A hunting license does not authorize a person to hunt or take fur-bearing animals or their pelts.

A person who takes furbearing animals by any means must have a trapper's license.

All persons except those under the age of seventeen years eure a trapper's license.

It is unlawful for persons to hunt with a gun in a county other than the one in which they reside.



Partial reports from home demonstration agents in 17 scat tered Texas counties indicate that canned beef and veal to the value of \$3492.30 had already been put up by farm families by the end of October. with the prospect of about ten times that much to be taken care of as the cooler weather comes on.

Prices offered for the meat animals used in these demonstrations ranged from \$5 to \$16, according to weight and the local market needs. The profits realized by canning varied from \$13.50 to \$30 and the cost of canning, including containers, varied according to the size of the beef, but averaged about \$6.50 per animal.
