Savory Church Suppers That All Will Em

By JOSEPHINE B. GIBSON Director, Home Economics Dept., H. J. Heinz Company

P LANNING meals for a large group of persons, possibly a hundred or more, seems difficult to most of us, for it means thinking in much greater quantities than those to which we are accustomed. Yet church and community suppers require that someone be able to plan menus and estimate carefully the quan-tity of food needed.

Since these suppers usually are for the purpose of raising money, they should be as simple and inexpensive as possible, while furnishing ample quantities of nourishing and appetizing food. Below will be found two carefully planned menus, with complete recipes and the approximate quantities of food required to serve 150 people. If you will slip these suggestions into your cook or recipe file, you may find them exceedingly helpful when you are called to serve on the entertainment committee:

Baked Ham
Oven Baked Beans, Vegetarian Style
Hot Rolls Cole Slaw
Fresh Cucumber Relish Fig or Plum Pudding with Sauce Coffee

Menu I

Baked Ham 4 hams (10 lbs. each); brown sugar, cups; 3 cups pure cider vinegar; whole cloves; 34 cup crumbs.

Cook the hams until tender, Peel off the skins, arrange in baking pans, and stick cloves over the surface of the hams. Make a syrup of the brown sugar and pure cider vinegar, and pour and brown in a hot oven.

Baked beans may be purchased, f you do not wish to prepare you do not wish to prepare usually termed Number 10 Cans, which hold about a gallon each, and serve from 28 to 30 persons. Therefore, 5 or 6 of these large cans will be sufficient for 150

Cole Slaw

12 lbs. cabbage; 1% cups chopped pimentos; 1½ cups chopped green pepper; 2½ qts. mayonnaise dressing; ½ cup pure cider vinegar; ½ cup sugar; salt, pepper.

Slice the cabbage and let soak in cold water one and one-half hours. Just before serving, drain off the water; mix the cabbage

with the other ingredients, add | well into the corner dressing and serve.

Order a gallon of pickle relish to serve 150. A large can fig or plum pudding is enough for 12 to 15 people, so for 150 provide one dozen large puddings. Allow 2 rolls to each person, or 300 in all, and three pounds of butter cut in a butter slicer. Four pounds of coffee will be required for this number of people.



CITY ORDINANCE

CHAPTER 68.

An ordinance, to be a part of the code of ordinances of the City of Goldthwaite, Texas, providing for the control of contageous and infectious diseases, providing for quarantine in certain cases, and prescribing a penalty.

e it ordained by the City Council of the City of Gold-thwaite, Texas:-ARTICLE I.

Section 1. For the purpose of sanitation and the the control of contageous and infectious iseases, the entire provisions of the "Sanitary Code," as set out in Art. 4477 Revised Civil Statutes of the State of Texas, is hereby adopted as the rule and guide for the City Health Officer of Goldthwaite, Texas, and other officers charged with conservation of the public

Section 2. Quarantine. The City Health officer is hereby empowered and it is his duty to quarantine such cantageous and infectious diseases as are described in rule 3, said article 4477 of the Revised Statutes of Texas, to-wit: Asiatic Cholora, bubonic plague, typhus fever, yellow fever, leprosy, small-pox, scarlet fever, diphtheria, epidemic cerebrospinal meningitis, dengue typhoid fever, epidemic trachoma, tubercuosis, and anthrax.

Section 3. Such quarantine may be absolute or modified, as the nature of the diseases may require, and it may be of all the premises, part of the premises, or of one room only. And it may apply to all or part of the in-habitants of said room or pre-

Section 4. The quarantine as provided for in the sections preceding shall be perfected by giving oral notice by the City Health Officer to the inhabitants of said room or premises, and by placing a yellow flag, or a yellow placard bearing the blood tested flocks. Section 5. When a quarentine is established, no person shall violate the same. Any person, who shall go out of, or into said the same of t quarantined room or premises, without the permission of the City Health Officer, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeandeemed guilty of a misdemean-or, and on conviction, shall be fined in any sum not less than \$1.00 and not more than \$50.00. And any person who persists in violating such quarantine shall be arrested and imprisoned until he or she is properly disin-fected by the City Health Offi-

Section 6. Any person shall take from any quarantin-ed premises, any clothing, bedding, towels, dishes, or other property in violation of said quarantine, or in such manner as to spread the disease quaran-tined against, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction, fined not less than \$1.00 and not more than

shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction shall be fined not less than \$1.00 and not more than \$50.00.

Section 8. The Mayor of the City of Goldthwaite, is hereby empowered and authorized to appoint such officers or guards as are necessary to enforce this ordinance. Such officers or ordinance. Such officers or guards, so appointed shall have the power and authority of a policeman, or police

Section 1. The City Health Officer shall have power and authority, supported by resolu-tion of the City Council of the City of Goldthwaite, duly placed on the minutes of said Coun-cil, to close all public places of amusement, churches and schools in the City of Goldthwaite, Texas, in case of an epidemic of contageous disease, where the preservation of the public health requires it. Section 2. Any person violating such closing order, as pro-vided for in Section 1 of this article, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on con-viction shall be fined in any
