GARRETT MORGAN DEAD

Garrett Morgan, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Morgan, and his companion were killed at Wink, a West Texas oil town, Tuesday night of this week in an automobile collision, his car having collided with a truck loaded with lumber.

Mr. Morgan, who was thirty-eight years old at the time of his death, was an old Mills County boy, having been reared here and resided here until fifteen years ago. He was born May 31, 1891.

His remains were brought here last Sunday night and services were held Monday morning at ten o'clock at the W. H. Morgan home, being conducted by Rev. S. D. Lambert, pastor of the Goldthwaite Methodist church.

He is survived by his wife and four children, his mother, Mrs. W. H. Morgan, John Morgan of Wink, Texas; and four sisters, Mrs. Mattie Booker of this city, Mrs. Sallie Harris of Fort Worth, Mrs. Winnie Pifer of Wink, and Mrs. O. C. Bates of Alexander, Louisiana. All were present at the funeral except Mrs. Harris who was unable to attend.

The following account of the accident appeared in The Wink Times:

One of the most deplorable accidents yet recorded in Winkler County tragedies occurred last Tuesday night between 8:00 and 8:30 o'clock on the Wink-Kermit highway, three miles from Wink, caused by a crash of a Chrysler coupe into a truck loaded with lumber. Two well known men are dead as a result while a third, John R. Kennedy, Jr., of Wink, is confined in the General Hospital with a broken shoulder bone, a thumb missing and suffering from severe lacerations.

The Chrysler coupe had been driven to the northern portion of the oil field or, at least about four miles out. John R. Kennedy Jr., was driving the machine while with him were Judge Allen Beadel of Brownwood and G. T. Morgan of Wink, but who recently came here from Brownwood, having gone to that place not long ago, with his family, from Goldthwaite.

The outward trip was safely made and the car was returning to Wink when the accident which caused the fatalities occurred. It happened on a comparatively level and straight section of the highway as the incoming car turned out of the middle of the road to pass a car going towards Kermit, according to driver Kennedy, who was seen in the General hospital Thursday afternoon by a Times representative. He further stated that he saw nothing in front of him while approaching the coming nor when he turned to the right to let it pass except the lights that he gave attention to passing the approaching machine, only, but that almost instantaneously with the passing of the cars his Chrysler coupe ran into the end of a truck loaded with lumber; that he had seen no light on the truck nor on the vehicle anywhere; that the instant after the coupe hit the truck, as it seemed to him, he found himself in the midst of the wreck, cut and wounded as indicated above. He heard no sound from Judge Beadel, he stated, and believes that gentleman was killed instantly, which suggestions seems to have been vindicated afterwards. The deep cut said to have been inflicted

on the head of Judge Beadel, exposing so much of that portion of the body is believed to have snatched him from life before he could even divine what had occurred.

Mr. Kennedy's Statement.
"I was not driving fast nor recklessly and the road was in good condition. Had I seen any light on the truck I would have swerved and risked my own life to save the two gentlemen who were with me. Naturally I remember but dimly what occurred after the coupe struck the truck, but I was of the opinion that Judge Beadel breathed no more. I could realize that Mr. Morgan was groaning and seemed to be struggling and to breathe. Then I was brought to town. I was taken to a downtown hospital at first and afterwards removed to the General Hospital. Yesterday (Wednesday) the shoulder was set."

Kennedy had a narrow escape. Mr. Walker in Statement.

H. L. Walker, driver of the truck into which the Chrysler coupe entangled itself, stated that he had been out to the oil field, accompanied by his wife, where they went for some timber wood. Returning, a battery trouble overtook him where the accident occurred. He began to work on his machine, to the end that he might get it repaired as soon as possible and come on to Wink as soon as possible. The weather was inclement and the hour was growing late to be out in a truck.

Mr. Walker further stated that his wife was standing on the right fender of the truck while he worked; that all of a sudden a short development in the battery, he believes, putting the car in darkness—at least for a little while—a consequence he

could not instantaneously control; that suddenly his wife cried to him that there was a car approaching from the rear of the truck. He arose from the front of the car, at once he started, ran to the rear of the truck and began to wave a light which he had been using in looking into the battery. He was strong in vowing he did all in his power to avert the accident and did it as quickly as possible. His grief and that of his wife over the dire result of the wreck were expressed in low voice and with suppressed tears as was that of Mr. Kennedy.

Sad happenings followed each other so rapidly after the collision, it appears, in addition to Mr. and Mrs. Walker being knocked off their feet, the former states that while he was groggy he feared that his wife was killed and succeeded in making his way to her side.

GOOD PROGRESS BEING MADE ON TRAYLOR NO. 1

Ten days or two weeks should tell the tale for Traylor No. 1, the oil test being made on the Traylor land 800 yards south of Weston No. 1 which several years ago stood 200 feet in oil but was ruined before its possibilities could be tested.

This location has been pointed out for its possibilities for oil by several geologists in the past three or four years, the structure is running high, and with the new pipe line running through the county nearly closed Mills County people think their chance for oil play is better now than at any time in the past.

Traylor No. 1 is now past the 1100-foot level, and, barring unforeseen delays, should reach the oil sand within ten days. Eight-inch casing has been set to 1114 feet and drilling was started again yesterday at noon.

Much praise is due the local men who dug down in their pockets to get Mills County this sure-enough test.

T. Morgan. The latter died at 2:00 o'clock, having lived but five or five and one-half hours after receiving his injuries.

Justice Hannah Views Bodies.

Justice of the Peace, L. C. Hannah of this precinct viewed the bodies of both Judge Beadel and Mr. Morgan. When seen Thursday afternoon by a Times representative Judge Hannah stated that he had not rendered any decision on the premises and that it would be necessary to hold a court of inquiry before any formal announcement. Time of the court of inquiry will depend chiefly of when those who are wounded in the accident are physically able to appear.

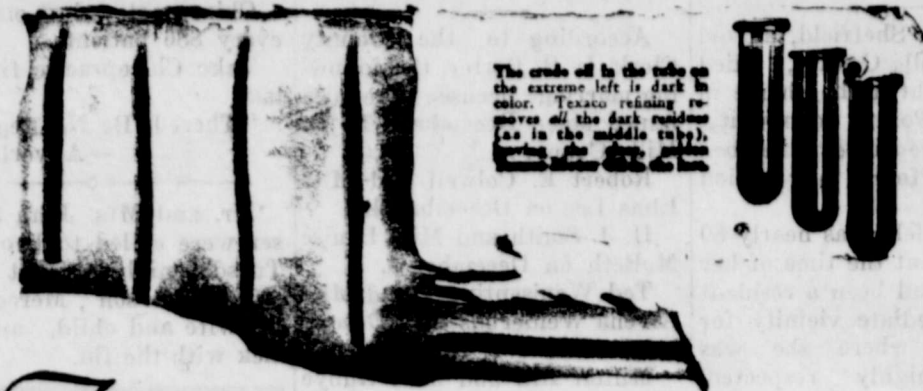
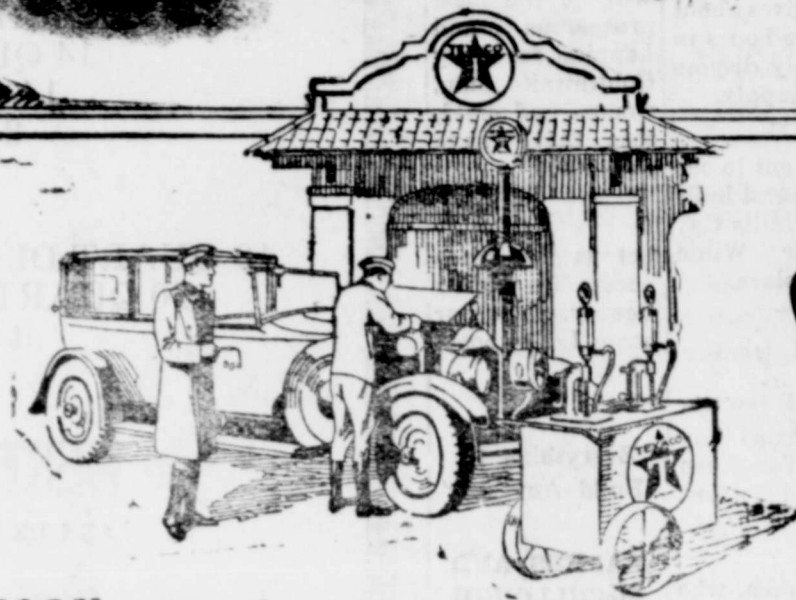

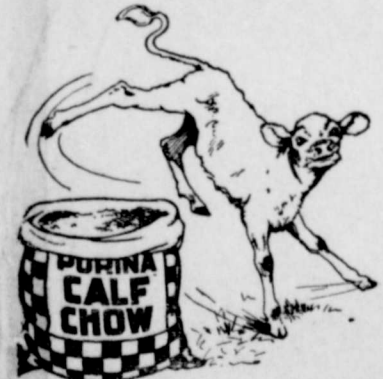
