OKLAHOMA TRAIN WRECK

Mr. J. D. Bryan returned Saturday from Sherman, where he had been to attend the funeral of his nephew, H. A. Bryan, who was killed in a train wreck at Henryetta, Okla., on Sunday, August 18. The wreck was caused by a misplaced switch, the authorities and railroad people believe, and it is also thought the object was likely robbery of the train, which was one of the fast trains on the Frisco road. The train left Sherman going north and was manned by railroad employes of long experience. It is said the signal light showed a clear track, but when the engine struck the switch it went over the side, a coach loaded with negroes escaped the engine and fell along side of it, when a stream of steam literally cooked 11 of the helpless occupants of the car. Mr. Bryan, who was a member of the engine crew, was thrown clear of the wreck but was instantly killed, while the other engine man was buried beneath the engine and could not be removed until two wreckers were brought into service; however, he was instantly killed.

H. A. Bryan was a nephew of J. D. Bryan, but was more like a son, as he was partly reared in the Bryan home, he having been left an orphan and his father being a brother of Mr. Bryan and his mother a sister of Mrs. Bryan. He was 44 years of age and had a record of long and faithful service with the Frisco railroad. He had been a resident of Sherman for 25 years and leaves a wife and son, besides a number of other relatives, including the Bryan family of this place.

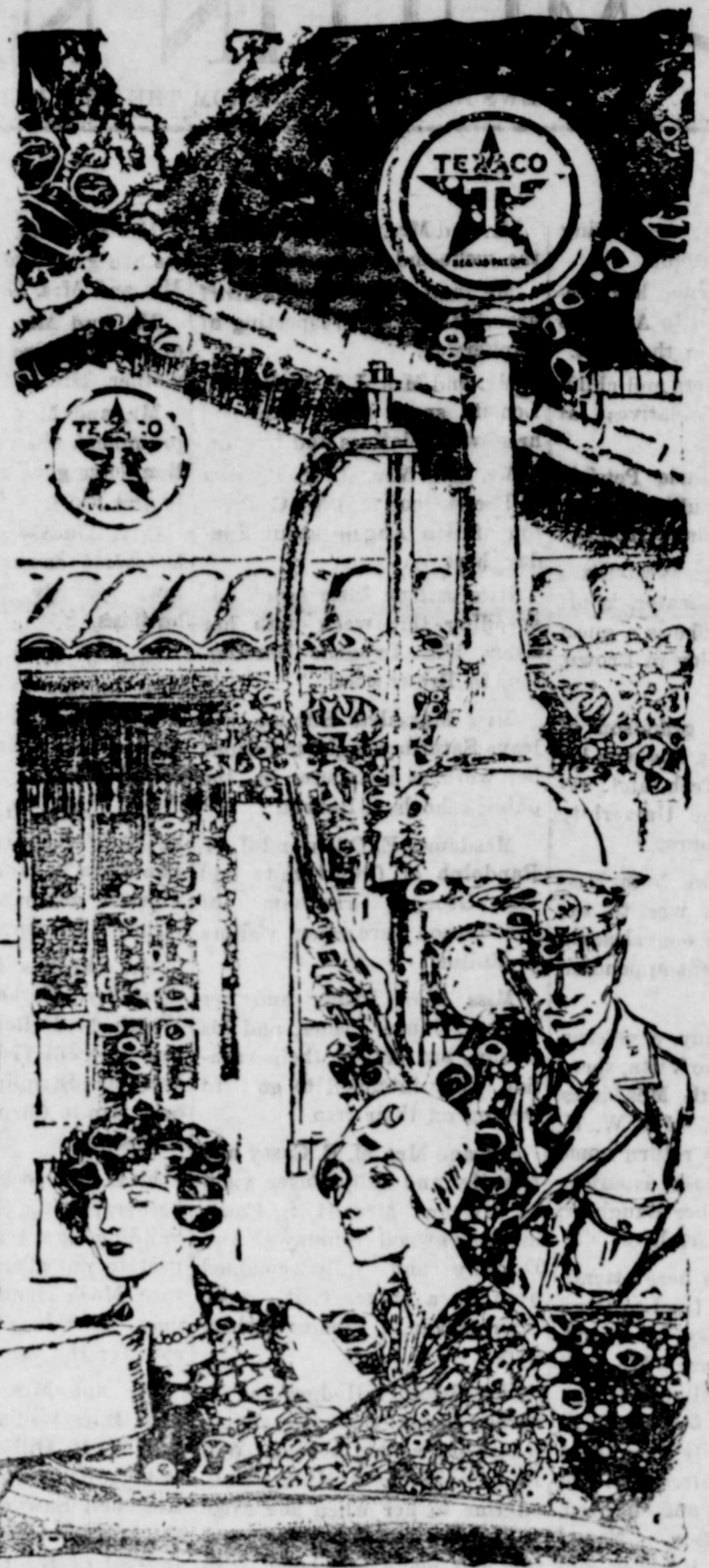

STATE TAX RATE

Completing its work Friday the State Automatic Tax Board reduced the school tax rate from 35c to 31c, making the total rate this year 68c, an increase of 4 cents over last year. This is the first time the board has reduced the school tax since the maximum was fixed at 35c. The reduction was made on motion of Gov. Dan Moody, who contended that because of a surplus of \$3,300,000 in the school fund a higher rate than 31c was not needed. The board previously had fixed the ad valorem rate at 30c, an increase of 8c over last year, and set the Confederate pension rate at 7c, the same as last year.
