BERT MAYFIELD ARRESTED EARLY YESTERDAY MORNING

YOUNG MAN CHARGED WITH MURDERING MISS RUBY OS- BORNE ARRESTED THURSDAY

Sheriff C. D. Bledsoe and Deputy E. O. Priddy yesterday arrested Bert Mayfield, charged with the murder of Mrs. A. Delatour (Miss Ruby Osborn) near Hamilton at 10:00 o'clock yesterday morning. Mr. Mayfield was brought to Goldthwaite by the officers. He waived examining trial and his bond was set at \$2500.00 by Judge James S. Rahl. This bond was quickly arranged by the citizens of Hamilton county.

Refuses to Make Statement

Mr. Mayfield, who apparently had been in communication with his lawyer, refused to comment in any way on his guilt or innocence. It is reported that Arthur Eidson, a criminal lawyer of Hamilton, has been engaged to look after Mr. Mayfield's interests. Mr. Mayfield, when asked where he had been hiding, evaded the question, but left the impression that he had been several hundred miles away. Persistent rumors from Indian Gap had it that he was hidden nearby.

Description.
Bert Mayfield is a young man about 23 years old, 5 1/2 ft. high, round face, black eyes and black hair, weight about 135 or 140 pounds, of a rather talkative disposition.

Was Afraid to Surrender

Bert stated that he would have surrendered to officers sooner had not reports come to him that Goldthwaite citizens were fixing to lynch him. He appeared extremely nervous when brought to town.

Officers to be Commended.

Despite some talk to the contrary, Sheriff Bledsoe and his department are to be commended on account of the manner in which he handled the situation after Mr. Mayfield had given them the slip. Careful and persistent work from the first day after the crime was committed resulted in the arrest yesterday.

\$250.00 Reward
Rev. O. O. Moore, pastor of the Methodist church here, quickly raised a reward of \$250.00 for the arrest and conviction of the person guilty of murdering Mrs. Delatour (Miss Osborn). Governor Dan Moody appropriated a like amount for reward.

Special Prosecutors.
It has been hinted that it is the intentions of interested persons to secure special prosecution in his case.

BERT MAYFIELD SURRENDERS

In regard to the tragedy wherein Ruby Osborn lost her life, no one regrets the affair more than the Sheriff's Department and none, I am certain, were more anxious to apprehend the guilty party than we were. However, conditions were against us at this particular time. We had several thousand people here the night of the tragedy and it all happening away out on the San Saba road, in the night and away from the gaze and hearing of anyone, made it difficult to determine on the spur of the moment just who did the deed, but as soon as we could get evidence on which we could base a complaint, rumors rife and violent had preceded us and the party had been spirited away to safety.

The only wise thing to do then was to return home and get in touch with neighboring officers and try to head him off from a complete get-away and in the meantime to try and correct rumors of violence that had gone abroad and try a little strategy and see if we could effect a surrender, which we did through the efforts and courtesy of Judge Arthur Eidson of Hamilton.

Mayfield was brought before Judge Jas. Rahl this morning and after waiving examining trial, his bond was set at \$2500 which was promptly given.

Some of course, will howl, "Oh, it couldn't have been a bondable case." Any case is bondable that precludes the doubt of cold-blooded murder, and the defendant's ability to make bond must also be taken into consideration. The bond is strong and fully efficient to warrant his appearance before the Grand Jury on the 24th day of September and it is now squarely up to the citizens of the county to do your legal right and duty.

If you know anything that would shed any light on this case, come to the Court House and tell it to the proper authorities and don't crawl on the house tops and broadcast it to the four winds.

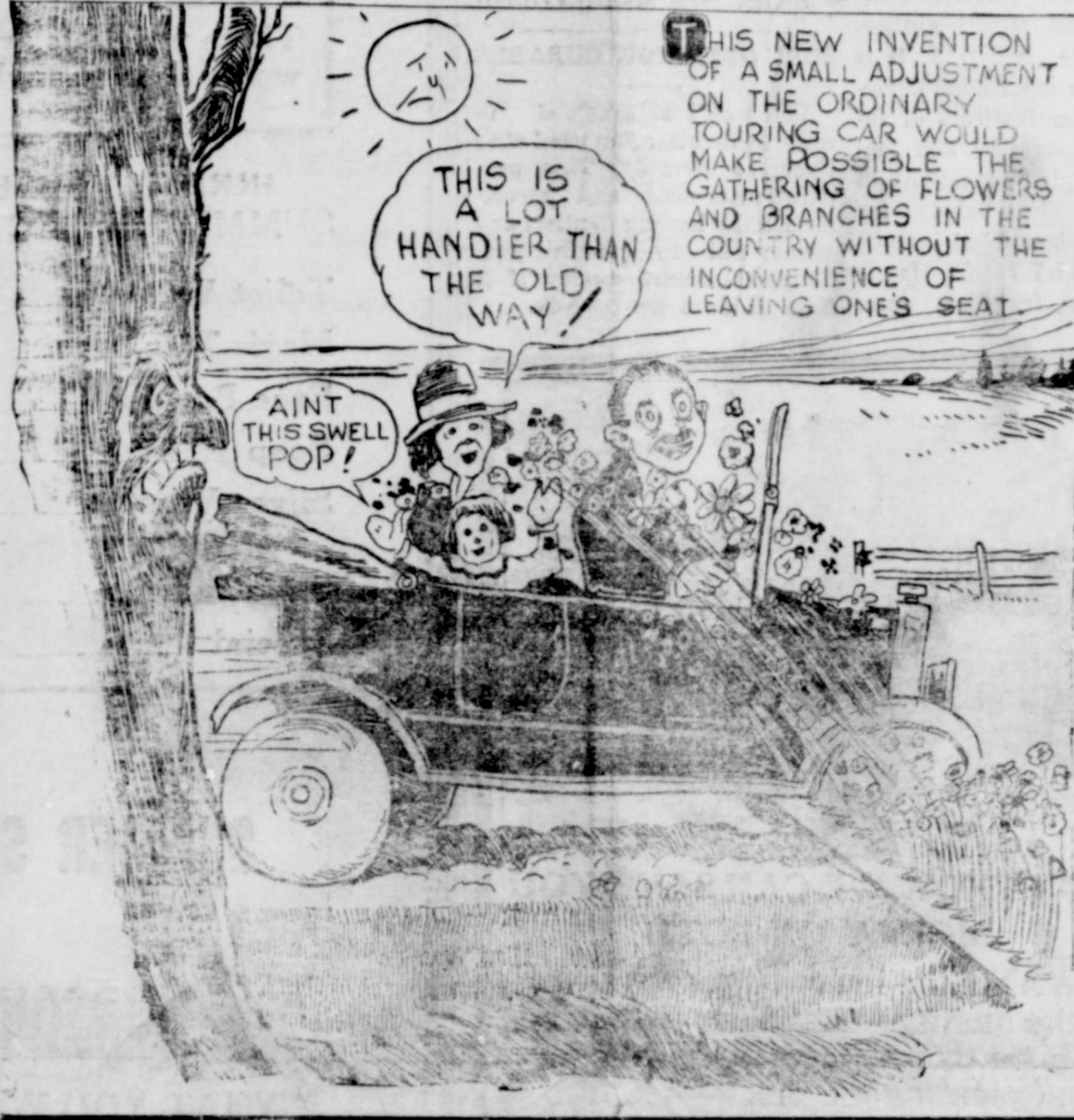
Everybody is invited to attend and help make this meeting a great revival of good in the community.

NEW POSTAL REGULATIONS IN EFFECT JULY 1, 1928

Mailing cards of size and weight of the regulation postal card, 1 cent each.

Newspapers and periodicals, mailed by the public, 1 cent for each two ounces or fraction thereof.

Special Delivery of 2nd, 3rd and 4th class mail with special handling service combined: up to 2 pounds 15c; above 2 pounds, but not exceeding 10 pounds, 25c; above 10 pounds 35c. This in addition to regular postage. This gives 2nd, 3rd, and 4th class mail all the privileges of 1st class mail in handling and transmission and immediate delivery on reaching its destination.

Special delivery for first class mail 10 cents up to 2 lbs. (no change). Over 2 pounds up to 10 pounds 20 cents; over 10 pounds 25 cents, in addition to regular postage.

Special handling without special delivery service, up to 2 pounds 10 cents; over 2 pounds, but not exceeding 10 pounds 15 cents; over 10 pounds 20 cents, each in addition to regular postage. This

POER REPLIES TO JNO. W. ROBERTS

In last week's Eagle Jno W. Roberts replied to me in a lengthy article to an article of mine defining the term Democrat and claiming one who intends to vote against the National Democratic ticket is not a Democrat within the meaning of the statutes. Since my article was written the Court of Criminal Appeals at San Antonio in the Tom Love case has given substantially the same definition.

The Smith wire of acceptance was read and accepted without any word of protest, not even by Dan Moody.

The enemies of the Democratic party have always tried to defeat it by sowing discord and dissension within its ranks. They attack the old line Democrats who, through the years, have stood for the constitution, religious liberty and the rights of man. They carry on propaganda against reorganized Tammany and the vigorous and growing Democracy of the eastern states. No wise general will accept advice from the enemy. Napoleon would not have disbanded the Old Guard nor Caesar the Tenth Legion on the eve of battle. Neither will the Democratic party spurn the powerful aid of its most trusted and loyal supporters.

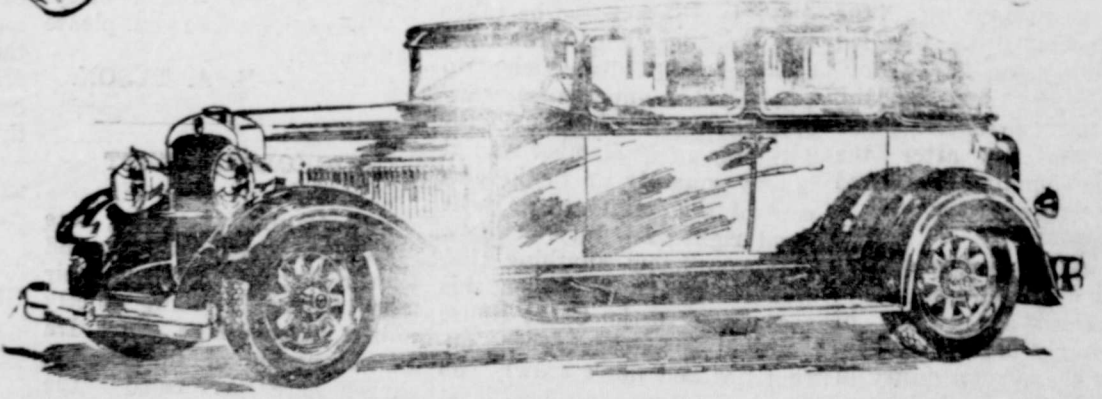

NEW WAYS OF HITCHING HORSES WILL BE SHOWN

It is said that in no state in the Union is the horse staging a stronger "come-back" than in Texas. Hence it is proper that the Horse Association of America, which has begun a national campaign to educate the farmers of America in the proper methods of handling horse, should have been invited to offer its first educational demonstration in the Southwest at the State Fair of Texas, Dallas, Oct. 6 to 21.

One of the most interesting features will be the daily demonstrations of the proper methods of hitching for farm work. This, it is said, is already proving to be an important factor to the benefit of the horse industry.

Olmstead's Opinion
 "I know that it would benefit every farmer in Texas to see these free demonstrations," says Harry A. Olmstead, president of the State Fair. "They will teach our people how to hitch and drive their horses with the 'tying-in' and 'bucking-in' systems, which are the real secret of handling large teams, enabling one man to do as much work in a day as several can do under the old-fashioned system which now prevails."

"The demonstrations at the State Fair of Texas this year will show Texas farmers 4, 5, 6, 8, 10, and 12 horse teams hitched and driven on plows, harrows, discs, cultivators, planters, drills and combinations of these implements, the hitches being made to enable the horses to do more work with less effort and with fewer men to handle the larger teams."

"It is claimed that the farmer can add \$200 a year to his profits by working his horses and mules to the largest possible teams adapted to his farm. If this is true, then it would pay every farmer in Texas to come to the State Fair in October to attend these daily hitching demonstrations alone. Of course we do not expect every farmer in Texas to do this, but those who do come will learn the secrets and have just that much 'edge' upon his neighbors."
