PRESENT STATUS OF RELIEF

The final allotment of federal funds for relief purposes in Texas has been received. At the close of business December 31, a complete re-organization with curtailment of activities is necessary. On that date all district offices and set-ups as they now exist will be abolished.

Effective January 1, and for a short period of time, it will be possible with funds in hand to issue direct relief to unemployed only. The check will be issued direct from Austin. Some kind of office will be provided in each county, though because of the small case-load and the small staff, there will be many counties in which no full-time employee is maintained. Some counties may be visited by a case worker only once or twice a month. On those days of visiting the case worker will need some kind of office where applications may be taken and business transacted.

After January 1, it will be impossible to give medical attention, hospital or dental care even to those unemployed clients who are carried on the relief rolls. Further, since these clients will receive only semi-monthly checks mailed from Austin, and since there will be no provisions for granting emergency relief prior to the receipt of the first check, it is readily apparent that the local communities must at once assume a large share of responsibility for these cases.

There will be many needy persons during the winter who will need assistance, and the local community will be their only source of help. Mills county has been absorbed by district 15. Mrs. Viola Perkins is the administrator of the district. Her headquarters will be at Brady.

The merchants of Mills county, who have been filling disbursement orders for the county relief office, must send the orders into the district office at Waco by January 8, in order to receive prompt pay, as the district office in Waco will close January 15.

Intake provisions: There will be an office maintained in Mills county, where interviews will be taken on applicants for WPA and resettlement aid. There will be no change in the eligibility regulations of the individual applying for aid through WPA and resettlement administration. These applicants must be eligible for relief from a standpoint of basic needs. While no monetary aid will be given to these people by the Texas relief commission, a certain amount of service will be given by the case workers, which entails study of the situation surrounding the individual who is applying, and consequent referral to one of these two government agencies. Young Epley was in an adjoining room cleaning a rifle, and when discharged the bullet went through a door before striking Judge Sweet in the left side. An operation to remove the bullet was performed that evening, but since Saturday little hope was held for his recovery.
