The Goldthwaite plant was purchased Nov. 1, 1927, since which time the entire system has been re-built. including a modern and model power plant, the total investment here representing possibly \$150,000, and the improvements are still going on. An idea of the immensity of the plant and investment can be gained from the fact that at the time of the most extensive remodeling forty men were employed and a considerable crew is still maintained. The plant is a modern brick and tile structure, with stone ornamentation, with a floor space of 36x80 feet. The old plant of 150 horse power capacity was replaced with the newest and most approved machinery of 350 horse power capacity, so arranged as to provide for 2,000 horse power if desired or needed. 


Interior View of Office of Texas-Louisiana Power Co.




