The commercial car prices are: light delivery chassis \$400; one and one half ton Utility truck chassis \$545; one and one half ton Utility truck chassis with cab \$650 and the sedan delivery \$595. 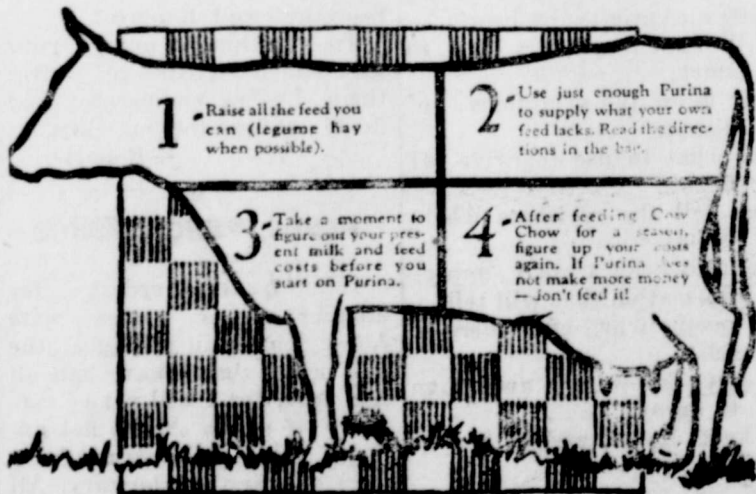

**METROPOLITAN CITIES
VIEW CHEVROLET SIX**

Detroit, Nov. 24—Motoring America was on its toes tonight as two of its large metropolitan centers were viewing for the first time the sensational new valve-in-head six cylinder Chevrolet, which was announced November 16. Interest was keyed to high pitch in New York and Detroit as the financial and motor capitals of the country respectively, prepared to greet this most advanced offering of the world's largest automobile producer for 1928.

Two advance showings opened simultaneously at noon Saturday Nov. 24th, the New York premiere taking place in a brilliant setting in the Waldorf Astoria Hotel and the Detroit debut in the Auditorium of the General Motors building. Both showings are to continue up to and including Thursday, Nov. 29th.

Meanwhile the gigantic Chevrolet manufacturing organization is applying itself to a heavy production program so that cars may be shipped to dealers starting December 15 and deliveries to the public may begin promptly January first.

Chevrolet's dealers are in readiness to take care of a deluge of advance orders. For several days prior to the announcement the sales division of the company, under direction of R. H. Grant, vice-president in charge of sales, made use of every medium available in preparing dealers and salesmen for the advent of the new six.

Tons of literature were mailed from Detroit, fully descriptive of the new product. Lighted shadow boxes with full color illustrations of the new models, and slide films for projection on the screen or wall of a darkened room, proved invaluable assets in disseminating the facts. Special talking records, so timed as to synchronize with the slide film pictures

and descriptions were also used and proved to be just another instance of the ingenuity the sales division exemplified in getting all the facts to its dealers and salesmen for use during this announcement period.

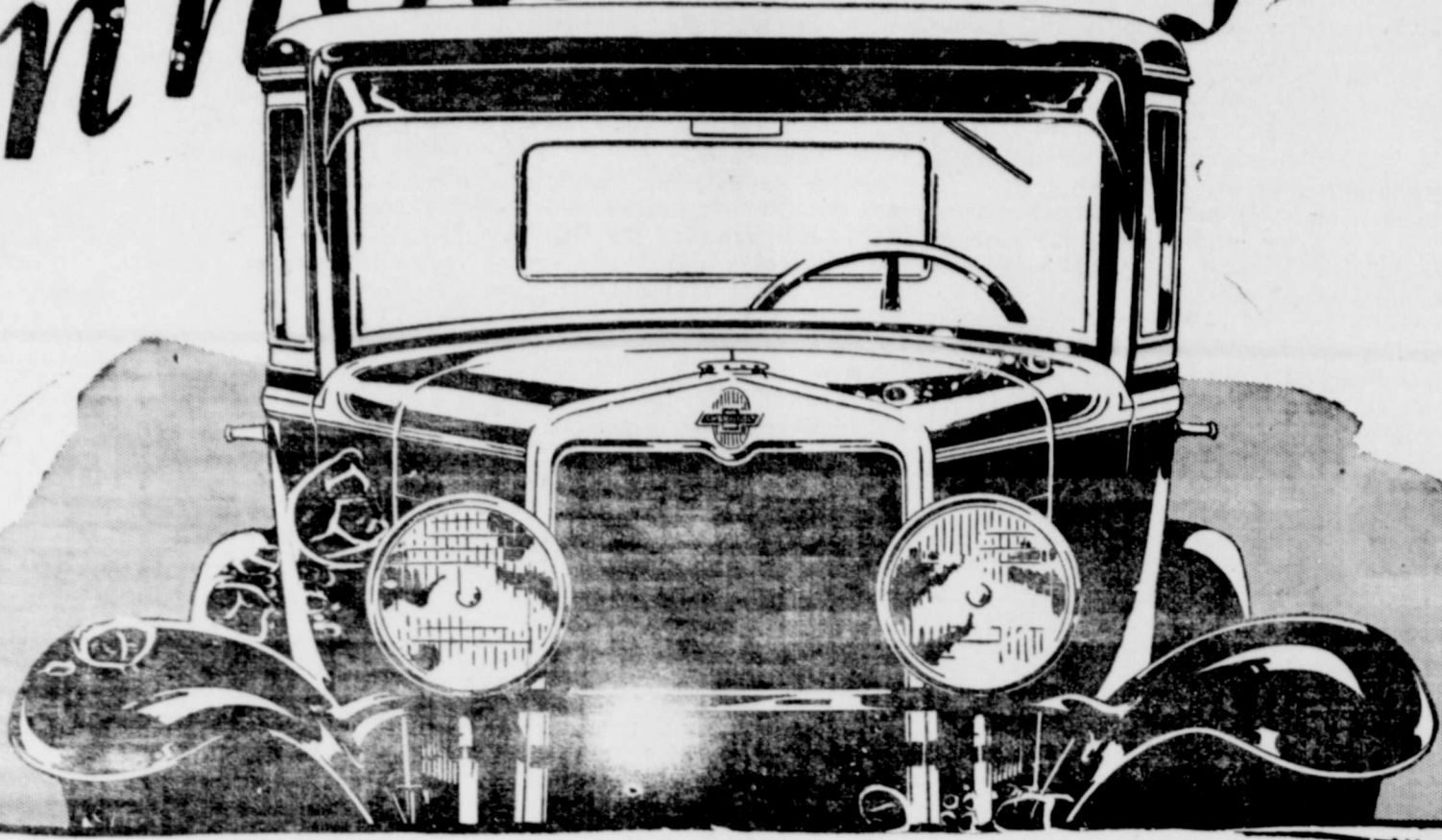

**RED CROSS TO BUILD
AND REPAIR HOMES**

"Total contributions to the
Red Cross West Indies Hurri-
cane Relief Fund, are approxi-
mately \$5,450,000.00," Mrs.
Floyd Jackson, local Red Cross
Committee Chairman, said to-
day. "We are gratified that the
five million dollars asked by
President Coolidge for this
great disaster, has been over-
subscribed by over four hun-
dred thousand dollars. When
the Red Cross says it requires
certain resources to meet a
given emergency, the Ameri-
can public have learned that
they can depend upon the
honesty of that appeal.

"According to advices from
National Red Cross headquar-
ters, Washington, D. C.," Mrs.
Jackson further stated, "the
emergency relief period in Por-
to Rico has passed, the health
situation is satisfactory and
epidemics are under control,
the reconstruction of homes
has already begun and the
distribution of lumber and
other building materials is be-
ing pushed in all devastated
sections of the island. At the
same time the feeding of sever-
al thousand homeless and des-

titute human sufferers is be-
ing continued. Besides the
building activities, the Red
Cross has instituted an exten-
sive agricultural relief prog-
ram for the benefit of the 25
thousand farmers who have
been left destitute by the dis-
aster. They will be given as-
sistance and advice in produc-
ing quick crops which will, in
a few months, give them food.

"This program," Mrs. Jack-
son explained, "is in line with
the general Red Cross policy
in every disaster—that of not
stopping at immediate meas-
ures, but of taking steps to put
the sufferers back on a self-
supporting basis. Red Cross of-
ficials have found the deepest
appreciation on every hand for
the assistance sent from the
United States. Insular officials
declare that nothing but prompt
aid of the American people,
acting through their Red Cross,
prevented intensive suffering
among half a million people.

They say in fact, that actual
starvation and the widespread
prevalence of disease would
undoubtedly have followed if
the American people had not
come to their assistance.
"When the Red Cross, be-
tween Armistice Day and
Thanksgiving this year, ex-
tends the invitation of member-
ship to everyone in Gold-
thwaite and vicinity, it should
be remembered that only in the
great disasters such as the re-
cent one, does the Red Cross
make a National appeal for
funds. During the fiscal year
ended June 30, 1928, the organ-
ization handled eighty-eight
domestic and foreign disasters.
The membership dues received
during Roll Call provide for
such action in smaller disasters
and defray the expenses of a
compact, expert disaster per-
sonnel ready at all times."
