LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto immediately after Sec-

tion 48, and to read as follows:

"Section 48a: In addition to the powers given the Legislature, under Section 48 of Article III, Legislature shall have authority to regulate procedure before the Board and to enact parole laws; and to provide for an election for such proposed constitutional amendment, and to make an ap-propriation therefor. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 11 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as fol-




