### A CITY IN AGONY

A new sensation has been experienced this week by those who, comfortably seated before a cheering fire, have listened to a radio station WHAS in Louisville broadcast flood orders for that sorely stricken city. Operators of the station were working by lanters light, transmitting their messages by short wave or telephone to radio station WSM in Nashville where they were re-broadcast, primarily for the rescue workers of Louisville.

It was hard to realize that out in the cold and dark men were fighting desperately to save, not property, but human lives. As the 20-mile wide Ohio river swirled through homes and stores and factories, frantic appeals for aid were broadcast over the air.

"Boat wanted at such and such a street address to rescue woman and three babies.'

"Nine people at number so and so have been marooned for three days without food and water."

"Carpenters wanted at blank luumber yard to build bridges."

"Boat mechanic wanted to repair disabled motorboat on Main street.'

"Motorcade from Nashville with clothing and food wants direction for entering city."

And so on and on the announcer read, the messages piling up faster than he could read them.


We in Mills county know the menace and terror of flood waters sweeping down an unruly river. Some of our people have lost prized possessions, clothing, even homes, but only a small fraction of our people were thus affected. In Louisville two out of every three families is destitute, their homes under water, their avenues of escape seriously threatened by the rising flood.

The appeal for help for these poor sufferers will not go un heeded here. It is our opportunity to observe the Golden Rule.

### HISTORY REPEATS IN PRICE TREND

The index of wholesale commodity prices, as compiled by the Bureau of Labor Statistics and based on 1926 as 100, declined from 96.5 in July 1929 to 59.8 in February 1933 and then showed a sharp recovery for a period of about two years, reaching 30.2 in May 1935. After that, the trend was practically sidewise until the last two months of 1936. During November and December. there was a noticeable spurt with the index for the latter month rising to 83.6, according to a preliminary estimate.

While the price movement since March 1933 has had some unusual aspects, there is still little reason to assume that the price trend has departed from the pattern established after the Napoleonic Wars and duplicated after the Civil War, according to the Alexander Hamilton Institute. After the former conflict, there was a long term decline which lasted approximately 29 years. After the latter conflict, there was a decline with a duration of 33 years. It is thus apparent that, without a change in the usual post-war pattern, we are still in a long-term period of declining since less than 17 years have elapsed since the price peak in 1920. That the usual post-war pattern is still being followed is indi cated by the fact that the price movement since 1920 has up to the present time conformed in a general way to the trends after the Napoleonic Wars and after the Civil War. The price rally which began in March 1933 does not vitiate the comparison. The long term price declines which occurred after the two major conflicts of the nineteenth century were both interrupted by sub stantial rallies. Moreover, each of these former rallies started at practically the same level as the one at which the current rally began. At the start of the rally in 1834, the price index was 60.3, in 1879, the index was 58.2 and in February 1933, the index was 59.3. The rallies which began in 1834 and in 1879 both proved to b temporary affairs, giving way to a resumption of the long-term downward trends.

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
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

While the course of prices in the current rally has differed from the course of prices in either of the two former rallies, the difference has not been sufficent to provide support for the theory that the present rally is a movement of a relatively permanent character. The two previous rallies differed from each other and vethey both were temporary matters.

The outstanding peculiarity of the current rally has been its duration. The peak of the 1834 rally was reached in 34 months while the peak in the 1879 rally was reached in 36 months. As compared with these periods, the month of December 1936, in which the price average reached the highest level so far attained in the present movement, represented the 46th month since the beginning of the current rally. The index of 83.5 in December 1936, however, was below the peak of 88.4 reached in the 1834 rally. Moreover, the drop from the peak did not represent the definite resumption of the long term downward price trend. Before this was resumed, prices momentarily recovered a good part of the loss suffered in the drop from the peak, rising nearly to the level prevailing in December 1936. Thus, if the duration of the 1834 rally is measured from its beginning to its secondary peak, it lasted 58 months, or a year longer than the present rally has lasted. It must be assumed, therefore, that prices at the present time are following the usual post-war course

The conclusion is, therefore, that the current rally will give way to a resumption of the long term downward trend although the experience after the Napoleonic Wars suggests that this may not occur before the beginning of 1938. This postponement, however, is not certain in view of the experience after the Civil War when prices resumed their downward trend immediately after the peak of the post-war rally was reached. Even if the decline is postponed until 1938, it is questionable whether the peak of the current rally will be much above the point reached in December 1936 as in 1837 and 1838. The spurt during November and December was possibly a warning sign. A similiar spurt occurred in 1837 immediately before a sharp break in prices occurred.



# IN TRUCK LEGISLATION

Any change in existing Texas truck laws which will increase the present 7,000-pound load limit will affect adversely all communities in the state, both rural and urban. This statement is proved best by identifying the causes and effects upon Texas communities.

These are:

1. Increasing truck loads mean correspondingly increasing the distance which the truck can profitably carry its

2. Increasing the distance of profit-able truck haul means bringing the small town wholesale houses and indus-trial plants, such as wholesale grocers, bottling plants, feed mills, oil mills, grain elevators, cotton compresses and retail lumber yards, into direct compe-tition with similar establishments in large cities. large cities.

3. Such competition will inevitably result in further drying up the small coun-try towns by taking from them the payrolls, taxes and local purchases rep-resented by their present establishments. Property values, both residential and commercial, will decline; volume of re-

Conditions which affect adversely the well-being of Texas com-munities also affect Texas railroads in identical manner and degree.

tail sales will grow smaller and former empoyees will migrate to the cities to reinforce the ranks of the unemployed and the bread lines.

4. Large cities, at first stimulated by increased trade territories, bought at the expense of the country towns, will be ultimately affected adversely because of the resulting unhealthy condition of the rural communities forming these trade territories.

5. Because of the consequent shrinkage of the state's tax revenues from country towns, taxes from the cities will have to be increased correspondingly.

6. The lower truck load limit of Texas 6. The lewer truck load limit of Texas now has the effect of acting as a ber-rier at Texes borders to the movement of the larger truck loads carrying mer-chandise from the metropolitan and pro-ducing conters of other states. Any increase in Texas truck load limits will break down that barrier and permit the free truck movement into the state of many commodities which unquestionably would be sold directly to the retailers many commodities which unquestionably would be sold directly to the retailers, thus destroying, in a large measure, the business of wholesalers and jobbers now located in Texas cities.


