## REORGANIZING RELIEF

The pleasing information comes from Washington that the relief administration is preparing a reorganization of the entire system and that a work program is to take the place of the dole plan as operated the past year. Most of those who have been the beneficiaries of the government's relief system will, very likely, favor the idea of being allowed to earn what they get rather than having it as a free gift. In some places there has been a slip-shod system of work in return for the supplies passed out with a free and liberal hand by the government, but there has in reality been very little actual benefit to the government as a result of

There is nothing decreditable for those who need help from the government during a time of depression, stress of misfortune and we should all be proud of our great and liberal government for its activity in behalf of those who were and still are in need of help, but there is no doubt the system has been imposed on in many cases and in many sections, hence the announcement of intended reorganization is received with satisfaction.

Another feature of the reorganization plan that is wise and helpful is the declaration that the wages paid to workers will be in keeping with the schedule of pay in the district or territory where the relief employment is supplied. It should be neither higher or lower than conditions and customs have maintained, while at all times affording a sufficiency for the support of the workers and those dependent upon them, without creating dissatisfaction with the economic conditions and regulations around them.

## VOTING ON COTTON PLAN

The secretary of agriculture has announced the date for the cotton farmers of the south to vote on the acceptance or rejection of the Bankhead cotton control law for the next year, Every body recognizes the need and benefit of some character of government control of cotton production, in the interest of the cotton growers themselves. Various voluntary plans have been tried during the past three-quarters of a century, but none have ever resulted in benefit. It has, therefore, become apparent that some means of forcing a curtailment of production to somewhere near the world's needs has become necessary. The arbitrary curtailment of production, however, is fraught with considerable danger in that other countries are encouraged to grow cotton when the American supply is reduced and the price increased, but the government has recently endeavored to reach a reciprocal agreement with the nations that are large users of cotton whereby they will take our cotton and we, in turn, will buy their products. When and if this plan is perfected there will be an assurance of a market for the cotton produced by the American farmers, many of whom will advocate the control measure when they have the assurance that the objectionable features developed this year, because of the plan being untried, will be eliminated.






