

NEW PLAN FOR CO-OPERATIVE SELLING

It is of interest to Texas farmers to know that the contract to be used in the co-operative selling of their cotton through the new Texas Cotton Association, has been liberalized. Under the rule of the old Farm Bureau Cotton Association, a farmer had to contract to deliver all cotton coming into his possession for a stipulated period of years. Under the rule of the new organization, a member of the Association is obligated only every other bale up to 10 bales, and then he may dispose of the remainder of his erop at will. He also has the option of delivering cotton to be held and sold on his order, or place it in a pool to be sod at the option of the Association.




