The court held a regular monthly meeting Monday and transacted considerable business, while much of it was of routine

The tax levy was made for 1931 which is the same as the rate for the past several years, whereas, the tax valuations have materially decreased. The total assessed values for the county this year are \$5,342,750, as against \$5,610,110 last year. The tax rate of 60 cents on the \$100 valuation is less than most of the counties in this section. The tax is divided among the var-25c; court house fund, 15c; road and bridge fund, 15c; jury fund,

The levy in the various school districts was made in accordance with the special tax voted. Rock Springs district has joined the number of special tax districts with a levy of 30c.

The highway money was divided between the different precincts according to the collections from the precincts: No. 1 \$90.08; No. 2, \$60.86; No. \$95.20; No. 4, \$43,15.
