CARE OF POULTRY

Late hatched and poorly developed pullets are certain to be unprofitable layers fall, according to Clyde In gram, poultry specialists he Louisiana Extension Serrice, who spoke before poultry session at the Farmres Short Course at the A. & M College, "I believe that 40 per ent of our losses from poultry liseases and parasites could b controlled by starting with vig prous standard breeding stock and keeping clean chicks, clear prooder house, clean feed and itter, and clean range. To get good growth and development ith young pullets through the ot summer months," he said it is necessary that plenty of ange be provided, that tender, ucculent green feed be abundint, and that cockrels and pulets be separated early rder to make room for nore promising pullets. The indesirable ones of both sexes hould be fattened and marketed. Shade is essential, and if not present should be provided artificially. Self feeders on ne range will minimize labor and hasten maturity of growng stock. Successful poultry keeping depends upon the abilty of the poultryman to proluce pullets that are ready to go into the laying house in August or September free from such diseases as coccidiosis, intestinal parasites and paralysis. This is impossible if one attempts to grow young and old stock on the same ground year after year. Vigor is the first onsideration in the selection of pullets to go into the laying house in the fall. A summer range house provides for an abundance of fresh air and can be moved frequently to new locations, ,thus avoiding the
