned brick, or reinforc-  
ed concrete, and shall have the  
roof, also the roof and sides of  
all roof structures, covered  
with incombustible material.  
All cornices shall be of incombustible material. (Note—The  
purpose of this section is to  
prohibit the erection within the  
Fire Limits of wooden, ironclad  
stucco, and veneer type build-  
ings).

SEC. 4.—FRAME BUILDINGS:  
No structure, whose walls  
are wholly, or in part, con-  
structed of wood, shall here-  
after be built or moved into  
the fire limits as herein desig-  
nated, or as they may hereafter  
be established, except as fol-  
lows:

(a) Temporary one story  
frame buildings for the use of  
builders;

(b) Small out-houses not ex-  
ceeding 100 square feet in area  
and eight feet in height, not lo-  
cated within 30 feet of any  
other buildings, nor within 5  
feet of any lot line.

Any existing frame or  
iron-clad building within  
the fire limits which may  
hereafter be damaged by  
amount greater than one half  
its present value, exclusive of  
the foundation, shall not be  
repaired or rebuilt, but shall be  
removed.

SEC. 5.—GAS CONNECTIONS:  
Gas connections to stoves and  
similar heating devices, shall  
be made of rigid metal pipes.  
For small portable gas heating  
devices flexible metal or rub-  
ber tubing may be used when  
there is no valve or other shut  
off on the device.

SEC. 6.—FEES:  
Fees for securing a permit  
shall be \$1.00, one half of which  
shall go into the General Fund,  
and one half to the officer is-  
suing the permit.

SEC. 7.—PENALTY:  
Any person or persons, firm  
or corporation violating any of  
the provisions of this ordinance  
shall be deemed guilty of a mis-

demeanor, and on conviction  
shall be fined not less than  
\$10.00 nor more than \$100.00.  
And each day any structure or  
building, erected in violation  
of this ordinance is permitted  
to stand, shall be deemed a  
separate and distinct offense.

This ordinance passed, ap-  
proved and adopted by the  
City Council of the City of  
Goldthwaite, Texas, at a regu-  
lar meeting held the 7th day  
of May A. D. 1928, all mem-  
bers being present, and voting  
for its passage. And it was or-  
dered that said ordinance be  
signed by the Mayor, attested  
by the Secretary, published in  
the Goldthwaite Eagle for one  
week, and thereafter be in full  
force and effect.

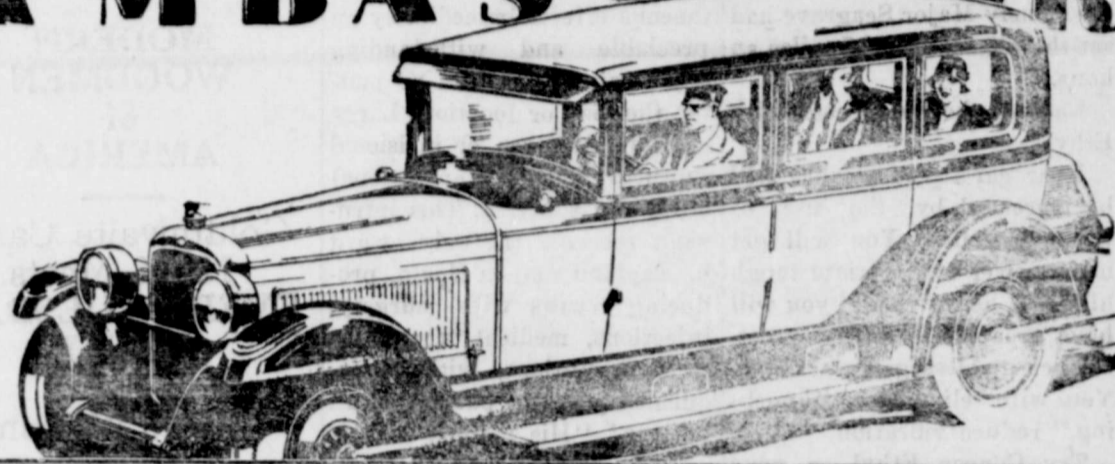

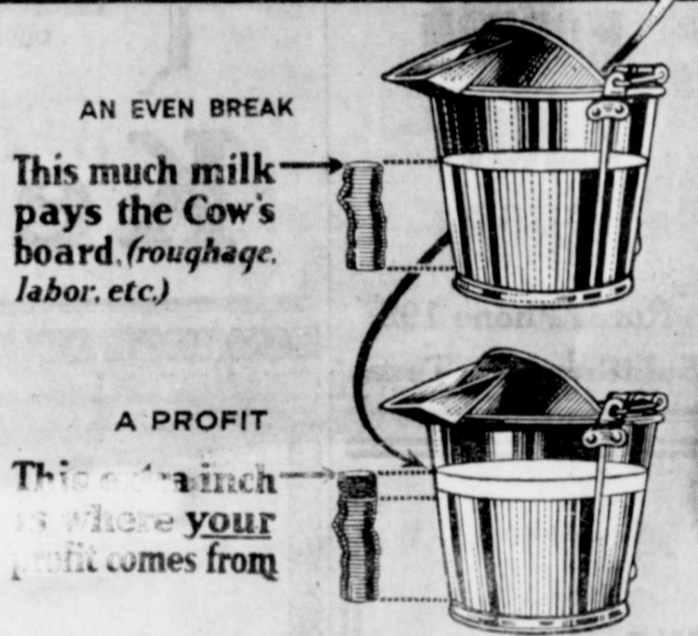

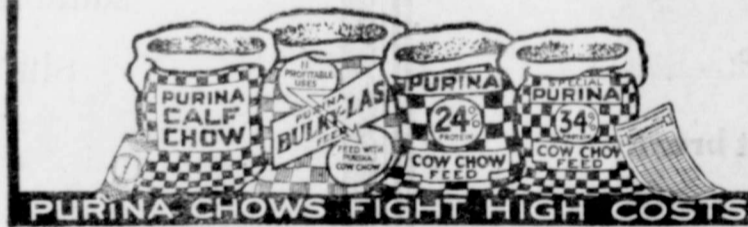
