## CLEAN-UP WEEK PROCLAIMED BY MAYOR

### City To Be Model of Cleanliness

Next week has been designated as Clean-Up Week for Goldthwaite and all citizens are urged to co-operate with the movement. Mayor Bodkin this week issued a proclamation to the citizens, which is here given:

#### A Proclamation

In conformity with the directions of the State Health Department and in obedience to the request of ladies clubs and other citizens of the city, I hereby proclaim the week beginning Monday, April 8, as Clean-Up Week in the city of Goldthwaite. The co-operation of all citizens is requested in this movement, in order that our city may be beautified and made strictly sanitary. Let the owners and occupants of property in all parts of the city put their premises in order, by cleaning the yards, lots, alleys and surroundings generally, as well as cutting weeds and removing every unsightly substance, especially any that will menace the health of the citizenship.

The city wagons will haul free of charge all trash and refuse put into containers and placed at a convenient place on the side of the street. Rocks that are placed in piles free from dirt and trash will also be hauled, but scrapings from stables, cow lots and fowl houses must be moved at the expense of the owner or occupant of the premises.

I sincerely trust every citizen will assist in this movement.

#### STREET ANGEL

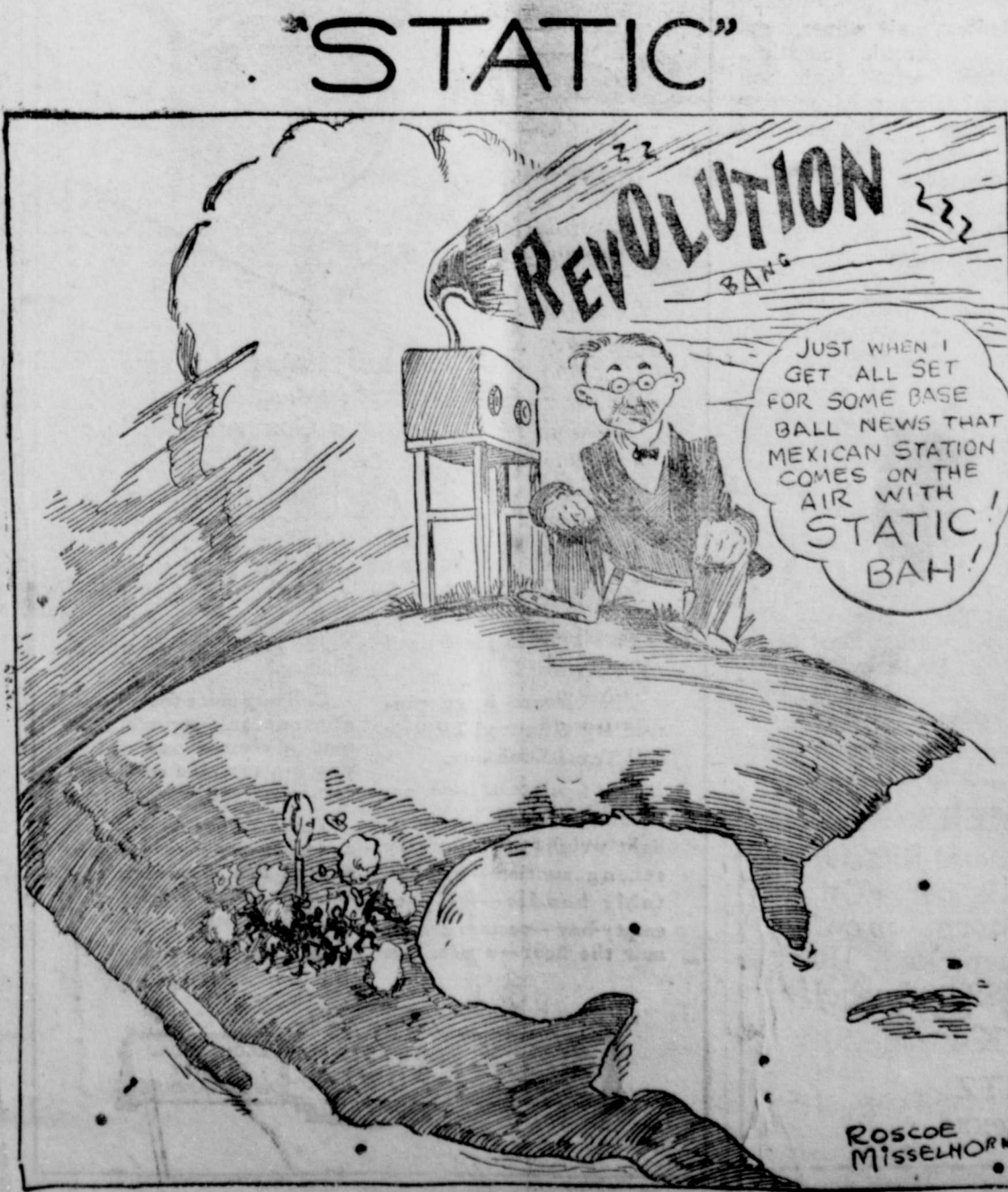

**A MESSAGE TO THE PEOPLE OF MILLS COUNTY**

Fellow Citizens, Patrons of Our Schools and Friends:  
At this time I wish to again make public every step that I have taken in regard to the creation of the office of superintendent of public instruction in this county. The matter was brought to my attention after interested persons had tried to influence another teacher in the county in promoting the movement. I talked to Judge Patterson, the present Ex-Office School Superintendent, members of the county school board and teachers in the county. They all agreed that a county superintendent would be of benefit to the schools. I was advised to introduce a bill in the Legislature providing for the creation of the office. I did this and was advised by our Representative, Hon. Homer C. DeWolf, that he was unwilling to take any action in the matter until he was informed of the opinion of some five or six prominent men in Goldthwaite. I appreciated Mr. DeWolf's position and endeavored to secure what he desired. At the same time I called as mass meeting of interested persons to discuss both sides of the question. This mass meeting was held on Mar. 16 at the Court House in Goldthwaite. I considered this necessary, in order that Mr. DeWolf might be influenced as to the wishes of as large a number of his constituents as possible. I invited Mr. DeWolf to be present at the meeting if he were in town, if not I agreed to send him a report of the meeting. I gave a definite place on the program to Mr. DeWolf and also to Judge Patterson. Neither responded. At this meeting a number of communities were represented. Many of them expressed themselves in favor of the movement. I learned that a petition to determine the matter by an election was being circulated. This pleased me, and I coordinated my efforts with this petition and the election was ordered by the Commissioner's Court; thus taking it entirely out of my hands.

The bill which I had introduced in the Legislature provided that every school in the county should pay the same amount per capita from its available school fund for the payment of the superintendent's salary. According to Mr. Patterson's figures, this would amount to something like 75c. per capita. This method is the one employed by all counties having superintendents and could not raise the taxes in the county. The Rural Aid schools would not be effected financially, as the support of a county superintendent is a legitimate charge against the State Aid Fund, and is allowed in all counties. The bill provided further for the appointment of the Superintendent by the County Board of Education. This provision was in accordance with the amendment passed by a majority of the people of Texas in the July election of 1928. This bill also limited the salary paid so that at no time it could exceed \$1800 and traveling expenses. Under the provisions of the bill it might be any amount up to \$1800. Approximately one hundred citizens in Mills County and other communities signed the petition asking for the passage of the bill with the understanding that every school in the county should pay its part of the expense. This bill will not be passed as the action of the commissioner's court superseded the bill.

Fellow taxpayers, you have a right to a clear presentation of this matter. For your convenience I give a quotation from the civil statute concerning the creation of this office and an outline of the duties of said superintendent. Either may be verified at anytime. Section 57, Office Established.—The commissioners court of every county having three thousand scholastic population or more as shown by the preceding scholastic census, shall at each general election provide for the election of a county superintendent to serve for a term of two years, who

shall be a person of educational attainments, good moral character, and executive ability, and who shall be provided by the commissioners court with an office in the court house, and with the necessary office furniture and fixtures. He shall be the holder of a teacher's first grade certificate, or teacher's permanent certificate. In every county that shall attain three thousand scholastic population or more, the commissioners court shall appoint such superintendent, who shall perform the duties of such office until the election and qualification of his successor. In counties having less than three thousand scholastic population, whenever more than twenty-five per cent of the qualified voters of the county, as shown by the vote for Governor at the preceding general election, shall petition the commissioners court therefor, said court shall order an election for said county to determine whether or not the office of county superintendent shall be created in said county; and if a majority of the qualified property tax-paying voters, voting at said election, shall vote for the creation of the office of county superintendent in said county, the commissioners court, at its next regular term after the holding of office until the next general election.

Sec. 59 (2690) Supervision of Schools.—The county superintendent shall have, under the direction of the State Superintendent, the immediate supervision of all matters pertaining to public instruction in his county. He shall confer with the teachers and trustees and give them advice when needed, visit and examine schools, and deliver lectures that shall tend to create an interest in public education. He shall spend four days each week visiting the schools while they are in session, when it is possible for him to do so. He shall have authority over all of the public schools within his county, except such of independent school districts as have a scholastic population of five hundred or more. In such independent school districts as have less than five hundred population, the reports of the principals and treasurers to the State Department of Education shall be approved by the county superintendent and forwarded to the State Superintendent. All appeals in such independent school districts shall be to the county superintendent, and from the decisions of the county superintendent to the State Department, and thence to the State Board of Education.

Sec. 69 (2700) Salary.—The county superintendent shall receive from the available school fund of their respective counties annual salaries based on the scholastic population of such counties, as follows:

Population	Salary
3,000 or less	\$1600.00
3,001 to 4,000	1800.00
4,001 to 5,000	1900.00
5,001 to 6,000	2000.00
6,001 to 7,000	2200.00
7,001 to 8,000	2400.00
8,001 to 9,000	2500.00
9,001 to 10,000	2600.00
10,001 or more	2800.00

In making the annual per capita apportionment to be schools, the county school trustees shall also make an annual allowance out of the State and county available funds for the salary and expenses of the office of the county superintendent, and the same shall be prorated to the schools coming under the supervision of the county school superintendent. The compensation herein provided for shall be paid monthly upon the order of the county school trustees; provided, that the salary for the month of September

shall not be paid until the county superintendent presents a receipt from the State Superintendent showing that he has made all reports required of him. The county board of trustees may make any further provision as it deems necessary for office and traveling expenses of the county superintendent and any assistant he may have; provided that expenditures for office and traveling expenses shall not exceed three hundred dollars per annum.

I have dealt as fairly and as honestly in regard to this matter as I knew how.

I will say further that I have a very high regard for Judge Patterson, and went to his office and told him so before I took one step in regard to the matter. Therefore, it is no personal attack on him or his efficiency.

I see great possibilities in the rural schools in the county. I believe in them and wish to see them built up. If I never profit in any way from the creation of this office, I shall consider my time well spent in trying to better the condition of the rural schools.

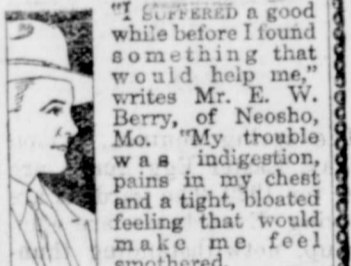

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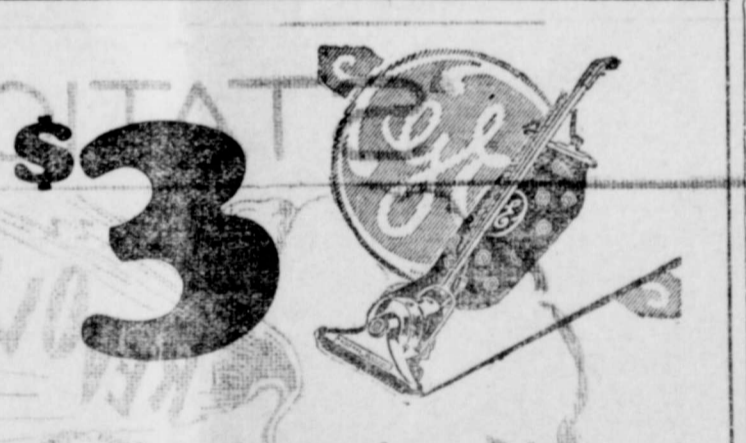

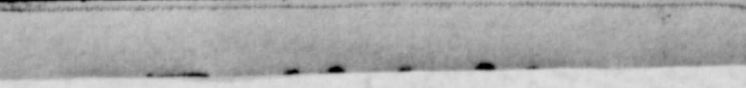

**ELECTION ORDER**

Whereas, the required number of taxpayers have petitioned the Commissioners Court for an election to determine whether or not the office of County Superintendent of Public Schools shall be created in Mills county, it was this day ordered by the Court that said election shall be held on Saturday, April 20, 1929, and that the polls shall be opened at the several voting places in said county at 8 o'clock a. m. and remain open until 7 o'clock p. m. on said April 20, 1929, and the officers of election heretofore appointed for the various polling places in the county shall hold said election.

All property taxpayers of the county, who are otherwise qualified voters, shall be entitled to vote in said election. Those desiring the creation of said office of County Superintendent of Public Schools shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "For the creation of the office of County School Superintendent of Mills county," and those opposed to the creation of said office shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "Against the creation of the office of County Superintendent of Public Schools for Mills county."

Presiding Judges of Election are hereby directed to proceed, in conjunction with the judges and clerks of said election, and in accordance with law, to count the votes polled in said precinct at said election, and thereupon, after certifying correct returns thereof officially, in triplicate, in connection with said judges and clerks, to seal up and deliver, through one of the judges, on or before the Monday next following the day of election, one copy thereof to the County Judge of this county, one copy of said returns to the County Clerk of said county, to be kept by him in his office open to inspection by the public for twelve months following the day of election, and the third copy of said returns to be retained by the presiding officer of the election for twelve months from the day of election. Said returns must show: First, the total number of votes polled at such box; second, the number of votes polled for and against the creation of the office of county school superintendent.

This notice is given in conformity with the action of the Court and under its direction on this the 16th day of March, 1929, and is directed to be published in the Goldthwaite Eagle for four consecutive issues, to wit, March 22 and 29, April 6 and 13, 1929.

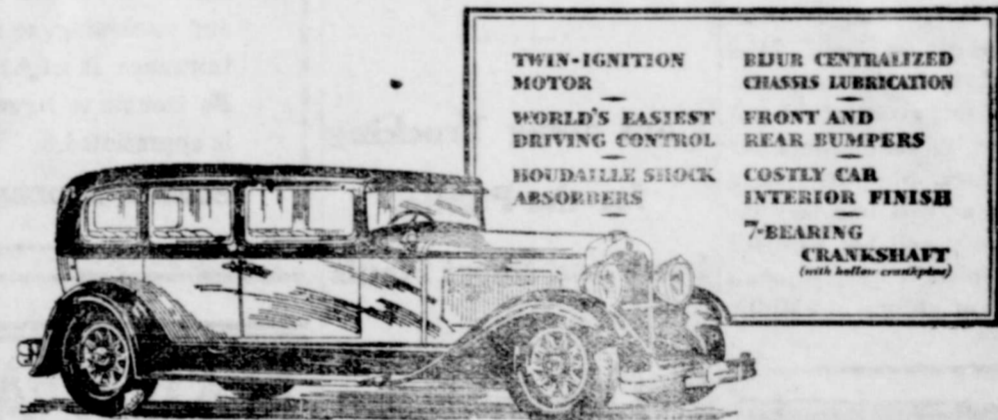
