



JOBS FOR THE LEGISLATURE

The next legislature will have before it work of highest importance to the welfare of the state.

First there will be the task of redistricting the state to provide for the election of three additional Congressmen — a most difficult job, if all see appeased.

Then it must face the grow ing demand for a driver's license law. There isn't a lot of popular interest manifested in the matter, but lives are at stake.

Bills will be offered to inrease taxes, in the form of speial levies, against prosperous Texas industries. There is danger here, because Texas stands upon the verge of an era of industrial development which de most astute of the competitive pends, to large extent,upon the disposition to levy taxes of a punitive or discriminatory, character will cost the state a thousand times the amount of revenue involved. Industry should beat a just share of the burden of government, neither more nor less. Upon such a basis, and no other, can the program of prosperity through industrialization be consummat.

weights for trucks which use the public highways; it will be sked to levy taxes sufficient. but no more, to repair the damage trucks have done the highvays; and, finally, it will be asked to place trucks engaged in the public carrier business under the same supervision as are the vailroads. Otherwise the condition of the railroads will become so impaired as to render them of little service to the state, which, in large measure, they have built.

Then there is the perennial prison problem, still demanding solution; there is the task of re vising and modernizing the code of criminal law and procedure; and there is the everpresent demand for greater economy and efficiency in the administration of government.

Truly the incoming legislature has before it many man'ssized tasks. But, fortunately, it has the confidence of the people and a quality of leadership of which much may be expected.-Editorial Digest.

Chinese Telephone Uperators Must Know Several Languages

Automatic Exchanges to Relieve Situation in One of World's **Oldest** Countries


"Telephone girls in China are often w three or four languages," says Moses D. Swen, Chinese national government student studying in this co untry, in the WESTERN ELEC-The Chinese often TRIC NEWS. two or three dialects, sometimes in-cluding broken English, while making one telephone call. For instance, in Shanghai, which is an international city as far as population is concerned, the three dialects most commonly spoken include Mandarin, Shanghai and Cantonese. This situation has resulted in the adoption of the dial sys-tem wherever new telephone equip-ment is installed."

ment is installed." The rotary automatic system, with a capacity of 10,000 lines, was installed in Shanghai during 1928, serving both the International Settlement and the French Concession. The Chineserument's Department of Comm The Chinese Govtion maintains a telephone system in the areas adjoining the Shanghai forsettlements.




