
HERO FOUNL



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



It Has Happened Before

Here is a speech made in Congress at Washington by a distinguished statesman. It eloquently portrays the distress under which our nation is laboring at present:

"In casting our eves around us, the most prominent circumstance which fixes our attention and challenges our deepest regret is the general distress which pervades the whole country. It is forced upon us by numerous facts of the most incontestable character. It is indicated by the diminished commerce; by successive unthreshed crops of grain, perishing in our barns and barnyards for the want of a market; by the alarming diminution of the circulation medium; by the numerous bankruptcies, not limited to the trading classes but extending to all orders of society; by an universal complaint of the want of employment, and a consequent reduction of the wages of labor; by the ravenous pursuit after public situations, not for the sake of their honors and the performance of their public duties, but as a means of private subsistence; by the reluctant resort to the perilous use of paper money; by the intervention of legislation in the delicate relation between debtor and creditor; and, above all, by the low and depressed state of the value of almost every description of the whole mass of the property of the nation, which has, on an average, sunk not less than about 50 per cent within a few years. This distress pervades every part of the Union, every class of society; all feel it, though it may be felt at different places in different degrees.

But this speech was made by Henry Clay on March 30, 1824-109 years ago. Conditions improved after that, and we are sure they will improve again.




