R. M. THOMPSON EAGLE EDITOR LAID TO REST

Death came Tuesday to silence the voice and still the pen of the Goldthwaite Eagle's veteran editor and publisher, R. M. Thompson. While he did not live to see this issue put to press, much of it was written and proof-read by him. Because so many of you who will read these lines were his personal friends, it is not unfitting to tell you how he died.

Many times, particularly in recent years after his health had broken, Mr. Thompson had expressed the hope that he would be spared a lingering death and be taken at his work.

Last week he felt a warning that the end was near, but, rather than alarm his loved ones, he kept the premonition to himself. Sunday, with firm step and unclouded eye, he attended church services both morning and evening. At noon and in the afternoon he enjoyed an informal reunion of his family. Monday, though ill, he worked all day, carrying on by sheer nerve and inflexible will power as he had done on so many other days in recent years. It was then that he confided to his friend, Brother Bowles, that he knew his time was up. "But," he added, "I am ready to go."

Early Tuesday morning he was back at his desk, gave his instructions for the work to be done that day, and then went home. He was gravely ill all day. Just at five o'clock the hour when it was his custom at the Eagle to call, "Quitting Time," for the day, his tired spirit answered a higher call and passed peacefully and without a struggle to eternal rest.

Mr. Thompson was a young man when he came to Goldthwaite and Mills county soon after their organization. To them he devoted all of his best years. When, several years ago, he left here to travel widely and to publish papers in Lampasas, Brownwood and Cleburne, he was never satisfied. Goldthwaite was still home to him, and his happiest days were when he came back to stay.

One by one he saw the associates of early days here retire from business, most of them to answer the call of death. Although still lacking several years of his allotted three score years and ten, at his death he was the only one of those Goldthwaite pioneers still actively engaged in business. Now he too

Thursday morning, in the presence of many friends, his earthly remains were buried under the shade of a sturdy little oak tree which, years ago, when it was hardly more than a sapling, he had selected to mark his final resting place.

It has been a difficult task to go on with the printing of this issue of the Eagle, but the prompt and regular publication of his paper was a passion with R. M. Thompson. No matter what happened, the Eagle must come out on time. He was proud of the fact that never in his long career had he missed printing a single issue. He looked on his relationship to his readers as a solemn covenant. It was his part of the contract to deliver the news to them accurately, impartially, legibly and on time each week. This we also have endeavored and shall continue to endeavor to do.







No one-wide from a few zeal ots-believe that Lemke can be elected. Few believe that he can attain a majority in even one state. But he can be of tremendous importance in determining the Roosevelt-Landon race. Before going farther into that, it is well to present a brief history of the third party movement i American politics:

There are always third parties, of course, and fourth and fifth parties as well. Best examples are the Socialist and Commu parties, which put a ticket into the field each year. But these parties do not affect either of the major parties-they have ertain established following, and their total vote varies but litt from one election to another. They do not attract voters in an number from the Democratic or Republican parties. The important third parties are those which are brought into being ome problem or condition of the moment and which, thoug they may live only for one election, present an appeal to a certain proportion of the voters of the major parties. It is in this classiw party apparently belongs.

Several times in the history of the republic, such a third party has determined the election. Most notable example of that was e election of 1860, when Lincoln and Douglas contended for the idency. Two other parties were also in the field. Lincoln reed only 40 per cent of the vote, yet was elected. Had all of incoln's opposition gone to Douglas, the latter would have won

Another notable example occurred in 1884, when Blaine was the Republican nominee, running against Grover Cleveland. The decisive state was New York. Cleveland carried it by the astonishingly small majority of 1,100 votes, and so was elected to the highest office in the land. The prohibition candidate in New York received the record total of 25,000 votes that year. Had ten per ent of the votes gone to Blaine, he would have won.

The most exceptful third party was led by Theodore Roosevel in 1912, which ran second to the Democratic party headed by Woodrow Wilson. In that year, the Republican candidate Taft took one of the worst defeats ever received by a major party

Most recent example of an important third party was the Progressive Party, which had the elder Senator LaFollette for it candidate. This party carried but one state, Wisconsin, but received a good-sized vote in almost every state. It was not a decigive factor in the election, however, for the reason that Coolidge went into the presidency by a tremendous electorial majority; his opponent, John W. Davis, carrying only the traditionally Demo-

To return to the present, Candidate Lemke has a strong followmg in a number of what may be extremely important states which are more or less in the "doubtful" class, and which might be able to swing the battle in favor of either Roosevelt or Landon. These are the northwest states-the Dakotas, Montana and Wyoming and, to drop south a bit, Ohio, and some others. Under the American elective system, the candidate who attains a majority in a state receives all its electorial votes, even though his majoray consists of but one vote. Thus, in a close state, a few thousand votes cast for Lemke could very easily take that state away from one major candidate and swing it to the other.

Which candidate has the most to fear from Lemke's candidacy' Some observers say that at least 90 per cent of the Lemke vote will be taken from Roosevelt, practically none from Landon. Ever as the New Deal is more radical than the Republican party, so is the Union party more radical than the New Deal. It may draw its strength from those who feel the president has not gone far enough in one direction or the other.

AN INDEX TO PROSPERITY

There is no better index to the financial improvement throughout the country than the sales of automobiles. While automobiles are in reality necessary, they are generally classed in the line of luxuries; hence, the increase or lowering the sales of cars is very significant. Here are some of the figures compiled by the best authorities:

Sales in the first three months of the year amounted to 693,722 cars, as compared to 568,727 in the corresponding period in 1935, an increase of 22 per cent. Compared to the low point of the depression in 1933, when sales totaled only 228,065 cars, sales this year increased 204.2 per cent.

Production in the first quarter exceeded sales by a considerable margin. Actual production for the domestic market in the Janpary to March period totaled 808,387 units. To this must be added the excess production over sales of 1934 and 1935. In 1934, the excess amounted to 105,206 automobiles while in 1935. the figure was 297,969. Thus, the total supply available for domestic customers in the first three months was 1,212,062 cars.

These figures give a pretty good idea of the improved conditions the country over.

A STRONG GOVERNMENT

The immense line up of figures shows the stability of public credit. The total go vernmental debt stands at the record figure of \$53,000,000,000, o f which federal debts account for \$34,000,000,000 and state, county and municipal debt for \$19,-200.000.000. It averages \$424 for e very man, woman and child in this country—\$2,120 for a family of five.
