PURER AIR IN AUTOS THAN HUMANS BREATHE

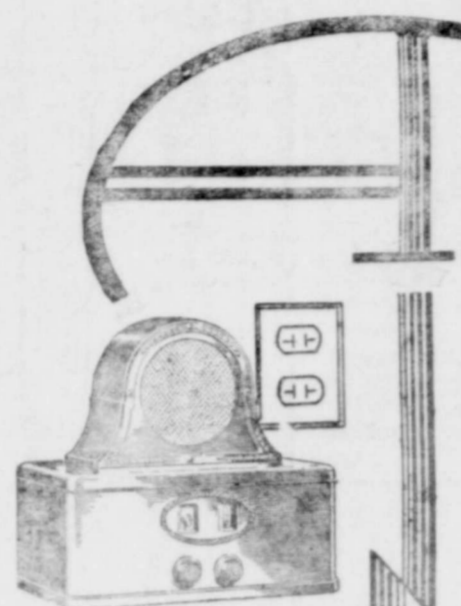

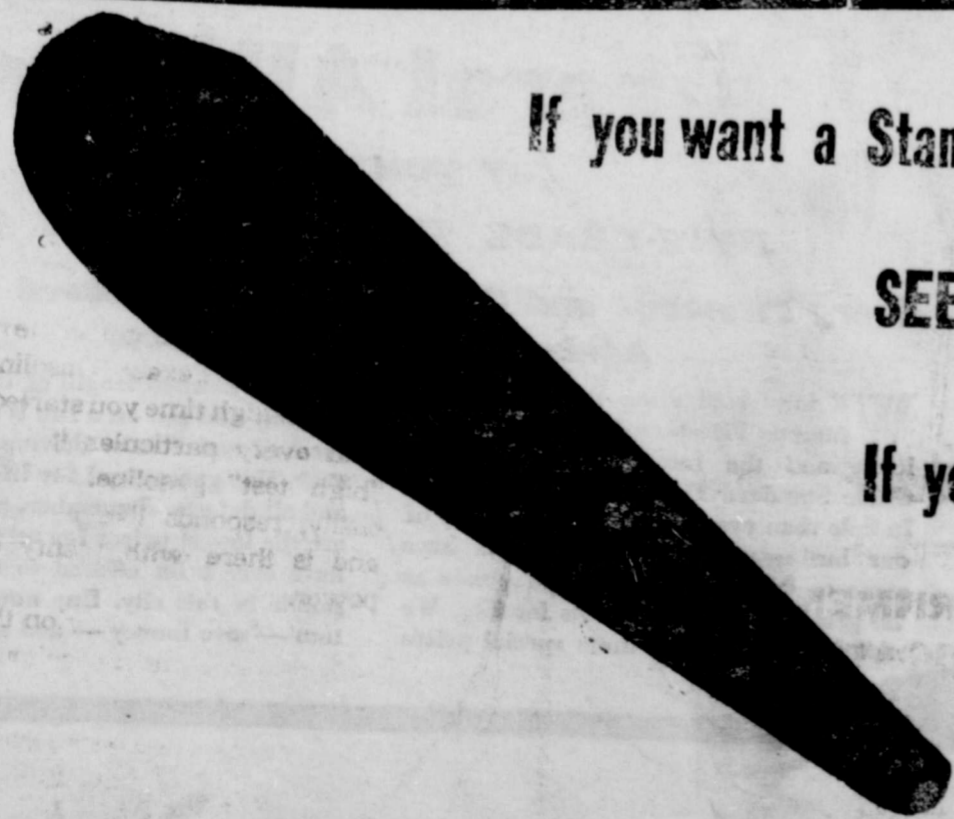


