It is a notable, but unhappy fact that accidents outside the confiol of the railroads have increased during these same years. Grade crossing accidents, which are within the jurisdiction of the motoring public, have steadily risen, in spite of gigantic expenditures for crossing protection. The public has, apparently, turned a deaf ear to the old plea of "Stop, look and listen." The safety work of the railroads has been equally as important as their work in cutting costs and raising standards of service. It would seem that the least the public can do is to cooperate in preventing accidents which are solely within the control of the public.






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
