

Weaver examining some terraces built in 1921. After fifteen years experience Mr. Petty is enthusiastic about terraces. Gullies and washes which could not be crossed with cultivating implements have leveled up. Increased crops on the terraced land are due to holding the fertile top soil in place and retaining the water on the soil until it is absorbed, according to Mr. Petty, This early terracing demonstration is located on the highway between Goldthwaite and Priddy. The Priddy farmers watched it for a few years, then they bought two terracing levels and asked County Agent Weaver to teach them how to run the lines. There have been some 39,000 acres of farm land protected by terraces in mace, installed a new Mills county under Weaver's direction during the sixteen years he has served as county agent.



AMENDMENTS—FOR OR AGAINST

In the Eagle of October 9, the first amendment to be voted apon, the so-called Liquor Amendment, was discussed. Because it would put the State of Texas into the business of selling whiskey and other distilled liquors, thereby presenting the opportunity for building up a gigantic, corrupt political machine, it is our belief that this amendment should be voted AGAINST.

The second amendment provides for the creation of a retirement fund for teachers by which whatever amounts are deducted from their salaries up to five per cent or \$180 per year, will be natched by the state and the teachers be paid an annunity from the fund so established when they retire after teaching for twenty

Those who favor this amendment point out that it will make the meaching profession more stable whereas now it is, for many Rachers, merely a stop gap until some more desirable situation an be located, and that it will make it possible for teachers to tire with an income sufficient to support them

Those who oppose it state that such great difficulty is being secountered in raising enough money for the old age pensions that it would prove still more difficult to raise the money necescary to match the deductions from the teachers' salaries. They point out that if the teachers are allowed to retire after 20 year of teaching—the minimum provided by the amendment—it would be possible for a man or woman who started teaching at 21, to retire on a pension at 41, whereas most other pension plans do not provide for retirement before the age of 60. They also declare that teachers are now among the best paid members of society and that they have the same opportunity as other business and professional men and women of investing their savings to provide for their old age.

The third amendment authorizes the legislature to provide Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of the State. vor it state that private businesses are compelled by by to provide such insurance and that the state should do as much for its employees.

Those who oppose, state that a huge additional sum would have to be raised each year by taxation to pay the premiums on such ansurance, that the rates of pay or working conditions on state jobs are now so attractive that there are many more applicants By such jobs than there are jobs, and that as farmers and employees of small business firms have to provide their own insarance, there is no real discrimination in requiring state emwovees to do the same.

The fourth amendment removes the absolute power of pardon and parole from the governor and vests it in those of a non-politcal board which cannot be controlled by any one administration A has been strongly advocated by Governor Allred. It would preent, it is believed, a repetition of the pardon scandals that have everal times rocked the state, and it would relieve the governor from hearing thousands of applications for leniency. On this amendment, the EAGLE votes FOR.

Proposal number five is to increase the salaries of the governor, attorney general, comptroller of public accounts, treasurer, commissioner of the general land office and secretary of state. For it it is urged that other states pay their officials much more than Texas, and that Texas would get better officials if more money could be paid them. The EAGLE fails to see any relation between the salary paid public officials and the work they accomplish. There have been presidents of the United States receiving \$75,000 a year who did not compare with governors of Texas who receive only \$4,000. 
