

Worry over financial matters was given with the preacher even though as cause of Mr. Driskill's action. Discovery of the body was made by Clarence Petty and Lynn Coffey of Zephyr. Searchers had been to the vacant house two or three times during the night and said the missing man was not there. Mr. Driskill had lived in the Zephyr community for many years and was well known throughout the county.
