STATE INCOME TAX

Rains of Vast Benefit Fall All Over This Section of Texas By United Press.

Austin, Texas, May 7-Although favorably reported by the house committee on revenue and taxation, the Mauritz bill evying a state income tax has little chance to pass, observers ere believed today.

The bill was reported out of the committee by a vote of 7 to 5. It developed in the executive session in which the vote was taken that one member tist Sunday school rendered an admitted frankly that he would vote against the bill although he voted a favorable report. Another committee member, after opposing the bill at its hearing, left before the vote was taken.

The member who is against the bill but who voted to report it favorably represents the feeling of the average legislator.

An income tax is a fair tax and it is coming in time, but I am not going to vote for any 60-page bill on such an important topic in the short time that remains for the special session," said Representative Phil L. Sanders of Nacogdoch-

Similar expressions were made by others. Lack of time to study the bill and find out how it will work practically was urged against it at the hearing.

How slight a chance for the bill to pass at this session was illustrated by the frantic way in which the house reversed tself last Friday to pass out prison bill.

It had been agreed and voted that the bill would not be taken up until Wednesday of his week.
