



> Perhaps the most tragic phase of fire is that it is practically wholly unnecessary. Eighty per cent or more of fires-including many of those which cause the greatest waste in both life and property-could have been prevented by the exercise of care and the sort of knowledge that is expounded during the annual Fire Prevention Week and which can be easily obtained from various private organizations, or from local fire authori-




