**MILLS COUNTY TO GET ANOTHER
TRY FOR OIL DURING THIS YEAR**

Home People Cooperate
With J. E. Whiteside

Machinery is already on the ground for another try for oil in Mills County. Following the efforts of several local men interested in oil, including Dr. J. M. Campbell, Sam Rahl and J. V. Cokrum, J. E. Whiteside of Brownwood, the gentleman who drilled the last test well near Chadwick, has been secured to drill another test on the J. M. Traylor tract of land about six miles West of Goldthwaite. Several local men and Mr. Whiteside will furnish the money to sink the test.

The well is located about 800 yards due South of the old Weston No. 1 well, which stood 200 feet in oil until flooded with surface water.

Following the securing of sufficient land in one body, which was completed the latter part of last week, a geologist made the location on the Traylor place and the machinery placed on the ground day before yesterday.

It is thought that the well will be spudded in Saturday or Monday. It will be drilled to a depth of 2,000 feet. According to the logs of the other wells drilled in that section, the black lime will be picked up around 1,300 feet and the oil—if there—will be just on top or just under the lime.

That there is oil in Mills county is very little question. There have been very few wells drilled in the county which did not show some gas but none so far have made sufficient oil to pay to pump. This may be the discovery pay well. Here's hoping.

**DEMORALIZED MARKET
ON TURKEYS IN NEW
YORK; BREAK OF 10 CENTS**

New York, Nov. 29.—The used turkey market this week was demoralized. The decline started Saturday of last week, continued Monday and Tuesday and on Wednesday the market was absolutely demoralized.

Wednesday of last week the outlook for a satisfactory Thanksgiving trade was never brighter. There was no dissenting opinion on this. Advice from the West indicated moderate shipments and figures showed that the supplies of Texas turkeys would probably be 150 cars less in New York than at the same time a year ago.

The market must have slipped up to Wednesday of this week from ten to fifteen cents per pound all around and demoralization was caused mostly by poor and inferior stock. Late express shipments were heavy and Texas turkey were very poor. The same applies to stock from the middle West. Then, too, a great deal of stock arrived here out of condition and the only way the trade can account for it is that it was rushed through and packed without the animal heat out of it. At the same time, fine stock not any too plentiful, but demoralization of the market on account of such heavy loads of poor stock, dragged down prices on the better turkeys. Quite a lot of stock went to the warehouses but receivers were trying to push out receipts for any price they could get in order to try to clear their floors. Then, too a good deal of Eastern stock arrived out of condition.

The trade last week was figuring on prices this week ranging from 25 to 55c for good Western stock up to as high as 60c per pound for nearby and Eastern.

**To Build Plant
Second to None**

Actual construction work began the latter part of this week on the new \$125,000.00 power plant for the Texas-Louisiana Power Company at this place. These people bought the Ottogre lot just north of the present plant and are constructing a modern power plant on this lot, separate from the one now in operation. The new equipment will consist of one 150 horse power engine and two 100 horse power engines with base for a 600 horse-power engine, in case the need should arise for additional power. The present equipment is inadequate and realizing this, Mr. Barnett, local manager of the Texas-Louisiana Company, has used untiring efforts to get his company to put in sufficient facilities at this place. The contract or the new building is the result.

On the location where the present plant stands an up-to-date ice factory and cold storage will be constructed as quickly as the space is released. The ice factory will keep fifty to \$100.00 per day which is being sent out of town here every summer.

Work is to begin soon on the outside construction for the power plant. Specifications call for rebuilding entirely the lines, with many new sections served and with A1 construction everywhere.

The decision of the Texas-Louisiana Power Company to spend thousands of dollars here will result in a great deal of additional revenue in increased use of power.

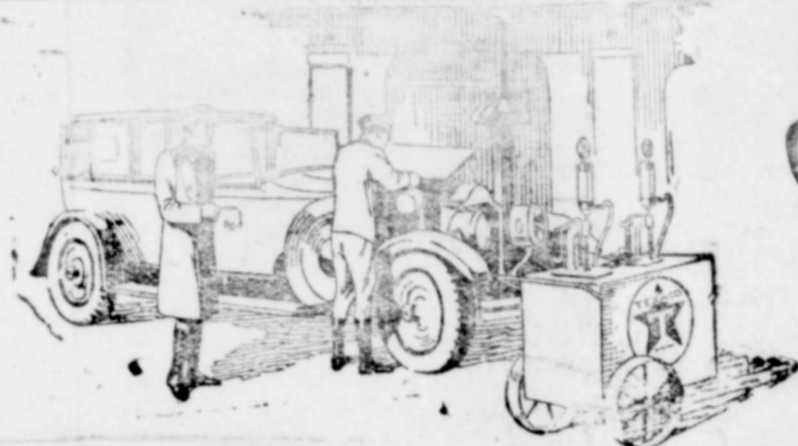

The engine lubrication system of the new Model A Ford car is a combination of pump, splash and gravity feed which is an exclusive Ford development.

In design and in operation it is simple and positive and repeated tests have shown it to be ideally suited to this somewhat revolutionary type of four-cylinder, medium speed, medium-compression motor.

The oil pump is located in the bottom of the crank case and is run off a gear on the camshaft. It is enclosed in a fine mesh wire screen through which the oil filters before it is pumped up into the valve chamber. The screen is surrounded by a shield so that the oil is pulled through it, rather than flowing by gravity. The oil flows into the valve chamber in a continuous stream whenever the engine is running, but it is in no sense a "forced" feed. It is rather the full load of the pump being delivered in a smooth, flowing stream. The principal purpose of delivering the oil to the valve chamber is to provide direct gravity feed lubrication to the bearings on the crankshaft. However, it also supplies exceptional lubrication to the valves, giving better and quieter action, and by gravity to the front end camshaft.

Small pipe openings lead down from the valve chamber to the crankshaft main bearings and oil flowing down these by gravity provides an abundance of lubrication. The bottom of the valve chamber is so arranged, through the use of small, in built dams to provide reservoirs of oil for each main bearing pipe opening.

As the engine rests in the chassis on a three-degree angle, sloping to the rear, the oil arriving in the valve chamber flows back, filling the first reservoir; then over the little dam, filling the second reservoir, then over again to the third and last reservoir. From this point the overflow oil is carried by an external pipe down to the front end of the oil pan in the crankcase where it flows back over the pan, filling the troughs through which the connecting rods are lubricated and from which all other moving parts are sprayed by the splash system. From the pan the oil flows to the bottom of the case to be pumped again.

This rather unique system of engine lubrication is responsible in large measure for the excellent performance of the motor at a wide range of speeds and under all climatic conditions. When the Model A car was in its experimental stages much of the road test work was done in mid-summer, yet there never was a single instance of engine overheating.

ATTENTION, TURKEY RAISERS

We are up against a situation on the Christmas market for Turkeys that we have never been up against before.

The windup of the Thanksgiving market in the distributing centers were the most disastrous in years, a drop from ten to twenty cents per pound.

This condition was caused by excessive supplies of poor turkeys and has caused a condition whereby the Eastern Receivers are afraid of the quality of the Christmas turkey from Texas, which is likely to keep most of the Eastern buyers out of Texas.

On account of conditions being in such a condition we are compelled to change weights on No. 1 Turkeys; all turkeys bought in this market to grade No. 1 will have to be of good flesh, straight breasted, and Toms weigh 14 pounds and up and Hens 9 pounds and up.

The best thing to do is to hold your light weight turkeys back for a later market.

We do not know how to advise you on the market, but we know this; that all turkeys that move for Christmas market consumption will have to be dressed out by the tenth or twelfth. After that date everything bought on storage basis.

In New York alone 103 cars of Turkeys had to go to storage, and all other markets in proportion. This does not make a healthy market condition.

We are giving you conditions just as we see them, and do not know what the market will be but assure you that we will have as high prices as anyone that buys on the market.

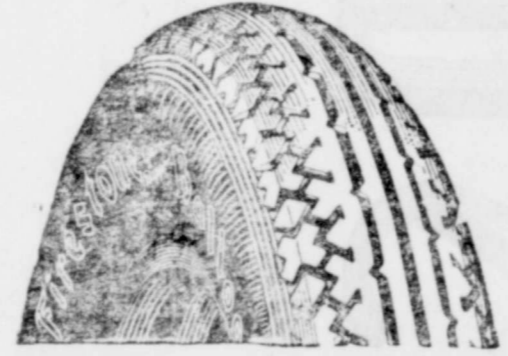

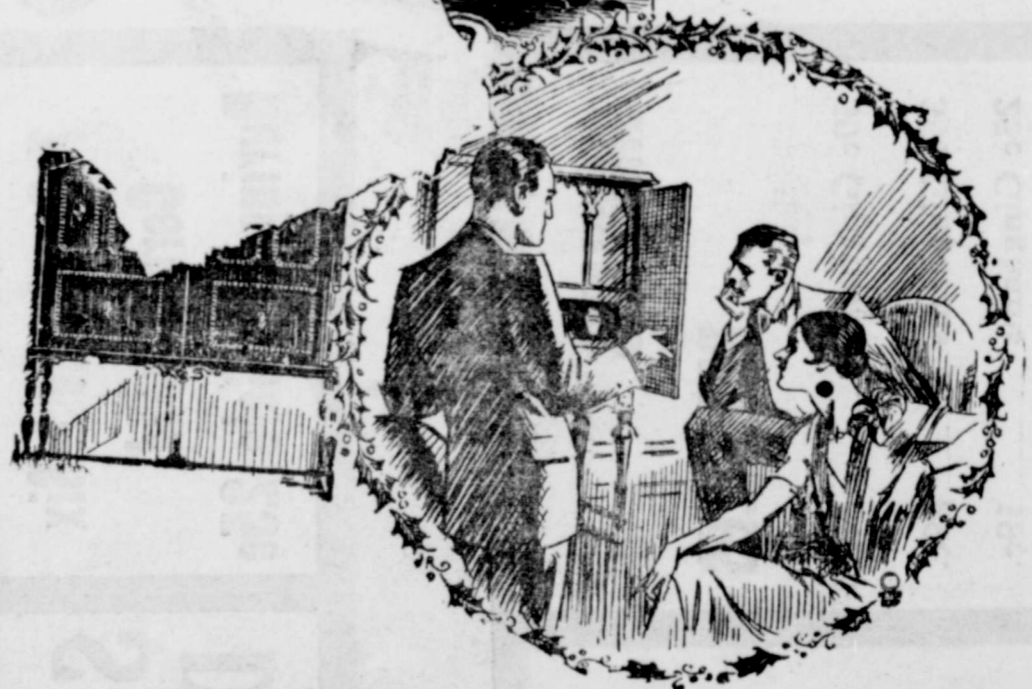

MODEL A FORD HAS UNIQUE OIL SYSTEM

The engine lubrication system of the new Model A Ford car is a combination of pump, splash and gravity feed which is an exclusive Ford development.

In design and in operation it is simple and positive and repeated tests have shown it to be ideally suited to this somewhat revolutionary type of four-cylinder, medium speed, medium-compression motor.

The oil pump is located in the bottom of the crank case and is run off a gear on the camshaft. It is enclosed in a fine mesh wire screen through which the oil filters before it

is pumped up into the valve chamber. The screen is surrounded by a shield so that the oil is pulled through it, rather than flowing by gravity. The oil flows into the valve chamber in a continuous stream whenever the engine is running, but it is in no sense a "forced" feed. It is rather the full load of the pump being delivered in a smooth, flowing stream. The principal purpose of delivering the oil to the valve chamber is to provide direct gravity feed lubrication to the bearings on the crankshaft. However, it also supplies exceptional lubrication to the valves, giving better and quieter action, and by gravity to the front end camshaft.

Small pipe openings lead down from the valve chamber to the crankshaft main bearings and oil flowing down these by gravity provides an abundance of lubrication. The bottom of the valve chamber is so arranged, through the use of small, built dams to provide reservoirs of oil for each main bearing pipe opening.

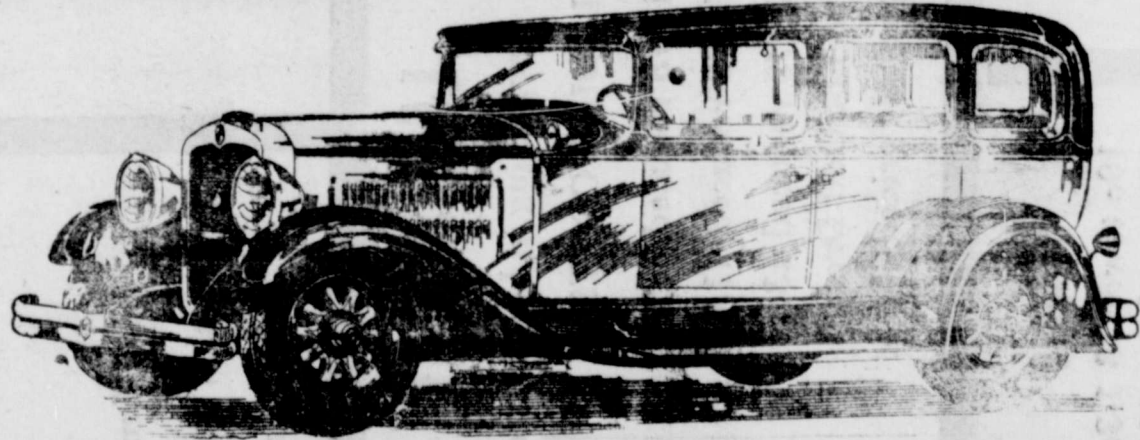
As the engine rests in the chassis on a three-degree angle, sloping to the rear, the oil arriving in the valve chamber flows back, filling the first reservoir; then over the little dam, filling the second reservoir, then over again to the third and last reservoir. From this point the overflow oil is carried by an external pipe down to the front end of the oil pan in the crankcase where it flows back over the pan, filling the troughs through which the connecting rods are lubricated and from which all other moving parts are sprayed by the splash system. From the pan the oil flows to the bottom of the case to be pumped again.

This rather unique system of engine lubrication is responsible in large measure for the excellent performance of the motor at a wide range of speeds and under all climatic conditions. When the Model A car was in its experimental stages much of the road test work was done in mid-summer, yet there never was a single instance of engine overheating.

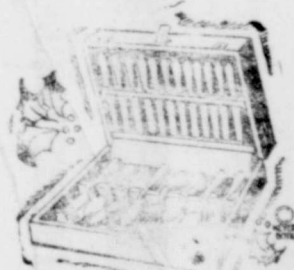

R. A. MAGEE DEAD

R. A. Magee was born in La Vaca County, Texas, June 21, 1857, came to this county in 1870. According to a sketch written by him before his death he spent most of his time on ranches and much of his time he was in the midst of plenty of buffaloes. One of his brothers was killed by an outlaw. He spoke of the good old days as being gone. I am sure he was right in saying those days are gone; but I, for one, am glad it is so. We live in a better age. He spoke of his physical condition stating that "most people did not know what he had suffered for (the past ten years," but closes this statement that it will soon be over and he will be at rest and free from all pain.

He was the offspring of pioneer stock, according to his statement his father and mother came to Texas in 1828 and for a time owned a ranch in Fayette and LaVaca Counties of Texas, the latter county being the place of his birth. While near Abilene on ranches he had several battles with the Indians he said and was assured that he always won by "soaking" the spurs to the horse and out running them. Some folks, he said, accused him of being a coward but he said he was born that way and got there just the same.

The hardships that they suffered and the debt we owe to these pioneers we will never know. He stated that his mother's brother was among those who fell in the Alamo.

He lived and died unmarried. No immediate relatives were by to witness his last days but sympathizing people of Goldthwaite saw that he never suffered want. The Powers family, with whom he lived, attended carefully and members of the Methodist church sang gospel hymns and Mr. Fairman, the undertaker, and Rev. Lambert, the Methodist minister saw that he had a Christian burial. If he was rich goodly deeds, despite his dire poverty here, he will be rich in Heaven. His hopes were confident to the end which came on

December 1st., 1928.
