TEACHERS MAY NOW BE GIVEN LONGER CON. TRACT BY TRUSTEES

Austin, Texas, April 14 .- S. M. N. Marrs, state superintendent of public instruction, has called attention of school officials to provisions of House Bill 57, passed by the fifth called session of the 41st legislature, now in effect, authorizing boards of trustees in independent school districts having scholastic population of fewer than 5,000 to employ a superintendent, principal, teacher of other executive officers in the school for a term not to exceed three years and in those over 5,000 for a term not to exceed

"There are many deserving teachers and school executives who should be rewarded by being tendered a contract for more than one year," Superintendent Marrs said. "Annual re-election produces a feeling of unrest and does not contribute o efficiency of service. Boards of trustees should compliment competent and faithful emloyes by electing them for a onger term than one year. The policy should be adopted for re-electing for one year when irst chosen, the second election should be for two years and then gradually increase the term to the maximum so long as excellent service is rendered. Failure to elect for a long term when due according to previous employment, would be a warning to the teacher that her position is insecure and unless she made decided improvement would result in her being dropped at the end of her contract.

"This law is a part of the general program which seeks to increase the efficiency of the school system by making the administration more permanent, It is one of the enabling acts which puts into operation the constitutional amendment dopted in 1928 that conferred the power upon the legislature o extend the terms of all school officials not to exceed six years.


