**CHEESE FACTORY BEGAN PRO-  
DUCTION OF CHEESE TUESDAY**

**NEWEST INDUSTRY IS  
MONEY MAKER FOR  
DAIRY HERD OWNERS**

Last Tuesday morning The Mills County Cheese and Butter Company began to accept orders for the purpose of making cheese. Financial history for Mills County was made that day. While the beginning is small—about 1000 pounds of milk per day—increases should be rapid and December should see a daily production of cheese from 40,000 pounds or more. Trucks are being sent every day to the factory.

A great many of our farmers have become discouraged on account of the long time before the cheese factory was opened and have waited to see whether or not it would open before investing in milk stock. Now that it is open and has plenty of intelligence and financial resources behind it, its success is assured and those who are seriously considering marketing their milk should act at once and bring the production to the required level as quickly as possible.

John Franklin Barnes, president of the W. F. and J. F. **MILLS COUNTY GOES REPUBLICAN  
FOR FIRST TIME IN ITS HISTORY**

**BOLTERS BEAT THE  
STANDFASTERS 2 TO 1**

By a majority of over two to one Mills County went into the Republican ranks nationally last Tuesday—so did Texas and so did the United States. It seems that everything went Republican.

Herbert Hoover was swept into the presidency by the greatest landslide in the history of the U. S. 444 electoral

votes of the 566 were his with the possibility of several more, including Texas, going to him when the final count is in. The ten "Solid South" states were sundered when Virginia, Florida and Texas went over to the Republican ranks. In Mills county Hoover carried—in most cases by a majority of two to one—all but three of the nineteen voting boxes.

**KGKB TO CHANGE  
TO 100 WATTS AND  
1500 KILOCYCLES**

On next Sunday, November eleven, the Goldthwaite Eagle's radio broadcast station KGKB will increase its power from fifty watts to one hundred watts and its wave length from 280.2 meters or 1070 kilocycles.

This is the result of persistent efforts on the part of the Eagle management to get more power and better wave length. At present several high power stations are on the same wave length as the Eagle and, while they did not bother in the day time, at night the interference is so bad that reception is not very good.

On our new wave length there will be only one other station in Texas—a 100 watt station, and none other in the South. This wave, also, while requiring more delicate and high priced equipment, allows far greater distance from the same amount of power.

200 meters will be found on the average dial at 0 to 5. Tests will be made tonight and tomorrow after 1:00 o'clock a. m. and we invite our friends and listeners to tune in and let us know how we are doing on our new wave.

**BAYLOR UNIVERSITY CAMPAIGN IS STARTED**

Special to the Eagle: Waco, Texas, Wednesday, October 7—“One Hundred Hours of Speaking for Baylor” is the goal of the first step toward a state-wide speaking program of the Greater Baylor University campaign on Sunday, November 4, it has been announced at state headquarters here. More than 150 pastors of Baptist churches have been asked to devote their services on that day to the campaign to be conducted simultaneously over the state, Nov. 23 to December 4.

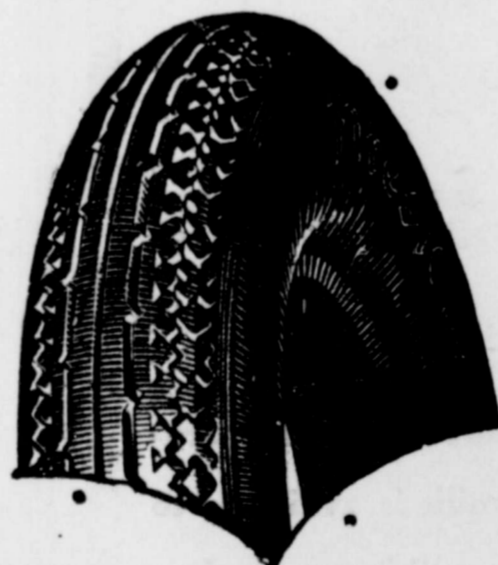

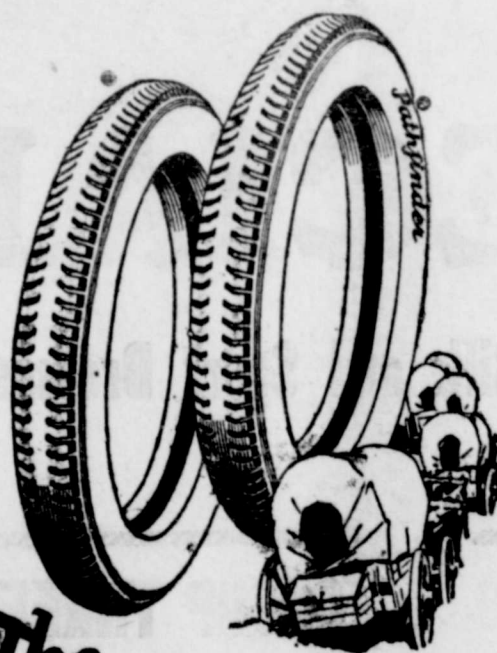

**CHAPTER 63**

An ordinance to be a part of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Goldthwaite, Texas, amending Article 1 of Chapter 60 of the Code of Ordinances of said city, regulating traffic in said City of Goldthwaite, providing for the parking of automobiles therein, repealing the provisions of said Article 1 in conflict herewith, providing a penalty, and declaring an emergency.

BE IT ORDAINED, by the City Council of the City of Goldthwaite, Texas:

Sec. 1. All automobiles, trucks, motor vehicles, and all other vehicles, when brought to a stop in the City of Goldthwaite, Texas, shall be parked or stopped at the curb, and no parking shall be permitted in the middle of the streets or alleys of said city.

Sec. 2. All parking or stopping shall be done by placing the automobile, truck or other kind of vehicle, at an angle of 45 degrees with the sidewalk and street, and with the right-hand front wheel at or nearest the sidewalk or curb.

Sec. 3. No automobile or other vehicle of any kind or description shall be parked in front of the Fire Station of the said City of Goldthwaite, or at or along the side walk in front of said Fire Station, or on said street in such a manner as to interfere with the ingress or egress of the Fire Wagon or Truck at such station. Any car or other vehicle so parked shall be immediately removed by the City Marshal and the owner thereof punished as hereinafter provided.

Sec. 4. No cars or other vehicles shall be stopped or parked at the entrance or exit of

any garage or filling station in said City of Goldthwaite, or in any place in such a manner as to interfere with traffic on any of the streets or alleys of the City of Goldthwaite, Texas.

Sec. 5. All of Article 1 of Chapter 60 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Goldthwaite, Texas, is hereby repealed, being wholly superseded by this Amendment. But Articles II and III of said Chapter 60 are not repealed or in anywise affected, except when in conflict with this amendment.

Sec. 6. Any person or persons, firm or corporation, violating any of the provisions of this article shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction, shall be fined in any sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS.

The fact that the present system of parking is inadequate, and results in congestion of traffic and danger to persons and property, creates an emergency and an imperative public necessity exists that the rule requiring ordinances to be read at three several meetings be

suspended, and the same is suspended, and this ordinance is hereby passed to its third and last reading, and is unanimously adopted by the City Council of the City of Goldthwaite, Texas, all members being present and voting in favor of said ordinance.

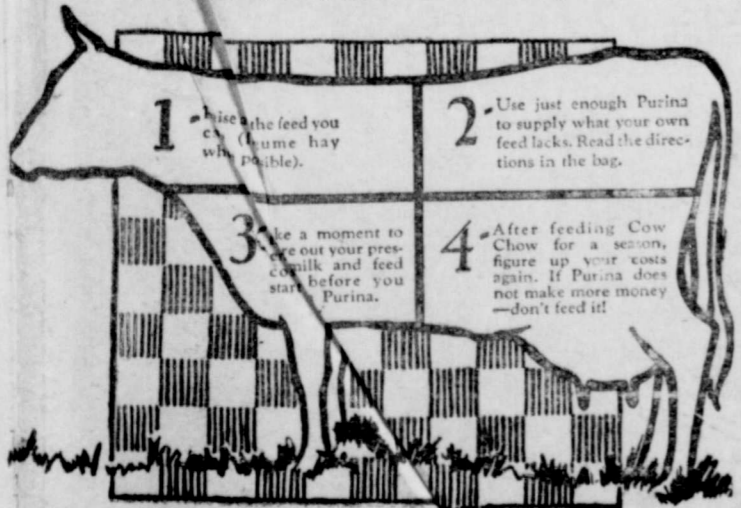
