## UNDER THE CAPITOL DOME

Austin, Texas.—Annual and biennial reports of state departments have been the order at the state capitol. They are being made to Governor Moody who in turn sends them to the printers to prepare copies for the legislature. A composite of the reports boiled down to five words reads:

"This department needs more money." The treasurer and secretary of state figure their departments can get along at the present rate but the general clamor for more funds fades them out of the picture.

Almost coincident with these reports, John T. Smith of Austin, former representative from Travis County, comes out in the Texas Tax Journal with the declaration that expenditures are outrunning the growth of the state's population. Figuring the period 1920 to date, Mr. Smith cites figures to show 100 per cent gain in state appropriations and only 16 per cent gain in population in the same time.

Seventy-five per cent of the money now goes to two departments, Smith reports. They are the highway department and the educational department. In the eight year period appropriations for state schools have increased 62 per cent; those for highways 200 per cent.

Dr. John Preston who has been with the various state hospitals for 30 years and now has a general supervision agrees with Statistician Smith that there has not been "anormal increase" for eleemosynary institutions. The need of the hospital system, he says, is funds for adequate buildings. If the highway department is to have bonds to build roads, Dr. Preston and Chairman R. B. Walt-hall of the state board of control believe it would be good policy to issue bonds for state hospital buildings. That course was followed in New York, enabling the substitution of mod-

The highway department's proposed \$225,000,000 bond issue continued in the limelight. Of the total amount it is proposed to make \$75,000,000 available for refunds to counties and road districts for funds to put them in roads that are now part of the highway system. Just why the original highway department estimate that refunds would amount to \$56,000,000 could be boosted almost \$20,000,000 was never very definitely settled during the advisory committee arguments but it was fully agreed to make \$75,000,000 the maximum.

State Senator Eugene Miller of Garner, Tex., while here expressed unalterable opposition of himself and the people of his district to the proposed bond issue. "It is a fanciful idea on the part of some and mercenary on the part of others," said Senator Miller. "Interest charges make it inadvisable."

Seventeen of the 31 advisors named to consider a highway program reported in its favor to Governor Moody Monday of this week. Leonard Tillotson of Sealy and others made a minority report against the plan.

## GOOD PORK CURING METHOD DESCRIBED

A brine method of curing pork that is coming into general use in Texas because it makes a deliciously flavored meat and is practical is described by E. R. Eudaly, Swine Specialist of the A. and M. Extension Service. "To make brine enough for 100 pounds of meat use 10 gallons of water, 20 pounds of salt, 5 pounds of sugar and 5 ounces of saltpeter. Bring the water to a boil, then add the salt and stir until dissolved. Allow to cool before using.

"Cut meat up as soon as dressed and rub it with good salt. Leave spread out and salted over night to lose the animal heat and then pack in a clean barrel with ham and shoulders at the bottom and the bacon at the top. Pour on enough brine to cover the meat. Leave the bacon in brine for three weeks and ham and shoulders for five weeks.

"Brine will sometimes spoil due to an unclean barrel or adverse weather conditions, so the brine should be examined once a week. If there are gas bubbles on the surface of the brine it is probably spoiling. Dip up a cup of it and pour back in the barrel. If it poursropy or like syrup it is spoiling and the meat should be taken out and washed with hot water. Empty and scald the barrel and repack the meat in fresh brine made the day before as to cool.

"After removing the meat at the end of the curing process it should be hung up to drip and then smoked with smoke from any of the hardwoods or corn cobs. Most people prefer a three day smoke. The next step, wrapping, is important if meat is going to keep good during the whole year. Wrap first in papers (news papers will do) and then in ducking, sewing on with close stitches to prevent bugs and skippers getting into the meat. Sew on a string and hang up in a cool dry place. It may mold in hot weather but that doesn't hurt."

**THE GOLDTHWAITE EAGLE**

**KGKB MOVES TO NEW LOCATION AT BROWNWOOD JAN. 1**

The program last Sunday night was the last one over the Goldthwaite Eagle's broadcast station KGKB at Goldthwaite. The station is being dismantled and will be moved to Brownwood, where it will be operated beginning about January 1, 1929.

Broadcast station KGKB has been on the air approximately six months at Goldthwaite and had built an audience running into thousands. Letters from people in all states within a radius of 1500 miles from Goldthwaite had been received. This radius represents more than one half the United States and all of Mexico.

**Wonderful Publicity for Goldthwaite.**

KGKB has been wonderful publicity for Goldthwaite. Hundreds of letters have been received from people, most of whom had never heard of the town, all of whom were interested in this section. Dozens of artists from surrounding towns and communities have entertained over this station and hundreds of dollars have been directly expended in Goldthwaite by visitors to the station. Several sections of country which should be in Goldthwaite trade territory but which had drifted to other trading points, were interested in Goldthwaite again to such an extent that they are again trading here. Hundreds of visitors from all over Texas have inspected this station and have gone home and told the people about Goldthwaite. Millions of people throughout the civilized world have become acquainted with Goldthwaite on account of radio call books, radio maps, etc. And lastly, the Goldthwaite Eagle proved that it was abreast of, or ahead of, the times by being the first weekly newspaper to own and operate a broadcast station.

The fact that the Eagle was compelled to move the station to Brownwood, or some other point, was occasioned by several unforeseen changes of the requirements of the Federal Radio Commission concerning broadcast stations. Briefly the requirements necessitated the expenditure of several thousands of dollars to procure the finest equipment and the employment of government licen-

sed operators. These constituted such a drain that outside revenue was essential for maintenance of the station.

In moving KGKB to Brownwood the Eagle Publishing Company had in mind the best interest of the thousands of listeners and the ability to serve the people better with the increased facilities. One of the major changes will be the doubling of the present power of the station. This increase will assure all present listeners just as clear and good reception as before.

In moving KGKB the Eagle Publishing Company wants to repeat its often expressed indebtedness to T. F. Toland, W. P. McCullough, John W. Roberts, Dr. R. A. Swanger for their efforts in its behalf; and any number of artists for their courtesies in so freely assisting in delivering programs which have received favorable comment of listeners for miles around.

These artists will be used at Brownwood as long as they will serve and folks who have been in the habit of enjoying their entertaining should tune in on KGKB after Jan. 1, and listen to their favorites. A permit has been secured from the Federal Radio Commission to maintain a studio at Goldthwaite and should present plans materialize, Goldthwaite folks can listen to Goldthwaite artists hereafter as heretofore.

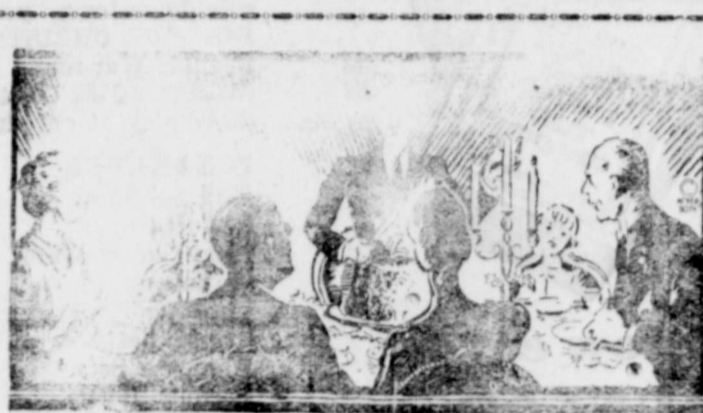

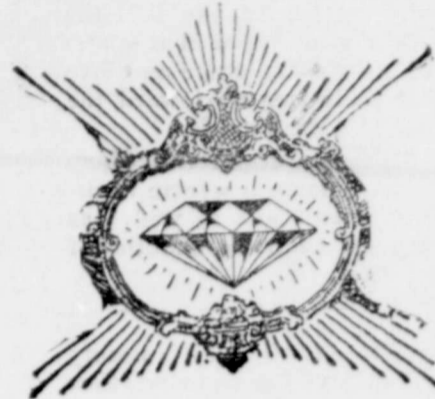

**ALLEGORICAL LANDSCAPE PAINTED BY MRS. GEO. ADAMS TO HANG IN CHURCH**

A beautiful landscape scene, seven and one-half by six and one-half feet, the work of Mrs. Barton Adams will occupy a prominent place over the baptistry of the First Christian Church when it is completed. Mrs. Adams has chosen to call her creation "Beyond the River."

Mrs. Adams, who is the wife of Geo. E. Adams, came to Bryan to make her home about two years ago when Mr. Adams became a member of the Extension Service staff at College Station, in the capacity of district agent. She has been painting for some 35 years. Her girlhood home was in Mills county, where she skilled herself in reproducing the Texas bluebell from life and she has taken up bluebonnet sketching since coming to this section of Texas.

Upon being asked why she chose a landscape theme rather than a religious subject to place at the baptistry, Mrs. Adams replied that she found her greatest pleasure in developing landscape paintings from the fact that she reads God's handiwork wrought into nature.

This particular painting which has occupied Mrs. Adams for several months, portrays an open stream flowing through a verdant valley and bordered by wild flowers in the prime of spring season. The background is completed by mountains that rise from the level of the valley to meet the glow of a sun set sky, against which the outline of a chapel may be seen, with its spires pointing skyward.

While, according to Mrs. Adams, she was mindful of the fact that Jesus received baptism in an open stream, she says nevertheless that she had no intention of reproducing the Jordan. She says, however, that she was constantly mindful of the fact that rivers and mountains have played an important part in the life of man, as well as in the development of civilization and the Christian religion. Water, valley and mountain heights have ever been symbolic of certain experiences of man, and water is necessary to the maintenance of life and the existence of man, she said.

Bearing in mind these words spoken by Jesus to the woman of Samaria of whom he asked a drink of water: "If thou knewest the gift of God, and who it is that saith to thee 'give me a drink' thou wouldst have asked of him that he would give thee living water." Whosoever drinketh of this

water, shall thirst again; but whosoever drinketh of the water that I shall give, shall never thirst. But the water that I shall give him, shall be in him a well springing up into eternal life."

The cleansing power of water in a physical sense, and the effusing power of a Christian life in a spiritual sense is the analogy Mrs. Adams hoped to draw in her painting and the path up the mountainside thru the sunlight and shadow is typical of the path of life, with its joys and sorrows, its failures and its successes.

The chapel at the top, silhouetted against the glow of an evening sun, points with its spires to heaven and lifts the gaze of man toward that source of all wisdom, grace and love that leads men on toward the goal of a perfect life.

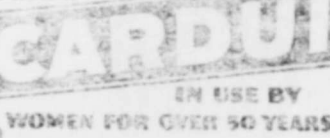

Detroit, Dec. 22.—With only one full week remaining of 1928, the greatest year of its 16 years of existence, Chevrolet Motor Company, impelled by the largest volume demand it has ever faced, is experiencing its busiest December.

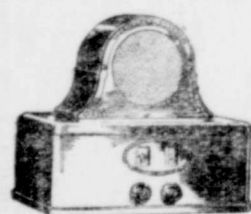

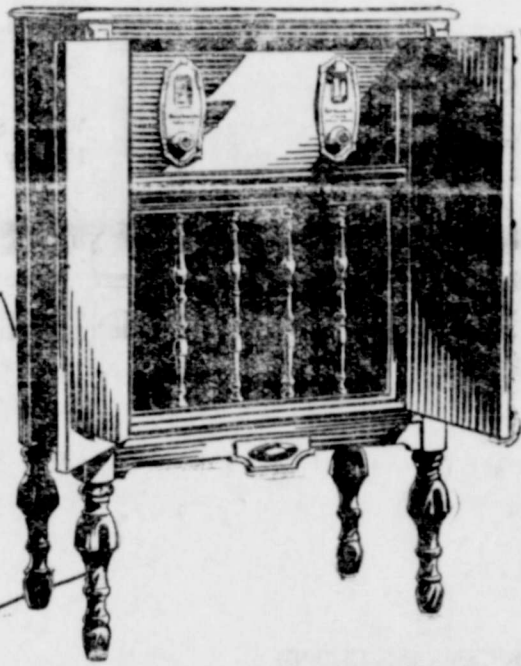

CAMPAIGN IN TEXAS**

In spite of the best efforts of  
the doctors, it is still difficult  
for the average person to real-  
ize that it is cheaper and easier  
to stay well than to get well.  
A lot of people think that it is

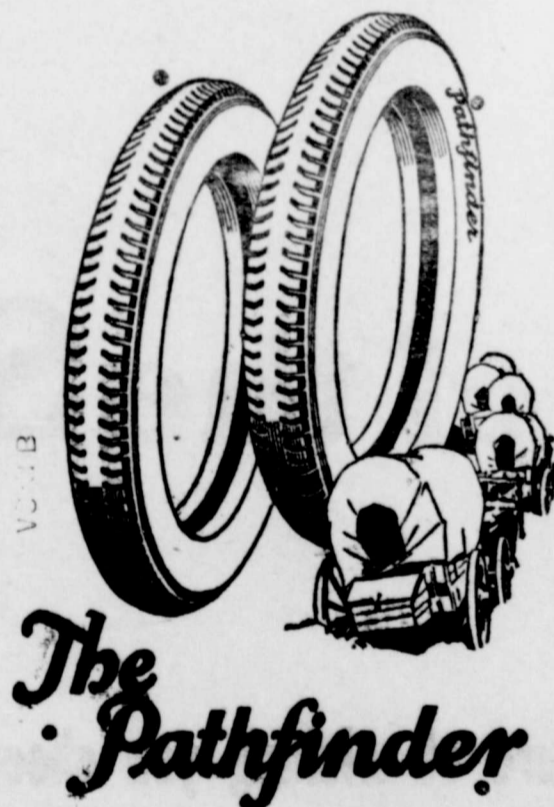

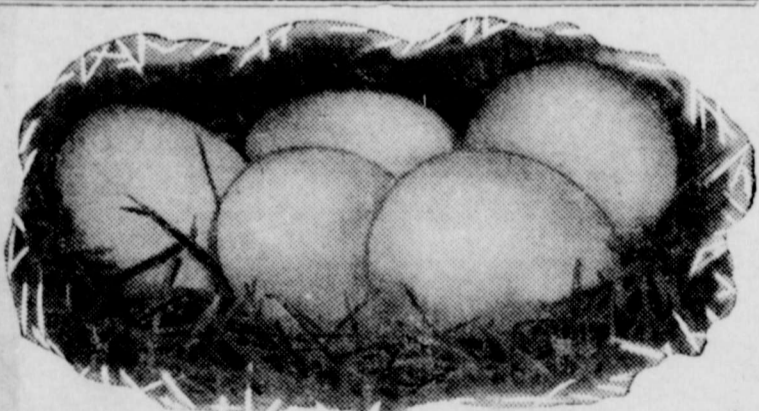
