RUDOLPH (RED) SCHUSTER IS BURIED AT PRIDDY, TEXAS

Rudolph (Red) Schuster, formerly of Priddy but late of Eden, died in the Central Texas Hospital at Brownwood on the 27th and was buried in the upper Priddy cemetery on the 28 of January.

He was 75 years and 8 months old and was a conspicuous figure in the early development of Mills County, being one of the signers of the petition in 1887 that went before the legislature, creating Mills County.

Large crowds from this and adjacent counties attended the funeral services conducted by his pastor from Eden, assisted by the pastor from Priddy. The service was first rendered in German and then repeated in English.

It was indeed an impressive scene, as the organ pealed forth that grand old hymn, "Rock of Ages Cleft For Me" accompanied by 1000 voices, bringing back memories of more than 40 years ago, where near the same spot this writer herded cattle, never dreaming of the great contrast that forty years could bring about.

Schuster was a good man and was the writer's true friend. He was my bondsman when I was first elected to the Tax Collector of Mills County.

He leaves to mourn his death 5 daughters and a host of friends throughout this and other west Texas Counties. Peace be to his ashes and love and consolation to his family.

KGKB HAS FORMAL OPENING FRIDAY EVE

Station KGKB of Brownwood, Texas, had its formal opening last Friday evening at the Howard Payne College studio. Despite the fact that the weather was much below freezing, there was a great number of people present at the studio. A good program was rendered, which lasted from 8:00 o'clock until 12:00 p. m. The city's most prominent men made short talks congratulating the station and its owners.

The following clipping appeared in the Brownwood Bulletin Thursday, when a special edition was given to the station:

Brownwood's own radio broadcast station, KGKB, will make its formal bow to the public in a four hour program Friday night, at which time all available artists in this community will be gathered for the fun.

From 8 p. m. to midnight those people will submit their best to the critical invisible audience, and from that time the new station will be on the air at regular intervals each day.

KGKB is a 100 watt station recently brought here from Goldthwaite, where it has been operating since last June on 50 watts. The transfer to Brownwood was made under the work of the local Chamber of Commerce, Buz Canon and E. J. Weatherby sponsoring the idea.

It will operate here on a 200 meter wave length, or 1,500 kilocycles. Local listeners will not have any trouble in tuning it in, and from letters from long distances from this city already received it has been proven that the station will have a far reaching influence.

Only Tuesday the station received a letter from Hokah, Minn. where some fan had heard KGKB very distinctly. This was found to be about 1,300 miles from Brownwood.

At the opening program Friday night local talent will be used almost exclusively. While the management has had quite a number of artists announce themselves as willing to go on the air, they desire to have others notify them of their ability and desire to broadcast.

Gus Obenhaus, known as "The Flat Head Announcer", has been with the station since it started in Goldthwaite and is well known to audiences all over Texas.

The chief operator, Lee Wilkinson, who has had a first-class license from the Department of Commerce for the past four years, has all the work of changing the station from one city to another and is busily putting in various connections at prominent halls and churches about town. He will be assisted by Mrs. E. A. Cutler, who recently received her first class operator's license, one of the very few women in the United States holding a radio license, and the only woman in Texas with this distinction.

The station is owned and managed by Ernest E. Wilson of Goldthwaite. He has had a successful career in his home town with his station and in coming to Brownwood hopes to be able to make even a greater success with it here.

The transmitting rooms of KGKB is located at 2404 Austin Avenue, where two eighty foot towers support the aerial from which the message of Brownwood will go to the world.

By remote control programs will be given in the main studio in the Fine Arts Building

of Howard Payne College, where much money has been spent in making one of the most modern, sound proof studios in and floors of the room are lined with prepared pulp cork board. Between this studio and the reception roof is a twelve foot window through which visitors will be able to see the artists.

Mr. Wilson said Thursday that there are being planned many novel programs for the entertainment of those who listen to broadcast, and will from time to time make announcements of interest.

BAPTIST CHURCH

The sermon for Sunday night is given as much time and thought by this preacher as the morning sermon, but let me give you something to think about. There are certain elements that enter into every service that makes it worth while to every one. There is no need to name them, for every church going person knows that this is true. However let me give three things that will make a message what it ought to be. Prayer upon the part of the preacher in preparation of his message. The next thing is to study. Ask the Sunday School teacher if he has studied his lesson. It is no easy task to prepare a Sunday School lesson, matters not how long one has been teaching, and the reason so many don't want the responsibility of teaching, they know that it requires work.

But there is no greater joy that can come to any one than to know that they are moulding character for time and eternity, and eternity alone will tell the value of the Sunday School teacher.

The next thing that will help the preacher deliver a worth while message is a praying church. The minister knows the moment he enters the pulpit whether his people are in sympathy with what he has in his heart to deliver, if they are, his message will go over; if they are not, it matters not how much time he has given in the preparation of his message, he can not get it over to the congregation. I appeal to every Christian that reads these lines to pray for your preacher when he enters the pulpit. If you will there will not be so many dry sermons and sinners will be saved.

My message for next Sunday will be found in the 19th chapter of Acts, using the 20th verse for a text. I want every

body that comes to the Baptist church next Sunday to have already read this chapter. If you will study this chapter you will more readily appreciate the message that I am preparing to deliver.

SANTA FE CROP REPORT SHOWS TEXAS TO BE IN GOOD CONDITION

Following is the crop report of The Santa Fe Railway Co., up to and including January 28, from the States of Texas and Louisiana. These reports of conditions are based on telegraphic reports to the Santa Fe Magazine:

Agricultural conditions in Texas and Louisiana generally are favorable. In the southern areas farmers have made good progress with plowing operations.

Winter oats in Southern Texas counties are growing rapidly. Heavy rains have left a good season in the ground. Vegetables and fruits are showing a brisk movement. A large acreage of raw land is being brought under cultivation in various parts of the state.

In the west and northwestern sections, harvest of feed crops has been delayed by rain and snow.

Cotton harvest is almost over. While cattle and sheep lost flesh in a few counties, due to the declining ranges and cold weather, generally they have held up well.

Spring plowing in West Texas is coming along, with indications of a considerable increase

RURAL AID SCHOOLS TO GET 80 PER CENT OF ALLOTMENT

To All County Superintendents: I am sending you this very important letter informing you that on account of the increased number of schools qualifying for state aid for the year 1928-29, which is the current year, it will be impossible for us to grant the full amount approved to each school by the rural aid inspector. The best estimate which we can make at this time is that 80 per cent of the amount promised can be paid.

You will, therefore, receive during the month of February this percentage of the amount approved for your rural aid schools. For example, if the rural aid inspector has approved \$500.00 for a district in your county, you will receive 80 per cent of this amount which is \$400.00. The legislative finance committees have already approved an emergency appropriation for \$175,000 for the year 1927-28 and \$200,000 for the year 1928-29 for the purpose of paying the high school tuition accounts in full, but these two emergency appropriations have no relation whatever to this deficiency in the rural aid fund proper. It will require an additional allotment in full this year. Of course, I cannot advise you as to the probability of this emergency appropriation being made. The only equitable solution of this problem is to scale all of the rural aid appropriations so that the grants will come within the \$1,500,000 set apart for this purpose.

I suggest that you immediately notify the trustees of all of the rural aid schools of your county that the allotment will be scaled and give as wide publicity as possible to this information.

RIDING COMFORT

One of the things for which the new Ford car has already become famous is its extraordinary easy riding qualities over rough roads. Many factors contribute to this, especially the low ratio of unsprung weight to sprung weight, the flexible transverse springs, Houdaille hydraulic shock absorbers, etc., but perhaps none more than the so-called torque tube drive. This principle of taking the thrust from the rear axle was first introduced into automotive practice by the Ford Motor Company on the Model T car and has later been adopted on many of the finest European and American cars including the Lincoln.

The torque tube is a metal housing surrounding the driving shaft. It takes the driving thrust from the rear axle and carries it to the universal joint, a point well forward on the chassis so that the car is really pulled rather than pushed over the road. This construction also relieves the rear spring of any function except that of supporting the load. This permits the leaves of the spring to be made flexible and shackled at both ends, resulting in free and normal action and an easy absorption of road shocks.

Radius rods join the torque tube at the forged steel housing of the universal joint adding strength and rigidity, keep the rear wheels in perfect alignment, and further resulting in improved riding qualities.

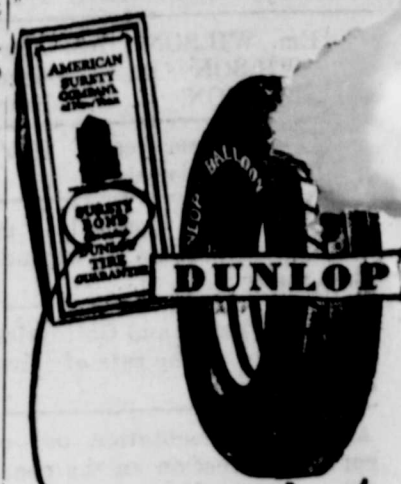



HISTORY OF SCOUTING

The national growth in Scout ing presents some very interesting figures. One must bear in mind that Scouting is not only in this country and in the eighteen years of its organization has been phenomenal. Before the war any figures on the growth of Scouting, it is well to consider certain peculiar aspects of the organization. The ideal conception of service to boyhood is that of volunteer leadership. From the very beginning, Scouting has laid great emphasis on this spirit of volunteer service. At all times the paid leadership has been a very small group; in fact during the early years of Scouting and until the tremendous growth, beginning following the war, the paid leadership numbered less than 200. Today there are 1345 men who are either giving all or part of their time to Scouting who receive pay for this service.

When you call to mind the fact that at the beginning of 1928 there was a total enrollment of 1,169,413 Scouts and Scout Leaders, we must admit that this is an exceptional organization that is carrying on work among such a large number of boys with a very small professional staff. This professional corps of men are selected from among the outstanding leaders in Scout work and specially trained for the office they fill. The duty of professional Scout leaders is to correlate the volunteer leaders and their service with the objectives of the National program in such a way that in each local Council the program shall be made available to the maximum number of boys.

In 1911, there being no accurate statistics available, it is estimated that there were a total of 61,495 Scouts and volunteer leaders in the United States who had all been recruited during the months since Scouting was brought to this country by William Boyce Thompson in February 1910. This year 1927 closed with an actual enrollment of 1,169,413 registered members of the Boy Scouts of America. The total enrollment of the Boy Scouts of America for the years 1919-27 is 4,095,988. During 1927 new volunteer leaders and 293,227 new Boy Scouts were registered.

This tremendous army of boys and men have, during these years, had before them the three great ideals of Scouting—Citizenship Training, Patriotic Service and Character Building.

The results of this training on the boy life of America is interesting. From educators the country over have pointed in the statements that Boy Scouts invariably show a higher percentage in their school grades and are the most loyal supporters of school activities among the student body. Last year 63 percent of the young men who in this country were selected as Rhodes scholars were Boy Scouts. An ever-increasing percentage of enrollment in universities such as Yale, Harvard, Amherst, Dor-

mouth, Cornell, Pennsylvania, West Point and Annapolis are Boy Scouts.

It is not too much to say that the continual teaching of Preparedness which is a part of the Scout Law is largely responsible for this increase in the enrollment of Scouts in institutions of higher learning. In some of our larger institutions of learning, Boy Scouts outnumber the other students. The President of the American Bar Association, at its recent meeting, made a statement in the course of an address that the Boy Scout program is the most reasonable and active deterrent of prevalent criminal tendencies among the young people of this country. Scores of Judges of the Juvenile and Criminal Courts have borne eloquent testimony to the fact that it is an almost unheard-of thing for a boy who has ever been a Boy Scout to be hailed before a Court charged with a violation of the common law of this land.

So marked has been the influence of Scouting upon the boy life of this country that educational leaders, like Dean Russell of Columbia University, have said of the Boy Scout program that it is the only distinctive contribution to the educational progress of this country within the last half century. Many of the larger institutions now give courses in boy leadership along Scouting lines for the purpose of training men in the technique of service to boyhood. Notre Dame University gives a four year course with a degree in Scouting. For several years the University of Texas carried a course in Scouting and was suspended only for lack of funds.

Over the nation the boys have caught the spirit of service and as never before are giving of their time and energy toward serving other people. This well-known slogan of the Boy Scouts of America "DO A GOOD TURN DAILY" is having the adults of the community.

One of the most interesting stories of Scouting is that contained on pages 17-41, inclusive, of the House Document, No. 323, Seventieth Congress, First Session. There the story of good turn service of Scouting is told in such a way that it has elicited the following statement from W. J. O'Shea, Superintendent of Schools, New York City: "I know of no movement among our boys that has done more than the

Boy Scout Movement to set up living standards of fine manhood and wholesome interests." While an immanent surgeon, connected with the New York-Ontario and Western Railway, in commenting on the preparedness of the Boy Scouts said "I take off my hat to those Boy Scouts."

It is impossible to go into a detailed statement of the progress that Scouting has made among America's boys but it can be said that no organization has had such an enrollment and lasting effect on the boys as does the Scouting program.

WORMS KEPT TURKEYS FROM GAINING

Llano—Enormous losses of young turkeys last year in Llano county are due to intestinal worms were stopped by a worm campaign staged by H. C. Robinson, the county agent, who demonstrated the use of a liquid iodine solution introduced directly into the gizzards of the birds. Worms are said to have been completely eliminated within an hour after treatment with no bad after effects. About 10,000 turkeys were thus treated whose owners report an average increase in weight per bird of at least one pound, worth at least 15 cents.

One demonstrator, J. W. Ben skin, treated 115 turkeys in this manner after they had been at a standstill for a month. Within three weeks they had gained an average of four pounds per bird on practically the same amount of feed as

given before treatment. Mr. Robinson states that this method of worm control has the advantage of concentrating the expelled worms in one pen as they are passed, thereby enabling the owner to destroy the pests without having them re-infest the range.

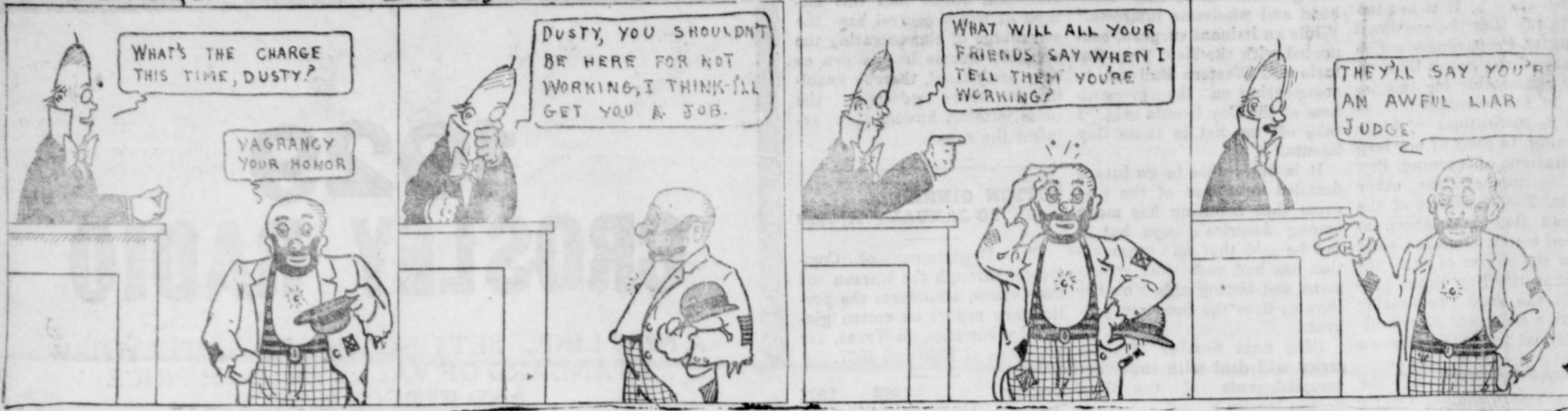
